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Lumbermen ask to ship via foreign vessel

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Pacific Coast lumbermen asked today to be allowed to continue shipping lumber to Puerto Rico on foreign vessels despite an argument that the practice had been a "complete failure."

Spokesmen for the lumber industry told the Senate Merchant Marine subcommittee that permission to use lower-cost foreign ships had helped them recapture part of the Puerto Rican market from Canada.

But John N. Thurman, vice president of the Pacific American Steamship Association, said U. S. West Coast lumbermen had not even shipped "two full shiploads" to Puerto Rico during the past year.

The lumbermen and Thurman testified on legislation offered by Sens. Warren G. Magnuson and Henry M. Jackson, both Washington Democrats, to make permanent an exemption from maritime laws requiring use of American flag ships between U.S. ports. The exemption — amendment to the Jones act — will expire Oct. 23 if not extended.

Only Thurman completely opposed the legislation.

Others Testify
Alvin Shapiro, vice president of the American Merchant Marine Institute, asked that it be extended for only one year. Richard W. Kurrus, general counsel for the American Trade Shipowners Association, wanted the Puerto Rican market also opened to U.S.-owned foreign-built vessels.

Ernest Park, co-owner of the Brightwood Lumber Co., Arcata, Calif., urged extension of the legislation to help slow the "dumping" of lumber on the California market by Canadian, Oregon and Washington producers.

Magnuson objected to Park's use of the word "dumping," which implies sale of a product at less than cost. The Washington Democrat said, instead, that Washington and Oregon producers had been "forced to sell" in California because of loss of their markets in U.S. East Coast ports to Canada.

Duncan asks explanation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Robert B. Duncan, D-Ore., has asked the Coast Guard why it plans to remove its lifeboat stations at Port Orford, Ore., when the Army expects to spend \$702,000 building a breakwater extension there.

Duncan, in a letter to the Coast Guard, said "it seems a paradox to me that the Army engineers have decided the Port Orford Harbor worthy of a \$702,000 improvement which will naturally increase shipping at the same time the Coast Guard plans to eliminate its manned lifeboat service."

The congressman said "I have recently made a very strong representation of this view in a letter to the Coast Guard commandant along with Sens. Wayne Morse and Maurine Neuberger.

"We pointed out that the harbor improvement is certainly consistent with the needs of water commerce at the mouth of the Coquille River. We can expect more, not less demand for Coast Guard service at Port Orford," he said.

Rural juveniles commit less serious crimes

STILLWATER, Okla. (UPI) — A University of Oregon sociology professor said juvenile delinquency in rural and small-city areas involves less serious offenses than are encountered in big cities.

"And the community tends to take a more lenient attitude toward it," according to Dr. Kenneth Polk, research director of the Lane County Youth Study project.

Dr. Polk spoke before a conference on the problems of rural youth in a changing environment being held at Oklahoma State University. The session opened Sunday and runs through Wednesday.
