

Work on road to Bachelor ski area planned

Work preliminary to the reconstruction and widening of the Cascade Lakes Highway a distance of about ten miles, from the vicinity of Big Springs west of Bend to the Bachelor Butte ski area turnoff, has been started.

In charge of the work is the F. H. McEwen Company of Eugene, which submitted the low bid, \$394,967.50, for the project when proposals were opened earlier this season. There were eight bidders.

The project calls for clearing, excavating and cinder topping of the route. Paving will be handled under a separate contract next summer. The work is being supervised by the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads.

The Eugene firm has 160 calendar days to complete the job just started.

The heavily-used year-around route will be modernized and widened to 24 feet, providing for two 12-foot travel lanes.

Clearing calls for the general widening of the right of way, to permit of unhampered snow removal and to make it possible for the southern sun of the winter months to penetrate to road area.

Equipment was moved into the area this week, and work started from the high west end of the project. First work will be confined to clearing.

When grading starts, not more than three-quarters of a mile will be opened at a time, and this will be kept in good condition for the use of motorists.

Price lists possible cuts in services

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Defeat of the legislature's \$60 million revenue program at the polls Oct. 15 could mean slashing reductions in the state's 4-H, county agent and agriculture and forestry research programs, according to F. E. Price, dean of the Oregon State University school of agriculture.

Price listed the effects at the request of the State Department of Finance and Administration, which asked what would happen if a budget cut of as much as 24 per cent became necessary.

Price said if the 24 per cent cut were apportioned equally among state agencies, it would have these effects on his area:

Closure of some branch experiment stations and dismissal of up to 65 professional research scientists.

Curtailed of county extension programs in home economics, agriculture and 4-H club work.

Dismissal of up to 64 county agents and extension specialists.

Indefinite delay in construction of new research buildings, including a meats research laboratory and a swine barn.

Price called the possible cuts "shocking to contemplate."

CAB concerned at failure to use air service

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB) said Tuesday that 99 cities, including many in the Northwest, are failing to meet its "use it or lose it" standard under which the board subsidizes air service by local service airlines.

CAB Chairman Alan S. Boyd sent letters to the mayors of more than 500 communities served by the subsidized airlines, saying that the board may start proceedings to determine whether air service should be discontinued at cities failing short of the "use it or lose it" policy — originating at least five passengers daily.

Boyd's letter listed the communities served by local service airlines. Cities which failed to meet the CAB minimum of five passengers daily in the 12-month period ending June 30, 1963, include:

West Coast — Baker, Ore. (2,23); Bellingham (2,99); Bend-Redmond Ore. (3,57); Burns, Ore. (1,19); Coeur d'Alene, Idaho (4,16); Cut Bank-Sheley, Mont. (0,96); Great Falls, Mont. (3,26); Lakeview, Ore. (1,66); Olympia (3,23); Ontario, Ore.-Payette, Idaho (2,24); Pendleton, Ore. (2,20); Roseburg, Ore. (4,88); Salem, Ore. (3,77); Sun Valley-Hailey-Ketchum, Idaho (3,93).

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Cost of living in United States holds steady in month of August

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The cost of living held steady in August and there are no signs of any strong inflationary trend before the end of the year, the Labor Department reported today.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said lower food prices offset increases in transportation and recreation costs last month. As a result, the department's price index held steady at the July level of 107.1. This was 1.5 per cent higher than a year ago, however.

The food index dropped two tenths of 1 per cent in August as sharp declines in prices of fresh fruits and vegetables more than offset higher prices for meat, fresh milk and eggs.

The drop meant that a housewife could purchase for \$10.60 in August the same market basket of food that cost \$10.62 in July and \$10 in the base period 1957-59.

The department also reported that net spendable earnings of dropped between July and August but still their weekly pay check was 39 cents larger than a year ago.
