Casual look takes lead

A fashionable autumn is in the air for young juniors. Borrowed from the boys for fall's casual sporty look are "manly" fabrics, skirts with suspender styling, vests, hacking jackets, blazers, and the very new "game shirt" — inspired by the English rugby uniform. The Oliver-look of little boy tailoring appears in long-sleeved blouses, knickers in tweeds and wide-wale corduroy, and sleeveless jacket-suits.

In young junior sportswear, it's smarter to mix than match for fall, and three's never a crowd in outfits that combine three fabrics or colors for fashion's new layered look.

Skirts are shaped for fall in easy A-lines, pleats, wrap-arounds, suspender styles, pantskirts and culottes.

Sweaters make neckline news for fall's layered look. The turtle-neck, worn under a vest, is fashion's favorite, but also on hand for the sweater season are hooded sweaters, leather-trimmed sweaters with patched sleeves and V-neck mohairs.

Coats for young juniors are casual for everyday, elegantly shaped-in at front and falling free at back for dress. The cape coat is a fall favorite as are car coats and all-weather coats, often belted and hooded for school and sport.

Neckline and sleeve interest is notable in fall coats.

Young junior dresses come in simple, uncluttered shapes. The skimmy, a waistless dress that glides over the figure ending in an A-line skirt, is the fashion leader. Shift-shapes and the low-slung overblouse dress with pleated skirt are other young junior favorites for school and dating.

GOOD MIXERS

Fashion mixes colors, fabrics and patterns for fall, sometimes combining three tones or textures in one outfit.

Teen shoes are varied

The teen-ager will be looking high and low for her shoe wardrobe this fall. From thigh-high boots to new low-heeled, shallow-cut skimmers, there's plenty of variety afoot.

Stripped-down shells with little heels are blossoming out in bright leathers at every party and prom, while there's a leather boot to suit every occasion on the teen calendar, notes Shoe Fashion Service of Leather Industries of America.

Whittled to a new slimmness, raised to a higher topline, boots

are leaner, longer and lovelier. One leotard-boot in soft, unlined leather actually covers the thigh; another ends above the knee. Lanky look is retained through use of zippers or elasticized gores.

Most popular version with teen fashionables is the calf-length leather boot, seen in a wide range of colors and textures, including smooth, suede, brushed, grained and patent. Many are shearing lined.

Many fall fashions just right for the younger set

It's a lucky fall in fashion for the young set. Some of the season's favorite looks seem just made for the junior figure, and some are new versions of just what the juniors have always approved. The range, casual to elegant, encompasses plenty of variety for both fun and flattery.

The sporty look brings to the fore many perennials of the junior wardrobe, with new-for-fall additions. For most fashion attention, the look comes in layers — skirt plus shirt plus vest plus jacket plus coat plus scarf or stole plus knee-high or over-the-knee textured stockings plus boots. Sweaters in layers feature turtle-neck shells under V-neck pullovers.

Not only the layers themselves but the colors and textures are multiplying in fashion. Knotty tweeds, gleaming velvets, supple silks are seen in combination, and so are many other fabrics and leathers — fluffy mohair with suede, for example. Colors often add up to at least three per outfit.

In consequence of the layered, sporty look, juniors have a vested interest in fashion, with sweater vests, leather vests, plaid, tweed or fake fur vests worn over the long-sleeved blouses or, again, turtle-neck sweaters.

Almost always on the agenda for juniors, jumpers get fashion impetus everywhere this fall. Fresh approach is provided by long-sleeved shirts to wear-or-not with the jumpers.

In the fun-filled mood for juniors are knickers, knickers, knickers — part of a little-boy look that's prevalent throughout sporty young separates. This is one of the fashions that seems especially fitting for the junior figure. Young set members can wear knickers and little-boy styles with dash and complete femininity, too. Kilties and brief suspender skirts join in the fun.

Equally adept at young figuring are shift and skimmer dresses and styles with waistline empha-

sis placed either high or low. Versatile jacket-dresses and one and two piece knits win favor with juniors.

Coats for day are casual and sporty with raglan sleeves, with detachable scarfs and stoles, with military and "foreign intrigue" styling. Cape influence is both sporty and elegant — extending all the way from full-length cape coats to cape-effects at the shoulder line.

Fashion declares "open season" on fake furs for fall. For fun and fashion, juniors can wear leopard look-alike, phony pony, make-believe mink and zebra parkas and sporty styles. The fabulous fakes look particularly new as coat linings.

Stenciled calf and real-or-fake reptile often appear as parts of the layered look.

Knits get lift from all sides

It's a case of: Anything fashion can do, knits can do, if not better, at least first, as knitwear gets a fall boost from fashion's two directions — sportive and sultry.

Raglan sleeves, sportive shifts, layered separates — these are all in the knitwear tradition. As for the sultry and sophisticated side of fashion, knits have always had the wherewithal to flatter and follow a figure.

Zooming popularity of knits is attested to by the many knitwear divisions recently inaugurated, as makers of dresses turn their special attention to this important area of fashion.

Romantic look ready for brides

However alert to current fashions she may be on all other occasions, today's bride cherishes a liking for romantic traditions of yesteryear when it comes to her wedding gown.

This fall's turn to the classic as an inspiration for all fashion means that the bride may have the best of both worlds — yesterday's traditions plus the today look in styling. Classic simplicity rules in bridal gowns, with romance and elegance provided by superb shaping and fabulous fabrics.

High-rising waistlines reminiscent of the empire look, softly belled skirts with a suggestion of the A line, softened sheath effects give the bride the traditional loveliness she likes. Thoroughly romantic and fashionable, too, are long, slim sleeves. Princess lines and coat dress shapes show still other instances of the simply elegant bridal trend.

Velvets, brocades, damask, crepes, satins, taffetas and peans are opulently appropriate for wedding gowns. In keeping with the classic trend, cording often replaces embroidery.
