

Testimony by Valachi is due again Tuesday

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The burly little man with the husky voice and the greying, close-cropped hair looked like a grocer, or the owner of a neighborhood bar.

But for 45 of his 60 years Joseph Valachi roamed the dark fringes of an outlaw world where murder was just another job, and a clansman's kiss meant death.

In matter-of-fact tones Valachi, a former "soldier" in the ranks of the criminal empire known as "Cosa Nostra," laid bare for Senate investigators Friday the extent of that racketeer world. He resumes his testimony Tuesday morning.

He told how narcotics baron Vito Genovese, "the boss of all bosses" in Cosa Nostra, could order murder done even while in a federal prison cell.

Valachi said Genovese passed the Cosa Nostra's death sentence on him at a bizarre prison cell meeting by grabbing his hand and kissing it.

One Bad Apple
Just before that, he told the televised hearing, Genovese had remarked: "Sometimes you buy a barrel of apples and one of the apples is touched... that one has to be removed or it'll touch the rest of the apples."

Valachi said that in a flare-up of defiance he kissed the hand of Genovese in return as a gesture of disrespect. From then on, he said, he went in fear of his life.

Valachi cited the "kiss of death" confrontation as only one evidence of the crime kingpin's ruthless power. He accused his one-time Atlanta cellmate of having sent out orders for the slaying of one Cosa Nostra underling, and he strongly implied Genovese was responsible for the deaths of two others.

He freely conceded that one reason he violated his 33-year-old blood oath of silence and put the finger on his former bosses was "revenge" for Cosa Nostra's efforts to kill him after his break with Genovese.

"Destroy them... Cosa Nostra leaders... the bosses... the whole thing that exists," he urged the senators.

Valachi Talked Freely
Valachi, heavily guarded to protect against gangland vengeance, talked freely as he began unfolding his first-hand account of organized crime's operations throughout the United States.

The only surface sign of tension evidenced by Valachi was his chain smoking as he testified. He talked of crime and murder as though it were a way of life, as indeed it was for most of his years in Cosa Nostra.

Asked at one point what he would do for his "family," the Cosa Nostra unit to which he belonged, he replied impassively: "I'd go and kill for them."

Valachi said he became a "soldier" in Cosa Nostra in 1930 and broke with the Mafia-like syndicate only after Genovese marked him with the "kiss of death."

McGuire taken at Gig Harbor

GIG HARBOR (UPI) — Terry McGuire, 37, a bank robber who successfully escaped from McNeil Island federal penitentiary near here last Monday, was arrested in this small town Friday night, less than 10 miles from the prison.

The Pierce County sheriff's office said McGuire was spotted standing outside a tavern here. He started to walk away and walked into the arms of Chief Criminal Investigator George Janovich.

Janovich and another deputy were searching the town because of lookings of food and clothing in the area this week.

From Clearwater in Jefferson County, McGuire was serving a 25-year sentence for robbing a bank at Forks of more than \$400,000. The holdup occurred in 1960 and McGuire began serving his sentence in 1961.

McGuire was missed during a regular check at the prison at 5 p.m. Monday. An especially low tide Monday evening was believed to have enabled McGuire to swim a three-quarter mile stretch of water between the island prison and the mainland southwest of here.

Barry to decide early next year

BUFFALO, N.Y. (UPI) — Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., says he will "have to decide shortly after the first of the year" whether to run for the 1964 Republican presidential nomination.

"As of now, I'm not a candidate," Goldwater told newsmen Friday after making a lunch speech.

The GOP senator also said he does not think too highly of popularity polls taken a year before a presidential election. Several polls have suggested that he is the front-runner for the GOP nomination, though still far behind President Kennedy in popularity.

"The man in office always has a head start," he said. "At this time four years ago, Vice President (Richard M.) Nixon was far ahead of Kennedy, and Kennedy won the election," Goldwater said.

Goldwater, invading the home-grounds of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, regarded as his chief, but unannounced, competitor for the GOP nomination, said he did not consider himself or any other Republican out of the running for the candidacy.

"The campaign hasn't even begun yet," he said.

Izvestia says moon proposal bit premature

MOSCOW (UPI) — A commentator for the government organ Izvestia said today President Kennedy's suggestion of a joint U.S.-Soviet moonshot "seems somewhat premature."

Stanislav Kondrashov's article, published by the magazine Za Rubezhom, was the first mention of the moonshot proposal that had been published here. The Soviet press reported Kennedy's U. N. speech, in which the suggestion was made, but edited out all reference to it.

"American propaganda... is pushing to the forefront the President's idea of sending a joint Soviet-U.S. team to the moon," Kondrashov wrote.

"In lavish headlines American newspapers describe the grandiose character of the project, although it seems it is somewhat premature."

The fact that the Soviet press edited out mentions of the moon proposal from its reports on the Kennedy speech had led Western observers to predict a cautious or cool reaction from the Kremlin.

Premier Nikita Khrushchev also has been silent on the proposal, although in the past he has endorsed the principle of space cooperation.

The commentator said Kennedy's suggestion took Washington officials by surprise.

"Leaving aside judgment of the President's lunar project, it should be noticed that the hard emphasis on it is hardly worthwhile," he added.

"It distracts attention from joint earthly exploits directed at attaining peace and reduction of world tension."

MAKING PRACTICE FLIGHTS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Super-sonic B58 bombers are making practice flights from the United States to bases in Spain and the mid-Pacific island of Guam.

The Air Force said Friday the 1,300-mile per hour "Hustler" bombers were flying in groups of three or four to Torrejon and Moron air bases in Spain, and remaining there a few days to give ground crews training in support activities.

The home bases of the bombers are Bunker Hill AFB, near Peru, Ind., and Carswell AFB, near Fort Worth, Tex.

Tear gas bomb tossed in crowd, 12 persons hurt

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—A tear gas bomb was tossed into a group of spectators at a high school game Friday night injuring about 12 persons.

The bomb was thrown shortly before halftime at the Roosevelt-Des Moines Technical High School game and caused confusion for several minutes before order was restored.

It landed in the Tech side of the field, and police said a 12-year old boy suffered possibly serious eye damage.

Fire department emergency rescue units rushed to the scene and administered aid until the injured could be taken to hospitals.

Police said no evidence of the bomb was found nor any trace of the persons who threw it.

Three persons injured in blast

LYNN, Mass. (UPI) — Three persons were injured Friday when a huge liquid oxygen tank exploded outside a building at the highly classified General Electric Co. river works plant and was hurled 200 feet over a 2 1/2 story building.

A 400-pound piece of jagged metal was torn off the tank. The 20-foot long 10 foot wide and 1-foot thick chunk was "sailed like a flattened beer can" over a nearby building and landed in front of the plant's infirmary, officials said.

Almost all windows in buildings 100 yards from the scene were shattered. There was no fire.

The explosion occurred outside a brick building where highly volatile gases are mixed for experiments on jet engines and other highly classified equipment, including projects for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), they said.
