

Lava Bear passes rip La Grande Tigers asunder 25-6

LA GRANDE — Finding their receivers "wide open" all evening, the fighting Bend Lava Bears came on like gangbusters here Friday to post an impressive 25-6 Intermountain League victory over the La Grande Tigers.

Bend accomplished it by combining a quick pass blitz with an inspired defense. The Bears whiffed blood a week ago when they killed Mac Hi 19-18, and apparently they remained kill crazy.

Are the Bears on their way? Last night's mauling of the Tigers served notice to the rest of the Intermountain squads that Bend is very much juggernaut to be reckoned with.

Quarterback Jerry Wetle had himself a field day. He picked apart the Tiger defenses in the

first half, alternating a smashing line attack with quick "look in" bullets to Mike Clark.

Coach Tom Winbiger's Bruin assault rendered the Tigers nearly defenseless. "We were surprised that La Grande stayed with her defense the entire game," Winbiger said. He added, however, "our ground game should have been much better."

There is no doubt about it. . . the look in passes did it. Before the game was six minutes old, the Bears had the Tigers 13 points under.

It all started right off the bat. The opening La Grande kickoff was a dud. Bend got the ball on the 35. Fullback Clyde Smith opened the attack with a 3-yard sweep. Wetle then hit Clark on a quick "look in" for 6 yards, and then Ward followed with a line

assault that netted 6 more. Smith then boomed the gut for 9 before Wetle hit Clark with another quick bullet.

Coach George Tallchief's Tigers were in trouble. Bend had the ball on their 20. A face mask grabbing episode pushed the pigskin to the 10 via the penalty route (half the distance to the goal line).

Wetle took a glance at the defense and then huddled with teammates to call the winner. He hit Clark with another look in and Bend had 6 points on the board. Jim Schaeffer booted the ball but it went wide.

Another break put the Tigers right back in jeopardy. On the first play from scrimmage following the kickoff, La Grande got 16 yards on a break through, but the Tigers were thrown for losses on

the next three plays. Tallchief's Tigers then punted but the ball went only 10 yards and Bend got it on the La Grande 25.

Ward loosened up the defense with a 9-yard boom and followed with another bullet to Clark, covering 15 yards and adding 6 points. Clark on the conversion play took a high snap and ran it in instead of kicking.

When the dust had cleared, Bend ruled 13-0.

Though the first quarter was all Bend, the second frame almost ruined it for the Central Oregonians. "Our defense was good in the first, third and fourth quarters," Winbiger said today, "but in the second period it almost fell apart. . . they (the Bears) sat back on their heels and almost let La Grande catch fire."

La Grande thus commenced a

drive that ran roughshod over the Bruin defenders. John Huntsman was the workhorse. He went 14 yards on a dive play, and then followed with short yardage gains that kept pushing Bend deeper and deeper into its territory. Huntsman finally did it when he dove into the line for the final yard to paydirt. It all started when Gary Graham intercepted a Wetle aerial.

Clark ran back the following kickoff 25 yards. It did something to the Bruins. Bill Tye took a reverse from Wetle on an option pass run play and went 15 yards. This put the pigskin on the La Grande 38. Wetle then hit Tye for 30 yards, but Tiger defenders emerged unscathed as the clock stopped proceedings with the ball resting on the La Grande 8.

A see-saw battle commenced in

the third period. But after the stanza was half over, the Lava Bears came on again. Tim McClain, who was a bearcat in the Bear defensive line all night, blocked a Tiger punt and gave Bend the opportunity when a Bruin fell on it on the La Grande 21.

It was that same play again that set up the TD. Wetle hit Clark with another look-in bullet and Smith charged the line for 5. With first and goal on the Tiger 7, Wetle then connected with Herb Hickman, the Bruin lone some end, for the TD, and Bend was out in front 19-6. Schaeffer's extra point attempt went wide.

No sooner than the third period got over than another Bend onslaught began. Little Mike Metke came into the game as quarter-back and began to move the

Bruins. He hit Tye with an aerial that picked up 23 yards and then connected with Clark for 23. This gave Bend the pigskin on the 12 yard line. Metke couldn't engineer the Bruins any farther, however, and La Grande took over on its own 9. A penalty moved it back to the 4 before McClain boomed through and belted the Tiger quarterback who fumbled. Bend's Warren Sholes fell on it in the end zone for a TD.

Bend out-first downed the Tigers, 15-6. Four of the Tigers' six were in that second quarter. Bend quarterbacks went 16 for 23 in passing. Two aeriels were intercepted. Bend gained 188 yards rushing and 120 passing. La Grande went 108 on the ground, but could muster only 11 through the airlines.

Madras goes down

in valiant effort

Buffs fall to Pendleton 40-0

MADRAS — They came, they saw, and they conquered. That was the story last night when the dazzling Pendleton Buckaroos came to town and waltzed away with a 40-0 victory.

It was simply a case of too much Jack Baird and Dick Jones: Baird for his running and Jones for his passing. No statistics were made available but Jones had another good evening.

That's right. It was all Pendleton most of the way, but the game started out on a much different note. After a series of incomplete Jones aeriels, Coach Frank Good's White Buffaloes came on like a stampede. They gained possession of the pigskin on their 20 after a Buck punt into the end-zone.

Madras then commenced a drive that went 68 yards before an intercepted pass ruined it on the Pendleton 12 yard line. Alvis Smith, Madras' 140 pound half-back, was the Buff workhorse, ripping off large chunks of yardage inside the Buck defensive ends.

Pendleton was in trouble, and it looked as if perhaps the year's biggest upset could be in the making. Pendleton came on with its "goal line" effort, however, and it was enough to put the keboosh on the Buff assault.

2 Plays

Two well-executed plays highlighted the Buff attack. One was a brilliant 20 yard gallop by Smith inside the right end. Another was a pass from minute quarterback Larry Barnes to glue-fingered Doug Stewart, end, who caught the ball away from two Buck defenders and dove out of bounds.

Alert safety Dan Svetlich ended it all when he nabbed a fourth down Barnes aerial and returned it to the Pendleton 24. It was then that the Bucks went to work. This time they stayed on the ground most of the way.

It was a 40-yard Jones-to-Jim Rackly bomb that put the six points on the board, however. Baird booted the extra point.

No sooner than did six plays go by than Pendleton had the ball again, on the Madras 40. One Jones-to-Rackly bomb netted 23 yards, and four plays later another one of the same combination covered the final six yards to paydirt.

Baird Versatile

Again Baird booted the extra point and Pendleton was out in front 14-0. After the kickoff Madras ran three plays and had to punt. Jones caught it but was downed immediately on his 23.

Jones then went into action, pulling some play calling wizardry, that gave Buff defenders such a variety that they were reeling. Instrumental in the 77-yard TD drive was a 15 yard draw play by Steve Corey that was coupled with another 15 yards gained via a "personal foul" penalty.

Larson Rambles

Eric Larson contributed 18 yards and a first down on a reverse before Jones hit Rackly with another TD strike, covering 11 yards. This time Baird's foot was wide to the left. Score: Pendleton 20, Madras 0. That Buff soup was gone and the game was turning into a rout.

Pendleton scored one more time before the half was over. After three passes, Baird handed off to Corey on another draw play that caught the Buffs mire-footed and Corey rambled 54 yards through the Buff secondary to paydirt. Baird's boot was wide, but the Buffs downed out 29-0.

In the second half it was only more of the same. The warm evening had cooling breezes but the Buck attack was sudden, hot and deadly.

Madras' Buffs picked up on defense to start off the second half, but as soon as the Bucks got the ball back it was six plays in a streak of green and another TD.

Jones hit Rackly again, covering 23 yards. Baird followed with an extra point as he "lofted it over." Score: Pendleton 33, Madras 0.

Early in the final stanza, the Bucks got their hands on the ball again, and it took them four plays to do it. Eric Larson was the man. He snugged a bullet from Jones and raced 35 yards past exhausted Buff defenders and along the east sideline to the much-traveled

Game people say 260,000 to hunt in Oregon

PORTLAND (UPI) — The State Game Commission said today deer prospects appear good for opening day today as a good portion of some 260,000 hunters prepared to take to the woods.

Caution against forest fires was re-emphasized by state officials because warm, dry weather this week has raised the fire danger.

The first two weeks of the season will be for bucks, with unit permit holders eligible to take deer of either sex from Oct. 12 through Oct. 20.

The commission said deer populations were on a par with last year in most areas, and down slightly in a few others.

Best results in W-term Oregon should be in the Coast Range on the Willamette Valley side, the commission said. The Cascades also should produce as will the Tillamook Burn, although the latter is more difficult to hunt because of second growth fire.

In Eastern Oregon, the commission said the Klamath country looked good although poor farm crops for several areas may limit the number of forked horns available. Mid-central Oregon should produce well.

The Sled Springs and Cheshin-mus units in northeast Oregon were tabbed as good prospects. Big bucks are reported in the southeast area, including the Malheur, Owyhee, Steens and Whitehorn country.

Culver-Cascade Locks gun to 8-man 20-20 deadlock

CULVER — A hard-charging line provided the breaks they needed yesterday afternoon when the Culver High School Bulldogs battled a bigger Cascade Locks team to a 20-20 deadlock.

It was all done in the second half. Culver was whitewashed for the first half of the ball game while Cascade Locks pushed one across in the second quarter when Dick Nichols, Cascade Locks' quarterback, sneaked across from four yards out.

Bill Dobbs booted the extra point and the visitors led at intermission 7-0.

Culver didn't get started until the third period. It started with the kickoff that opened the second half.

Bob Van Orsow, Culver speedster, ran it back down to the CL 38. Stan Earnest took over at quarterback and mixed short passes with quick sweeps to put the pigskin in the end zone when Rick Urbach wheeled in from 7 yards out.

It wasn't long until the still thirsty Bulldogs drew blood again. A Cascade Locks fumble fell into Culver hands on the CL 40. Joe Valls then carried for 12 on a fancy maneuver before Urbach went 28 yards on a sweep for another TD. Bob Van Orsow booted the extra point and Culver led 13-7.

Phil Dobbs, CL defender, nabbed a third quarter aerial from the grasp of Culverites at mid-field and he rambled unmoled for a TD. Nichols got the extra point and Culver was in trouble again, 14-13.

In the final stanza another fumble gave Culver the ball. This time it was on the Culver 48. A 15-yard penalty for face mask grabbing put it on the CL 37. Earnest then hit Walker for 35 of it. Valls got the TD on the next play from the 2.

Eight plays later, CL's Dobbs knotted the count. He raced 12 yards into the Culver end zone after a 7-play 60-yard drive. The extra point failed, however, and it proved to be Culver's saving grace.

Culver almost pulled it out in the final seconds. When the gun sounded the ball was resting on the 20. Three passes by Gary Williams in the last 50 seconds just about pulled it out.

The Panther TD came midway in the third quarter, after Baker fumbled a punt reception and Redmond recovered on the Bulldog 35. Two plays netted Redmond only a yard, but on the third play Halfback Wayne Marquess took a handoff and pitched a flat-footed pass to Halfback Dennis Moore for a first down on the Baker 9. From there the Pan-

thers used four power plays to punch the pigskin over, with Fullback Mike Rouch crashing into paydirt over left tackle from the one.

Birkholder's kick barely cleared the crossbar.

Baker's first-quarter score came in the opening minutes of play. Redmond returned the Bulldog kickoff to their own 27. Two scrimmage plays gained 4 yards, before a backfield fumble was plucked out of the air by Brian Evans, Baker tackle, who rumbled 25 yards untouched into the end zone. Halfback Mike Gardner's boot strayed wide of the goalposts.

The Panthers reacted quickly but ineffectively to the Baker tally. After returning the kickoff to their own 33, Quarterback Paul Harvey swept around left end and scampered 53 yards across the Bulldog goal. However, an official ruled he had been stopped near the scrimmage line and the play went for naught. Redmond failed to gain after that and was forced to punt.
