James D. McWilliams

PRINEVILLE — James DeWitt McWilliams, 51, manager of the First National Bank of Prineville and a resident of this community for the past five years, died Saturday when on a deer hunting trip in the high Paulina country about 100 miles southeast of here. Word of his death was relayed to Prineville through a Forest Service lookout.

Apparently Mr. McWilliams was a victim of a heart attack.

Mr. McWilliams was a native of Alpine, Oregon, where he was born on July 9, 1912. He was married to Frances Miller in Portland on June 5, 1937. Aside from his widow, Mr. McWilliams is survived by two sons, James W., and John W., Prineville, and two daughters, Patricia Ann, of San Francisco, and Sara Elizabeth, of Prineville. Also surviving is his mother, Mrs. Inez McWilliams, Corvallis, and a sister, Mrs. Donald E. Lindsay, Bijou, Calif.

In World War II, Mr. McWilliams served with the U.S. Army Air Corps, after graduating from Oregon State College in 1938. He came here from Nyssa to manage the Prineville bank.

Mr. McWilliams was a member of the Prineville Community Church, and was active in the Lions Club and the Crook County Chamber of Commerce. He was a member of the Pioneer Memorial Hospital board, the Prineville Golf and Country Club and the Crook County budget board.

Funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at the Prineville Community Church, with the Rev. John L. Grez in charge. Burial will be in the Juniper Haven Cemetery. The Prineville Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

PORTLAND (UPI) — About a dozen pickets from the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People showed up at City Hall today, calling for removal of Portland Housing Authority officials.

The pickets carried placards and handed out pamphlets charging the authority with racial discrimination.

Translator may go off air

Bend area residents receiving television signals from Deschutes Translators, Inc., are in danger of losing the service, it was reported today by Don Ries. The translators are threatened with the necessity of going off the air because of lack of financial support, he said.

Patrons have been given the service for a voluntary annual contribution of \$12. Contributions have been lagging, Ries said, and receipts to date have been insufficient to cover the cost of three recent mailings to local and rural users.

There are no funds for maintenance, tube replacements, power or other expenses, it was reported. Unless substantial contributions are received in the next few days, it was stated, the translators probably cannot remain in service, and the World Series will not be available to translator users.

The Redmond Jaycees, who sponsor a translator service on Grizzly Butte, are also in trouble, Ries said. Only 24 per cent of their subscribers have paid, it was reported, but it was not indicated that the service from Grizzly will be discontinued.
