Upstate tour by symphony is scheduled

PORTLAND — The Portland Symphony Orchestra goes into intensive rehearsals on October 8 in preparation for a rigorous tour of six upstate cities in six days, followed by the opening night of its 1963-1964 Portland season on October 21.

Conductor Jacques Singer, currently in Mexico to lead that nation's Orquesta Sinfonica Nacional in four concerts, returns to Oregon on October 7. He and the 70-piece symphony will "hit the road" a week later for the orchestra's second tour since World War II and the fourth in its history.

The state-wide trek begins on Saturday, October 12, with an 8 p.m. performance in Pendleton's Vert Auditorium. On Sunday, October 13, the symphony will play at 3:30 p.m. in the Hood River High School auditorium. The locale of its Monday, October 14, evening appearance, at 8 p.m., is Bend Senior High School auditorium.

Tuesday night at 8, October 15, the symphony will be in Roseburg. Its concert hall has not been announced yet. On Wednesday, October 16, the orchestra plays a double-header — 3:45 p.m. and 8:15 p.m. concerts in the auditorium of Medford's E. H. Hedrick Junior High School. The tour winds up with three concerts in Coos Bay on Thursday, October 17: at 1:30 and 3 p.m. in the Marshfield Senior High School gymnasium and at 8 p.m. in the Marshfield Senior High School auditorium.

S. California's heat wave seems at end

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A siege of heat that kept temperatures above the 100-degree mark in most of southern California for five straight days apparently had ended today.

Cool ocean breezes rolling inland from the coast dropped temperatures 14 degrees in Los Angeles yesterday — down to a "cool" 88 from Sunday's 102. The hottest it got in Los Angeles during the five days was a 109 on Thursday.

Weather forecasters expected continued cooling for the rest of the week. A maximum of 83 — still above normal — was the forecast for Los Angeles today.

The normally cool beach areas welcomed the night and morning fog and low clouds that usually persist this time of year.

Weather men credited a high pressure area offshore with forcing cooler air inland to end the hot spell.

FIRE DESTROYS PLANT
MANILA (UPI) — A two-hour fire razed the Marcelo Rubber Company factory in nearby Malabon town Monday night and police estimated the damage at \$750,000.

Police said the fire destroyed sections of the Marcelo factory that manufactures rubber shoes, vehicle tires, bed foam and rubber sheets.

For second time in year, Ben Bella is facing fight to maintain his one-man rule in Algeria

PARIS (UPI) — The year-old republic of Algeria teeters on the edge of civil war today.

For the second time in 12 months "strongman" President Ahmed Ben Bella is fighting to retain his hold.

At stake are his one-party, one-man rule and his dream of making Algeria a left-leaning "people's republic."

The newest challenge to Ben Bella exploded Sunday when thousands of Berber tribesmen in the rugged Kabyle Mountains east of Algiers staged a demonstration against the Ben Bella regime.

The revolt was centered in the Kabyle capital of Tizout-Ouzou. Its two main leaders are Hocine Ait Ahmed, a dissident member of Ben Bella's one-party parliament and Col. Mohamed Ou El Hadj, former commander of the Seventh Military District.

In a swift counter-move Ben Bella stripped the colonel of his command and sent in troops and tanks to try to re-occupy the rebellious area.

But the challenge to Ben Bella is far from over. Its roots are both racial and political.

Gen. MacArthur refuses to sit for presentation

NEW YORK (UPI) — General Douglas MacArthur, 83, stood at soldierly attention for 15 minutes Monday to receive a medal in his suite at a New York City hotel.

MacArthur, despite his advanced age, refused to sit down during the long ceremony of presentation of the 1963 Masonic Distinguished Achievement Medal and insisted on standing at attention.

Natly dressed and looking chipper, the general, who became a 33rd degree Mason in 1947, told a small gathering: "I accept it as a symbol of those nameless thousands who have contributed to this great order."

The presentation was made by Harry Ostrov, state Masonic grand master, and former Court of Appeals Judge Charles W. Frossel.

RETREAT FROM FIRE
DAK - ES - SALAAM (UPI) — Three thousand fire-fighters Monday night retreated from Mount Kilimanjaro and a fire they failed to contain.

The blaze was visible more than 100 miles away at night and was spreading up the mountain. It may take weeks to burn out.

There have been no reported casualties from the fire fighters.

different stock from the 7-million Arabs who dominate Algeria. They are descendants of original inhabitants of North Africa before the Arabs came 1,200 years ago.

They are lighter skinned and speak a different language, although both are Moslems.

Ben Bella is an Arab. Most of his opponents are Berbers.

The Berbers were among the fiercest fighters against the French in Algeria's seven-year war of independence. They fought bitterly in their mountain strongholds and the French never really subdued them.

When the war ended last year, the bulk of the so-called "National Liberation Army" which had sat it out for years in the safety of neighboring Tunisia and Morocco without firing a shot, moved in and took over.

Took Best Jobs
 It grabbed control of the country and it seized the best jobs.

The guerrillas of the Kabyle Mountains who bore the brunt of

the fighting still harbor a deep grudge over this. One year ago Ben Bella and his supporters had to fight a brief but bitter civil war before winning control.

The Berbers bowed to superior force, but they never really yielded.

The dissidents are believed to have between 8,000 and 10,000 troops—many of them veterans of the revolutionary period who battled bravely for years against the French.

Against them Ben Bella has far stronger forces and the bulk of the army's heavy tanks and guns.

The anti-Ben Bella groups cannot hope to whip him in a stand-up fight. But they can take again to their mountains and wage another guerrilla struggle as they did against the French. It would be difficult for Ben Bella to defeat them there.

The big threat today is of a new center of guerrilla resistance that would serve as a constant menace to Ben Bella's rule.

Lord Home has good words for Russian policy

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — British Foreign Secretary Lord Home today welcomed Russia's renunciation of war as an instrument of national policy and warned Communist China that a nuclear conflict would annihilate it.

Home, in a policy speech to the General Assembly, told the new countries of Asia and Africa to drop their cry of "neo-colonialism" unless they want to lose investment capital from the developed countries.

"A few more cases like that of Indonesia and the supply of capital will dry up," Home said in a brief reference to the seizure of British investments in Indonesia following the London-backed formation of the new federation of Malaysia.

Home said there were signs that herald "a new chapter of co-operation" between East and West.

Ready To Split
 "Mr. Khrushchev has time and again in recent months declared on behalf of the Soviet government that to interpret Communist doctrine in terms of world war is wrong and is folly," he said.

"So strongly has he — to use the wrong metaphor — struck to his guns that he and his Soviet colleagues have been ready to split the Communist world in half rather than compromise..."

"On paper, Communist theory may include the use of force but the national interest of the Soviet Union cannot endorse it."

"China at present may think that from a nuclear holocaust she would inherit the earth. But she will learn as she gains nuclear knowledge that all her millions would not save her from annihilation if nuclear war were to break. China, too, in her turn, will be compelled to drop force from her national program if she wishes to survive."

PRONE PAPAS
CHICAGO (UPI) — Almost 68 per cent of American husbands take naps on the living room sofa after dinner, a survey by a furniture company revealed today.

The firm, which makes upholstered furniture, said the standard nap is for half an hour. But 21 per cent sleep one hour or more after supper, and half of those are likely to be out for the evening.

Red China celebrates 14th anniversary, claims it has 'growing number of friends'

HONG KONG (UPI) — Communist China today celebrated its 14th anniversary and claimed "a growing number of friends."

Since the last celebration a year ago, Peking has invaded India and broken with its Communist ally, the Soviet Union.

But today the mood was friendly. Premier Chou En-lai set the tone at a reception Monday night for a record 1,800 foreign visitors in Peking for the celebrations.

Referring to differences with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, who has been called an "imperialist lackey" in the past year in Peking propaganda attacks, Chou said "we firmly believe that the day will come when the present differences will be resolved on the basis of Marxism-Leninism."

Russia Sent Greetings
 (The Soviet leadership sent formal greetings to the Chinese party and people, wishing them success in building a Communist state. But Moscow also assailed the Chinese for cutting off Soviet economic aid and making their people suffer.)

"It is not our fault that leaders of the Chinese people ceased their economic cooperation with the Soviet Union, thereby depriving the Chinese people of the possibility of using the unselfish aid of the Soviet Union," the government said Monday.

According to broadcasts from Peking by the New China News Agency, Khrushchev's portrait

was missing from the celebrations today and the Soviet ambassador was given no special honors.

Peng Chen, mayor of Peking and one of the leading delegates to last summer's ideological talks in Moscow, said the Chinese hard line in foreign policy "has won the approval and cooperation of many foreign friends."

Have Many Friends
 "We have friends all over the world," he said.

New China said party Chairman Mao Tse-tung reviewed the mass demonstrations in Peking's Gate of Heavenly Peace Square, and was greeted by "deafening applause."

Among the foreign guests was American Negro Robert Williams, who faces kidnapping charges from a North Carolina racial incident.

Communist newspaper articles on the anniversary made some reference to the economic and agricultural troubles that have beset Mao's regime in the 14 years since it drove the nationalists from the China mainland.

But the stress was on the prospects for the future.
