

Alston hoping 'Koufax healthy'; series opens Wed.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Manager Ralph Houk of the Yankees hoped today for "the breaks" and skipper Walter Alston of the Dodgers for "a healthy Sandy Koufax" for the World Series opening Wednesday in Yankee Stadium.

There was a good chance Alston's hope would be fulfilled for Koufax, the golden armed southpaw who will face Whitey Ford, New York's left handed money pitcher, in the first game said on his arrival, "I feel fine." He had been reported suffering from the

aftermath of a slight case of the flu.

However, only time — perhaps seven games — will tell whether the Yankees, who have made winning World Series a habit, will get the breaks.

The way Houk sees it, the two teams are so evenly matched that the series could be decided by "the breaks of the game." He doesn't buy the general talk that the Dodgers are inferior defensively.

Pitching Is Factor
He does agree with Alston that

pitching, usually the name of the game whether it be for one game or 162, will decide the series victor providing those breaks even up.

Although the Yankees are considered to have more depth in the pitching department, the Dodgers starting trio of Koufax, Johnny Podres and Don Drysdale and their relief ace, Ron Perranoski, are accorded a slight edge over the Yankees "big four." They are starters Ford, Al Downing and Jim Bouton with Hal Reniffi the No. 1 man in the bullpen.

Houk, cheered by the improvement in the condition of his two outfield stars, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris, said the Yankees "are in the best physical condition of the season."

Alston was concerned over his pitching — Koufax, Perranoski and Podres.

Has The Flu
Like Koufax, Perranoski has had a touch of the flu.

"Unless Koufax gets sick today or tomorrow, he'll pitch," said Alston upon the Dodgers' arrival Monday night, "and Perranoski

is okay."

Among his regulars, Alston had a question mark in rookie third base Ken McMullen. McMullen re-injured a muscle in his left leg Thursday night but Alston thinks he will be ready to play Wednesday. If he isn't, he will shift Jim Gilliam to third base and put rookie Dick Tracewski, a slick fielder but weak hitter, at second.

Alston refused to name a starting lineup "until I find out if McMullen will play."

Houk named this lineup and

batting order for the first game: Shortstop Tony Kubek, second baseman Bobby Richardson, left fielder Tom Tresh, Mantle, Maris, catcher Elston Howard, first baseman Joe Pepitone and Ford.

Rich Series Seen
Although this will be the eighth World Series meeting between the clubs, it will be the first since the Dodgers left Brooklyn after the 1957 season to find a baseball gold mine in the Far West and Yankee officials predicted capacity crowds for the

first two games here Wednesday and Thursday. They reported, however, that a few reserved seats had not been sold while about 6,000 bleacher and standing room only tickets will go on sale the day of each game.

With standing room, the Yankees can crowd 72,000 in their park. Add that to the 55,000 capacity of Dodger Stadium in Los Angeles, and it figures to be the richest series ever for the players, who share in the receipts of the first four games only.

Billy Courter bags buck on first trip

Want to hear a success story? Take the one of Billy Courter, 12, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Wetle, 2207 Panama Street. It was his first hunting trip.

Before "the hunt" he announced to the family, "I think I'm going to get one this time." He did. It was a 220 pound buck. Dressed out, it weighed about 190.

Billy shot it at about 8 a.m. Saturday, near Three Creeks Lake. It was a mile off the road "and down two ravines." Mrs. Wetle disclosed. "We thought it weighed a ton by the time we got it out," she said of their (the family's) efforts of bringing out the kill.

Actually, Billy's kill was a weird one. He had seven points on one side and four on the other. Mrs. Wetle today said that they saw only one doe before Billy shot his buck. The Forest Service personnel in the area disclosed to the Wetle group Saturday noon that there was only one other forked horn taken in the area that they knew of.

Hunting must be booming, though. Nicholson's Market and Lockers in Bend revealed late yesterday afternoon that the establishment's lockers are full and that they had to turn away people all day. They were able to take some in the evening, however, after others had moved their animals out. One of the animals in the Nicholson cooler had a 32-inch antler spread.

At Mid-State Meat the picture seems to be the same. Because they have a much larger locker capacity the company's cooler wasn't full. "We have had a real good show," Mid-State Meat personnel disclosed yesterday. Mid-State Meat wasn't open Sunday, but Monday saw over 40 come in steady all day long.

There were several around the 220 pound level. Scot McClain, 1661 W. Fifth Street, early Saturday morning shot a buck in the Sisters area that weighed 205 pounds field dressed. Chopped and channeled it now weighs 180 pounds in the cooler.

Though the story of the locker people seems to point to very fa-

vorable hunting, the reports from local officials of the Oregon State Game Commission show low hunting pressure in the Deschutes Forest with "still not good" hunter success. Game officials claim that it's better than last year, but 1962 was "very poor" for hunting in the Deschutes Forest areas east and west of Bend.

Hunting in the Ochoco, however, seems to be good for the individual hunter. There has been much greater hunting pressure in the middle portion of the Ochoco Forest. The kill is much higher, a count by game officials indicates.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—One Oregon State man was injured in last Saturday's Colorado game, but three players who missed that game are expected to be back for Saturday night's battle against tough Baylor.

Halfback Bill Sinyard is considered a "doubtful" participant in the Baylor game, but returning to action will be end Doug McDougall, center Dick Ruhl and guard Warren Cole.

Baylor has a brilliant quarterback in Don Trull, and the Beavers Monday drilled on pass defense.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—An Oregon team spokesman said today that junior Doug Post, Oregon's second string quarterback, suffered torn ligaments in his knee last Saturday while the Ducks were bombing Stanford 36-7.

Post, the regular 1961 quarterback, was out all last year after an operation on the same knee. The spokesman said that Post "will definitely miss several games" because of the re-injury to his knee.

Coach Len Casanova ran the Ducks through a two-hour workout Monday and spent most of the time on offense. Oregon is at West Virginia next Saturday.

SEATTLE (UPI)—Coach Jim Owens of Washington said tackle Koll Hagen and halfback Bill Stifter are doubtful starters for the Iowa game here Saturday.

Quarterback Bill Siler, out with hepatitis, is now feared lost for the season.

Owens had his Huskies working on scoring from near the goal line in drills Monday. Inability to punch touchdowns across after moving the ball downfield has cost the Huskies two close losses to Air Force and Pittsburgh.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)—Washington State, still seeking their first win, Monday worked to fix its leaky pass defense.

The Cougars meet Arizona in Spokane Saturday night.

John Browne, who subbed for injured Herm McKee at fullback during last Saturday's come-from-behind 14-all tie with Iowa, is expected to handle the same chores against the Wildcats.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Coach Marv Levy says that guard Jim Norwood has been elevated to the University of California's first team.

Levy put his Bear squad back to work yesterday to prepare for Saturday's battle at Pittsburgh.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—Coach John Ralston of Stanford counted up three players who missed the Oregon game who may be back for Saturday's game against UCLA.

But two who played against Oregon are considered doubtful for the Bruins.

Those returning include fullback Glenn Myers, and Gary Pettigrew and center Carl Schraeder. But fullback Dan Conway and guard John James are the question marks.

Stanford concentrated on defense yesterday after Oregon piled in a 36-7 win over the Indians in a fumble-filled battle Saturday.

SAN JOSE (UPI)—San Jose State, its spirit buoyed by a 16-0 whitewash of Kansas State, must build up an attack to match its defense.

That's the opinion of Spartan coach Bob Titchenall, whose team plays at tough Utah State Saturday.

Concerning the Kansas State game, he said, "our offense bogged down in the clutch too often. We've got to sharpen up."

New rules hamper

McKay's 3-unit system at USC gets 'heave-ho'

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Coach John McKay today abandoned his three unit system at University of Southern California, declaring it unworkable under the new substitution rule.

The coach of the 1962 national champions tried the three platoon system that proved so successful for his Trojans last season during the first two games.

But Monday he told the Southern California Football Writers, "I'm through with the three unit substitution system; I find that I can't use it under the new rules."

Barnes Likes New Rule

But coach Bill Barnes of UCLA found the new substitution rule to his liking and declared that only in an isolated rare instance was he unable to get a specific man into the game when he wanted to use him.

"We played 30 men against Penn State Saturday and had no problems growing out of the substitution rule except in one instance," he said.

There wasn't a winner among the three top football teams representing the area. But Barnes was pleased with his team's play in the close loss to Penn State, and Harland Svara of the Los Angeles Rams pro club drew some consolation from a strong defensive effort.

McKay, however, did not feel Southern California played a very good game in dropping a 17-12 decision to Oklahoma in the nationally televised game of the week.

"We've got power," McKay declared, "but we're hurting because we can't seem to throw the football. Since that appears to be the case, we're going to run more."

The outspoken McKay expressed doubts that the Sooners should be rated the top team in the nation for beating his national champions because he said Oklahoma lacked a passing attack.

He felt the Trojans could have scored three or four touchdowns if the team had been able to complete more of its passes and he was puzzled over the inability of All-America end Hal Bedsole to hold on to well-thrown passes in key situations.

"We got beat by a good football team and we didn't play well," McKay continued. "If we don't play better, we'll lose to Michigan State here Friday night."

Zeno At QB

Barnes announced one major change for his Bruins starting with the Stanford game this weekend which calls for Carl Jones to move from quarterback to halfback to take advantage of his running and defensive ability while Larry Zeno gets the call at quarterback as a result of his fine work against Penn State.

The Rams remained in Cleveland to drill for their game with the Green Bay Packers and will work on developing scoring punch inside the 10-yard line. Svara told the writers in a telephone interview.

David Jones was named pro player of the week for his performance against the Cleveland Browns with Pete Beathard of Southern California selected university player of the week and guard Walter Johnson of Los Angeles State getting the vote as college lineman.

say hunt good

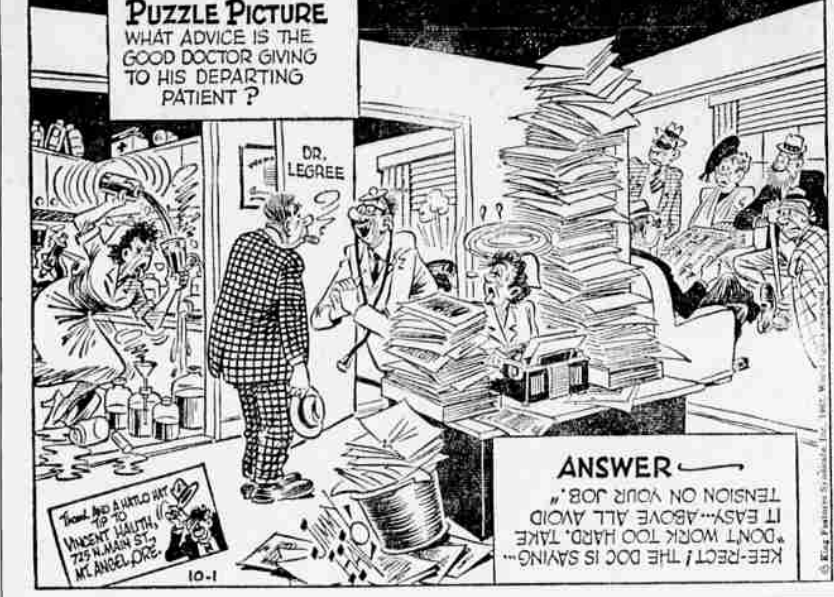

The commission said hunter success was up in Northwest Oregon and fair in the Central part of the state but a little slower than last year in the Southwest and Northeast parts and generally slow in the Southeast.

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Jan Richards, Redmond, 2nd contest winner
