

# Huskies looking for qb's; Cougs brace for Arizona

SEATTLE (UPI)—Head coach Jim Owens today had sophomore Al Libke alternating at quarterback with Bill Douglas as his Washington Huskies prepared for Saturday's home opener against Iowa.

The Huskies have had quarterback problems since starter Bill Siler was taken ill with hepatitis. Defense assignments Tuesday were designed to stop the passing of Iowa quarterback Fred Riddle.

Washington State Cougars were told today not to downgrade their next foe, Arizona.

Coach Jim Sutherland said the team looks like Texas Tech, which dumped the Cougars 16-7 in the season opener. He said they "could be trouble for us" and praised their size, speed and attack.

The coach said the Cougars were in good physical shape for the game at Spokane.

Stanford's fullback situation appeared brighter today as the team readied for UCLA.

Fullback Glenn Myers, who suffered a shoulder dislocation in the opening game, was back in action Tuesday wearing a harness. Fullback Dan Conway, thought doubtful, said he would be able to play Saturday.

The team held a closed practice session with an emphasis on running UCLA plays against the Stanford defense.

STOCKTON, Calif. (UPI)—Coach John Robbe of University of Pacific has elevated guards Dick Heidelberg and Bob Irwin in the first unit.

The Tigers held a tight drill in 94 degree heat Tuesday. The emphasis was on offensive tactics.

The 240-pound junior did not show up for practice Tuesday and

Levy also got bad news from another source. First-string guard Dave Urrea has an infected knee and probably will miss Saturday's game with Pittsburgh.

## A LOOK AT SPORTS

### Prothro has edge over Cas in 'duel'

Perhaps today's comments should be entitled "whizzit"...

Taking a look at the record that is published in the press booklets from Oregon's two major universities, it is apparent that the Beavers have clearly the football edge over the Ducks (in recent times).

Casanova's record at Oregon has been a good one. He is, perhaps, the best mentor at Duckville in many an era. However, his record against Oregon State is a little on the dismal side.

Since his arrival at the Oregon helm, Cas has beaten the Beavers three times, and has lost seven. His teams have dodged with their northern rivals twice.

Prothro on the other hand, has a very good record against the Ducks. Since he came to Beaver-ville in 1955 he has beaten Cas four times, lost twice and tied twice.

Many of those years that saw Oregon State whip the Ducks, Oregon was rated better by the dopsters before the Civil War hostilities commenced.

Both coaches have had impressive records since they dropped out of the old Pacific Coast Conference. Cas' teams have been the more dynamic... some even say "flashy." Prothro's squads, even with Terry B., were not in the "explosive, dynamic" category, though Baker was.

Though Prothro has emerged better Civil War-wise than Cas, they have been about equal in inter-sectionals. Prothro has won 12, tied 12, and lost none, (excluding 1963). But this is including the 35-19 loss to Iowa in the 1956 Rose Bowl, and 6-0 victory last year over Villanova in the Liberty Bowl.

Cas has won 12, but has lost 16

inter-sectionals. One was a tie. This includes Oregon's memorable 10-7 loss to Ohio State in the 1957 Rose Bowl, and the humiliating 41-12 whipping by Penn State in the 1960 Liberty Bowl.

Clearly, Oregon has played more inter-sectionals. Prothro is even across the board while Cas has lost more of them (four) than he has won. From this point of view Prothro has the better inter-sectional record. When you look at the opponents, however, Cas' record against out-of-the-area teams is more impressive. More of Oregon's foes have been "more formidable" (both in that year and perennially) than Oregon State's.

Since the old PCC breakup, both teams have had to play more inter-sectionals. Oregon, financially, has capitalized on it more than Oregon State, statements from both schools have revealed.

Oregon State outdoes Oregon for out-of-state player imports, if this year's rosters are at all indicative. This is especially true where California is involved.

This year 27 of OSU's 49 roster-listed gridgers are from California. Only 13 are from Oregon. Six are native Washingtonians and three are from other states.

If Oregonians are laboring under the idea that the University of Washington up at rain-soaked Seattle takes the import championship, they are mistaken. The Huskies have a giant roster of 81 players. More than half are from Washington. Four are from Texas and 29 are from California. Two are from Idaho and four are from other states. This totals 39 out-of-state players against 42 from the confines of the Evergreen State.

## Whitemarsh Open gets golf's richest talent

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—The richest talent in professional golf will be in a field of some 150 that tees off Thursday in the \$125,000 Whitemarsh Open, the most lucrative tournament of the 1963 pro circuit.

Top money winner Arnold Palmer, PGA and Masters champion Jack Nicklaus and U.S. Open finalist Julius Boros will be among those competing for the \$26,000 first prize money in the first annual event at the suburban Philadelphia Whitemarsh Valley Country Club.

The Open, which will benefit the child development center for

the handicapped in nearby Norristown, Pa., will compete for attention with the baseball World Series and area football games during the weekend but tournament officials were hopeful of a \$250,000 gate.

Many of the pros played practice rounds on the 6,807 yard, par 72-course Tuesday and pronounced it in fine shape. The lengthy course is liberally sprinkled with 150 sand traps and most players agreed that approach shot accuracy and putting would tell the story.

Gary Player, a money winner in all but eight of 118 Professional Golfers' Association events in the United States since 1957, said he felt a 16-under par 272 would capture the 72-hole event.

Palmer, who has been troubled by apparent bursitis in his right shoulder, said he "felt fine" as he shot a two under par 34 for nine holes during a Tuesday practice round.

Four-time U.S. Open champ Ben Hogan had been scheduled to play in the event but sent word to tournament director Frank Meador Tuesday saying he regretted he was unable to attend "due to business commitments."

The field will be cut to the low 75 players and ties at the end of 36 holes and a tie at the end of the event will necessitate an 18-hole playoff Monday. In the event of still another tie at the end of the playoff, "sudden death" holes will be played.

## Iowa coach says officials' goof saved WSU tilt

CHICAGO (UPI)—A "goof" by the officials was "the only thing that saved our bacon" against Washington State, Bob Flora, Iowa assistant football coach, told the Chicago's American Quarterback Club luncheon Monday.

"Washington State was moving well with a tremendous wind at their backs and on about our 30-yard line," he said. "On third down one of our players took a punch at their quarterback and he was thrown out. We were penalized and wound up with the ball."
