Kennedy given frank appraisal of S. Viet Nam

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor returned today from a close-up inspection of the front lines of the South Viet Nam guerrilla war to give President Kennedy a frank appraisal of the situation.

McNamara and Taylor, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, spent a week on a fact-finding mission for Kennedy to clear up some of the confusion over whether the South Vietnamese war effort had been diluted by its domestic religious crisis.

McNamara declined on their arrival at Andrews Air Force Base, Md. today to give newsmen any inkling of what his report contains. He saved it for a conference the two Pentagon leaders had with the President at the White House, only a little over three hours after their return.

On their departure from Saigon Tuesday, McNamara issued a statement saying he and Taylor had traveled the "length and breadth of this land" and had spoken with several hundred persons during their visit.

Assess Situation

Kennedy sent McNamara and Taylor to South Viet Nam Sept. 23 to make a first hand assessment of the progress of that country's war against the Communist guerrillas, a war in which 12,000 to 15,000 U.S. servicemen are involved.

The President gave the two investigators a three-way assignment.

—To assess the military situation now, compared with the period before late August when the Vietnamese government cracked down on Buddhists and threw the country into a political turmoil.

—To assess the probable effect of the Vietnamese government's repression of the Buddhists and other policies on the future progress of the war.

—In the light of the first two findings to recommend what action the United States should take.

Policy Isn't Question

U.S. officials said it was not a question of deciding U.S. "policy" in Viet Nam — the policy is and has been to see the war won and help the Vietnamese economically toward a better life.

Kennedy has stated this country would not pull its forces out of Viet Nam, whose defeat he believes would ultimately mean the loss of all Southeast Asia to communism.

The question, officials said, is one of tactics — how forceful the United States should be in trying to persuade the Vietnamese regime to make reforms, what U.S. aid policy should be, how the Vietnamese war effort should be organized and what its working relationship with U.S. military officials should be.

Council firm over freeway

LAKE OSWEGO (UPI)—A proposed new freeway apparently will not go through Clackamas County.

The City Council here Tuesday night unanimously reaffirmed its position against construction of any freeways through the city.

State Highway Engineer Forrest Cooper said earlier the state would not build any freeway through Lake Oswego without written agreement of the City Council, and that if the freeway did not go through the city it probably would not go through Clackamas County.

Jury finds Dean guilty

PORTLAND (UPI)—Leo Carl Dean, 36, Portland, was found guilty of second degree murder by a Circuit Court jury of seven women and five men here Tuesday afternoon.

Dean, a television repairman, was charged with fatally beating a 4-year-old boy, Ricky Schmidt. The jury returned its verdict, which was 11 to 1, after deliberating about two hours. The trial ran seven days.

Sentencing was scheduled for next Wednesday.

Christine hears frame charges

LONDON (UPI)—Haggard and frightened Christine Keeler, the girl in the Profumo scandal, stood in the prisoner's dock today and heard herself accused of framing a discarded West Indian lover.

In an eventful life since she came to London from the country five years ago, the 21-year-old redhead has often skirted the edges of trouble. She has been a witness in three court cases and the central figure of an episode that rocked the government.

War Minister John Profumo resigned because of his misconduct with her. One of her numerous West Indian lovers is serving seven years for shooting at her. Her protector, Dr. Stephen Ward, society artist and osteopath, committed suicide when he was convicted of living on her immoral earnings.

But this is the first time she herself has been faced with the possibility of punishment by the law. And she looked as though she realized that the charges of perjury and conspiracy against her—if proven—might add up to years in prison.

Her shoulder-length hair could have used the attention of a hairdresser. She nervously scribbled notes in a book as the prosecution named the mystery man who beat her last April 18 as John Hamilton — Marshall, brother of her best friend.

Miss Keller is accused of attributing the injuries to Aloysius (Lucky) Gordon, a West Indian jazz singer who received a three year jail sentence as a result. Today's session was the first of a three-day hearing to determine if she must stand trial on the charges.

Solons approve poaching bill

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Senate Tuesday approved a bill that would provide prison terms and stiff fines for captains of foreign fishing vessels caught poaching in U.S. territorial waters.

Debate on the bill made it clear the measure was aimed at Russian and Japanese fishing fleets which have been hauling in catches along U.S. coasts.

The measure was passed by voice vote and sent to the House after its chief sponsor, Sen. E. L. Bartlett, D - Alaska, gave assurances that it in no way unilaterally extended the traditional three-mile U.S. sea limit.

The bill calls for fines up to \$1,000 or prison terms of a year, or both, for operators of foreign vessels caught inside U.S. waters.

Algerian army gives Ben Bella pledge of loyalty, raps rebels

ALGIERS (UPI)—The Algerian army pledged its loyalty to "strong man" President Ahmed Ben Bella today and denounced the rebels who are seeking to overthrow him.

In a statement issued by its political department, the army said it "condemns energetically this attempted counter-revolution and decides solemnly to combat any attack upon the fruits of the revolution."

"It reaffirms its loyalty to the government and people and pledges itself to pursue the struggle for the building up of socialism," the statement added.

Isolate Rebel Region

The army announced its support for Ben Bella as heavily armed loyalist troops moved to isolate the rugged Kabylia region where anti-government rebels have called for his ouster.

The army statement denounced the insurgent leaders as "ambitious politicians, sick for power and division."

Aid Not Described

The statement did not expand on this nor indicate whether it meant Salazar has promised help to the anti-Ben Bella forces.

The army's statement was published prominently in all Algerian newspapers.

It followed a defense ministry denial Tuesday of reports that regular army units were deserting to the insurgents in the Kabylia area.

Other sources here also said there was no truth in the reports. Meanwhile, pro-Ben Bella troops, in camouflage uniforms and carrying sub-machineguns, inched forward in armored vehicles to block communications between Kabylia and the rest of the country.

So far, there has been no bloodshed.

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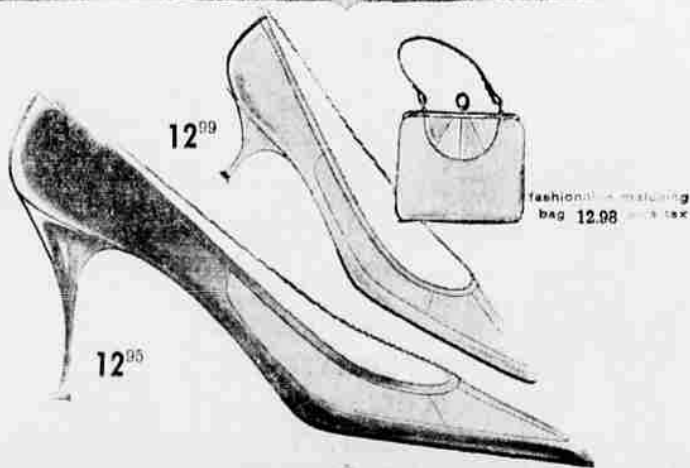
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
