Consultant here for sessions on alcohol use

A consultant with the Alcohol Studies and Rehabilitation Section, Mental Health Division of the Oregon State Board of Control, Gordon Raney, was in Deschutes County Tuesday to confer with educators, and assisted them in the teaching of problems concerning use of alcoholic beverage.

Raney also worked with sophomore classes in the Bend Senior High School and conducted a workshop, attended by 40 Deschutes County teachers. The workshop was held at the John Tuck School, in Redmond.

In Bend, students in tenth grade health classes for girls joined in an open discussion of alcohol, and its uses as a beverage. Raney assisted the teacher by acting as consultant.

At the workshop in Redmond, Raney presented an overview of services, methods and materials available to schools and communities in coping with the problems of alcohol. The new teacher manual published by the Oregon State Department of Education was introduced and discussed.

Raney is scheduled to return to Deschutes County on October 22, November 19 and 20 and December 10. Several programs are planned for Bend schools.

of Canadian ratification and go it alone on river development. Bennett, whose party won 34 of 52 seats in the election, has been at odds with the Canadian federal government over the treaty for the joint development of the Columbia River. The U. S. Senate ratified the treaty in 1951, but the disagreement between the provincial government and Ottawa has delayed ratification by the Canadian Parliament.

Mansfield said he was convinced now that the provincial and federal governments would get together on the treaty as he had been before the elections.

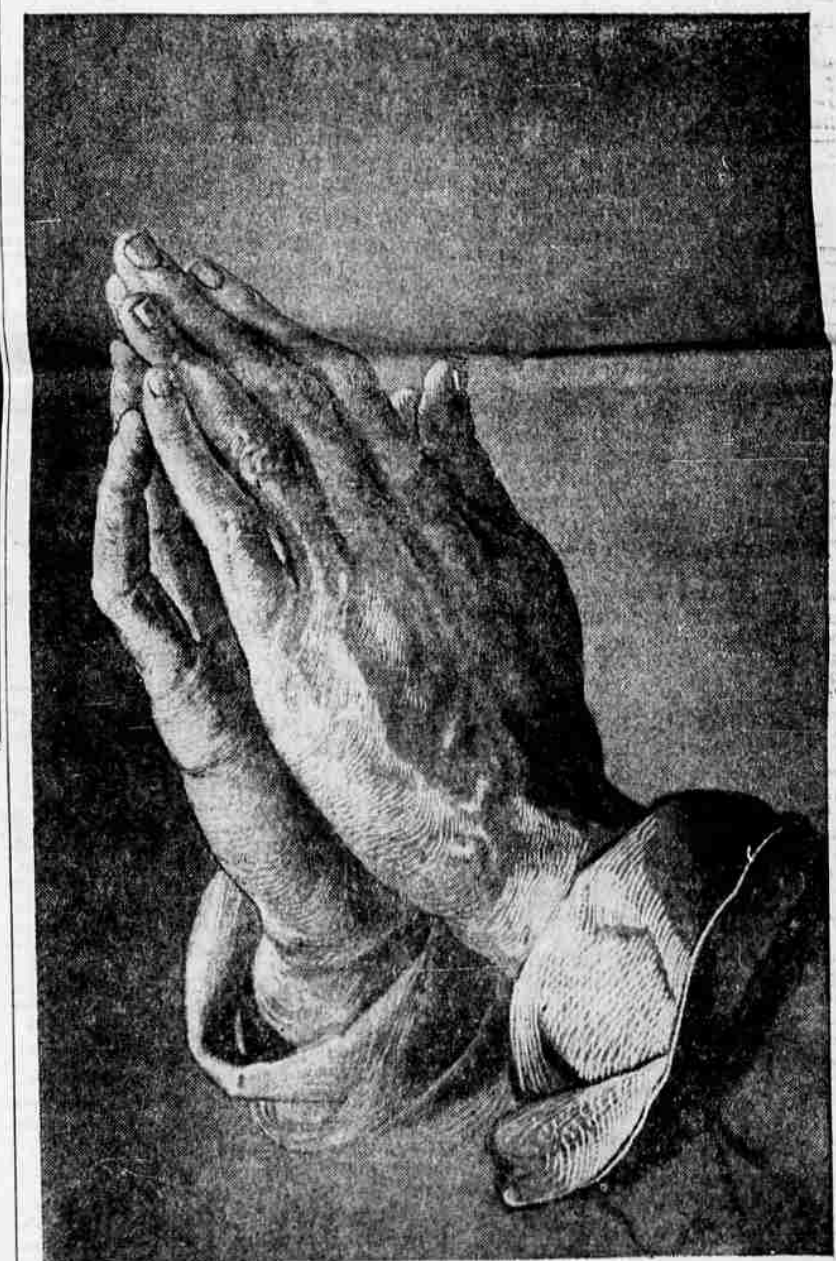
Once the elections were held Mansfield said, the Canadians then could "get down to bedrock" on the problem of the sale of downstream power benefits.

Under the treaty, the United States and Canada would work together for further development of the Columbia River and its tributaries. Canada would build three storage dams in British Columbia and receive cash and power in exchange for power accruing at downstream U.S. dams as a result of better river regulation.

The treaty also would make it possible for the United States to proceed with full development of the Libby Dam in Montana. The dam would back waters of the Kootenai River across the border into Canada.

The treaty provides for delivery of power to the Canadian border, but U.S. officials have expressed willingness to help Canada market it in the United States if the Canadians so desire.
