

## Reed students stage sit-in

PORTLAND (UPI) — About 50 students at Reed College staged a sit-in at the president's office Wednesday after being inadvertently assigned to a lecture hall without seats.

Richard Frost, vice president of the school, said the students demanded rescheduling of the lecture or a return of that portion of their tuition fee, about \$5, earmarked to pay for the lecture.

The situation arose when the lecture was transferred to the newly-completed art center from the regular lecture hall. The lecture was called off when it was found there were no seats.

Frost said, "I'm sure we'll reach some kind of an agreement."

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## Hurricane aims its next blow at Haiti area

SAN JUAN, P.R. (UPI)—Hurricane Flora, which has claimed 25 lives in a destructive trip up the Caribbean Sea, today aimed its 140 mile-per-hour winds at the Haitian peninsula.

Forecasters said the season's deadliest tropical twister would move across the center of the Haitian peninsula this evening if it continued on its northwesterly course.

Emergency evacuation warnings were issued for low-lying areas in southern Haiti and the southern coast of the Dominican Republic, west of Santo Domingo.

Persons in those areas were warned to seek higher ground "before rising waters from the storm tides cut off escape."

At 8 a.m., a weather bulletin said Flora was about 140 miles south-southeast of Port-au-Prince, Haiti.

Hurricane warnings were issued for the Haitian peninsula eastward to Cabo Beata, Dominican Republic, and northward through the northwest province of Haiti. Whole gale warnings were in effect on a line west of Bahia de Neiba, Dominican Republic, to Cap Haitien on the north coast of Haiti. Gale warnings were ordered for the remainder of Hispaniola west of a line from Santo Domingo city to Puerto Plata.

Torrential rains were forecast for Haiti and Western Dominican Republic and the advisory warned of "a definite threat of destructive floods on all major rivers and streams."

Hurricane winds extended 50 miles to the north and east of Flora's center and 25 miles to the south and west. Gale winds reached 175 miles to the north and 100 miles to the south and west.

The mountain range on the Haitian Peninsula has peaks 5,000 to 7,000 feet high, and weathermen said this could sap some of the fury out of Flora.

Hurricane Edith, the 100-mile-an-hour storm which preceded Flora, diffused and subsided into a tropical storm shortly after crossing the mountainous eastern tip of the Dominican Republic last Friday.

But forecasters said Flora was larger and much more intense than Edith and would be less likely to break up in the Haitian mountains.

SALEM (UPI)—Insured unemployment in Oregon was at its lowest rate in four years during the last week of September, Employment Commissioner David H. Cameron said today.

The 2.1 per cent rate compared to 2.4 per cent both a month earlier and a year earlier, Cameron said.

Much of the high employment rate and lower unemployment rate was attributed to a high level of seasonal activity and a reduction in the size of the labor force as students returned to school.

## JFK dedicates new U.S. dam in Arkansas

HEBER SPRINGS, Ark. (UPI)—President Kennedy dedicated a new federally financed \$46.7 million dam today and defended such projects against charges that they are "boondoggles" and a waste of tax money.

He pointedly asked whether it was not more wasteful to stand by and see life and property lost through floods and to leave untapped the energies of the nation's streams and rivers.

He said water developments ultimately pay for themselves, serve homes and farms and factories and produce "billion dollar" benefits for all.

"These projects protect and create wealth — new industries, new income, new incentives and interests," the President said in remarks prepared for dedication of the Greers Ferry Dam and Reservoir here.

The presidential speech was the first of two in Arkansas today. The second was scheduled this afternoon at Little Rock where Kennedy's appearance had produced advance rumblings over the racial segregation issue. Kennedy's main emphasis there was expected to be on his tax cut program, however.

Kennedy went to Arkansas primarily at the invitation of Chairman Wilbur D. Mills, D-Ark., of the House Ways & Means Committee, who piloted the administration's \$11 billion tax reduction bill to House passage last week.

Two area officials of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) protested in a telegram to Kennedy that the Barton Coliseum at the exposition grounds is "the worst segregated institution in the state."

But White House leaders said they were assured there would not be any segregation of Kennedy's audience. And it was planned for him to speak outside the coliseum grounds.

The segregationist Capital Citizens Council has urged Arkansas in a newspaper advertisement to spurn Kennedy's visit.

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## Police seeking to determine blaze details

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Little Cathryn Reeves remained on the critical list at San Francisco General Hospital today, while authorities sought to determine how and why the 8-year-old crippled polio victim was set afire.

Cathryn suffered third degree burns over 40 per cent of her body Tuesday evening when her dress caught fire and she was unable to run for help because of the braces on her legs.

The injured child told police that two boys in her special ungraded class at Visitation Valley School threw a book of flaming matches at her. She said they teased her because of the braces.

Police questioned three of Cathryn's classmates, including the two whom she had named. Authorities said the youngsters, ranging in age from 7 to 10, denied throwing the matches.

"The boys claim she lit them herself," said police Lt. Dan Mahoney, who added that his investigation determined that the four children were playing together, and that Cathryn evidently had the matches.

Police Inspector Kevin Conroy said all three of the boys seemed confused as to what actually happened.

"I don't think any of them really knows," Conroy said. "It appears it might have been accidental. We'll talk to the little girl later, when her condition improves."

## Judge vacates Sept. 30 action

PORTLAND (UPI) — Federal Judge John F. Killenby Wednesday entered a memorandum order from the bench vacating judgment made Sept. 30 in a \$100,000 damages settlement to Congregation Ahavath Achim.

The judge gave as his reason the fact that he had signed the judgment without having given defendants sufficient time to prepare objections.

## Rep. May fears U.S. may sacrifice arms advantage

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Catherine May, R-Wash., suggested Wednesday the United States might be sacrificing a military advantage for a propaganda advantage if it joins the Soviet Union in an attempt to put men on the moon.

"To be first in propaganda but second in defense could be fatal," Mrs. May said in a newsletter. The Washington Republican questioned President Kennedy's proposal for a joint effort to reach the moon, saying the Russians could be expected to seek military control of space while "tying up" the United States in the joint expedition.

The Russians have scored "spectacular" propaganda victories in their space program over the years, Mrs. May said. But during those same years, she added, the United States had maintained a lead in the stockpiling of weapons.

"We may have been second in propaganda," she said, "but we were first in defense."

She said she based her doubts of the wisdom of a joint U.S.-Soviet moon shot on views expressed by Sir Bernard Lovell, director of Britain's Jodrell bank experiment station.

Lovell, Mrs. May noted, had expressed belief the Russians had given up the race to put a man on the moon and were concentrating instead on the assembly of a space platform. She said U.S. military experts had suggested such a space platform could be used to launch nuclear warheads to targets on the earth.
