

Deacon Jack Hurley says goodbye to Seattle

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI) — San Francisco, prepare yourself. Honest Jack Hurley is headed your way—40 to stay.

After 15 years of gentle persuasion in this neck of the woods, the Deacon has packed his pills and said goodbye.

"I'm going where the money is," said the caustic 65-year-old fox before boarding a southbound train.

San Francisco, close your Golden Gate. Hog-tie the Cow Palace. Change the combination on the Bank of California.

In a few days, Hurley will unveil "the next heavyweight champion of the world." His name is Elmer — that's right, Elmer—

Rush. To see him in action it will cost good cash. And with Hurley promoting the play, the fight mob will be begging to pay.

"I have enough confidence in my ability to believe I can make a champion out of any young fellow who has what it takes—a strong chin, a stout heart and enough intelligence to absorb teaching," Hurley said, for openers.

Elmer is a 23-year-old former paratrooper who stands six-foot-two, weighs 295 pounds and is a Californian. He's as green as Hurley is gray.

"I'll teach Elmer the fundamentals from the ground up," declared the Deacon. "I think this young California boy has the makings."

Now, don't get the idea that Hurley is talking through his hat, where, incidentally, he keeps his office. He's done it before.

Years ago he molded Billy Petrolle into the sensational Fargo Express. He turned out Vince Foster and Charlie Retzlaff, and more recently he lifted Harry (Kid) Matthews up by his sweat socks out of the Pacific Northwest ham and eggs circuit and got him to within one fight of a shot at the world's heavyweight title.

Any fighter Hurley has handled during his 45 years in the game will concede that the Deacon is among the most honest in the business. He takes 50 per cent but his "athletes" seldom go broke while he's handling the money.

In 1949, Matthews drove to Chicago and sought out Hurley, who told Matthews, then a middleweight, "I take 50 per cent."

"That's too much," said Matthews. "How much you making now?"

"Nothing," said Hurley. "Well," said Hurley, "fifty per cent of nothing isn't much, is it?"

So, after 12 years of making "nothing," Matthews put in six years with Hurley and wound up with two businesses and a sizable bank account.

Hurley's powers of persuasion are tremendous.

To get Matthews up near the top of the heavyweight heap he enlisted the aid of the U.S. Senate which subsequently threatened

to investigate the International Boxing Club. Matthews wound up fighting the up-and-coming Rocky Marciano in Yankee Stadium on July 23, 1952, in what the IBC billed as an "elimination" match for the right to meet Jersey Joe Walcott for the heavyweight title. Matthews was eliminated in 2:55 of the second round, but once again Hurley was back in the big time.

Jack then pulled off one of the most audacious feats in the history of the ring. In July of 1954, no less than 16,000 fans spent nearly \$100,000 in Seattle to watch Matthews get defeated by the Cockney clobberer, Don Cockell.

Amazingly, this was the third time they had met over a two-year period—and it was the third

time Matthews had lost.

He followed this up by promoting the "impossible" heavyweight title bout in Seattle between Floyd Patterson, the professional champ, and Pete Rademacher, "the world's ranking amateur."

"Rademacher might do it," Hurley told the public as he sold ringside seats all the way back into the grandstand of the Seattle baseball park. It wasn't exactly a success at the gate, but then Hurley didn't have a free hand either.

Seattle will miss the Deacon. He gave them their money's worth, regardless of who he had in the ring.

He was worth the price of admission all by himself.

Fun really began when Fernandez cooled De Nucci in Boston scrap Friday

Drysdale faces lefty Yankees

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Fireballing Don Drysdale faces a lefty-loaded New York Yankee batting order today and if you think he's asked Sandy Koufax and Johnny Podres for any tips, forget it.

Southpaws Koufax and Podres handled the Yankee hitters masterfully in the Los Angeles Dodgers' first two World Series victories at Yankee Stadium. But as a right-hander pitching to those same hitters, Drysdale realizes "I'm strictly on my own."

"I couldn't learn a thing from the way Sandy and Johnny pitched to the Yankees," Drysdale said at the Dodgers' off-day workout Friday.

"Right-handers work on the same hitters differently than lefties do," he pointed out. "I couldn't pitch to the Yankees the way they did. Heck, they don't even pitch alike, even though they're both left-handed."

"If a pitcher is 'on,' it doesn't matter whether the opposing team has nine left-handed hitters in the lineup," Drysdale went on. "Several teams loaded up with lefties when I pitched this year. The Giants did it; so did the Phillies and the Cards. The way they platoon these days, you have to expect it."

"But on the days when I had my stuff, I'd beat them. And if I didn't have it, they could hit me with pogo sticks, swinging lefty or right."

"With two switch-hitters in the Yankee lineup, they had five right-handed hitters against Koufax and six against Podres. But did it matter?"

Lane-Ortiz bout off—Parnassus

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A proposed lightweight title match between champion Carlos Ortiz and Kenny Lane in Los Angeles is off, according to peved matchmaker George Parnassus.

Lane said in Michigan that the bout was set and World Boxing Association president Ed Lassman announced Wednesday at Miami Beach the contract would be signed "momentarily." But Parnassus countered that Lane's manager, Pete Petroskey, never agreed to his terms. The terms were \$10,000, but Parnassus said Petroskey wanted expenses paid also.

Another opponent for Ortiz will be sought, possibly featherweight Sugar Ramos, for a title defense here.

Linfield opens NW title defense

Counting action starts today in both the Northwest and Oregon Collegiate football conferences.

Linfield's Wildcats, victors in 23 straight regular season games, open defense of their Northwest Conference title against College of Idaho at Caldwell.

Lewis and Clark, rated the top threat to Linfield this season, plays at Willamette while Pacific is at Whitman in the other game.

Fernandez went home with a \$4,500 check, most of it from the television receipts. De Nucci, knocked down for the first time in his 43-bout career, got the same amount, once he was revived. And the chances were that the licking ended his television career if not his professional boxing campaign.

Fernandez, almost casual while dominating the first three rounds of the scheduled 10-rounder, said he had begun to wonder how De Nucci withstood his body combinations.

"Then I finally caught him with a left hook right on the button," the 159½-pound Fernandez said. "And from now on, when I fight anybody, they'll fall just like he did."

De Nucci, 165, wasn't too sure about the kayo punch.

"I don't know where that last one came from. I never saw it. They told me about it afterward."

Steve Shehan, Sisters' workhorse halfback, scored the first two TD's in the Outlaws' losing cause and added a conversion run. Both Shehan TD's came in the first quarter. Jeff Hatt picked up the final Outlaw TD in the last quarter. He also ran the ball over for an extra point.

49'ers will lose by 10

DETROIT (UPI) — The San Francisco Forty Niners, with old faces in new positions and one new face in a key position, are 10-point underdogs for Sunday's battle here against the Detroit Lions.

Among the old faces will be those of Jack Christiansen, quickly raised from assistant coach to head coach of the Forty Niners following Red Hickey's resignation.

Another one will be that of Bobby Waters, moved to starting quarterback after John Brodie hurt his arm in an auto accident.

Behind Waters is Lamar McHan, a new Forty Niner but a veteran of almost a decade in the National Football League. He joined the Forty Niners only this week, but Christiansen says he has been looking well in practice and will see some action Sunday.

While the Prospectors have lost three straight, the Lions have not done much better. They defeated Los Angeles but were clobbered by toughies Green Bay and Chicago.

Couch George Wilson has not yet got a really good day out of either Milt Plum or Earl Morrall at quarterback and the defensive line misses Alex Karras, sidelined for illegal betting activities.

Portland Bucks beat Canada 4-0

VICTORIA, B.C. (UPI) — The Western Hockey League Portland Buckaroos posted a 4-0 victory over the Canadian Olympic team here Friday night.

Kenny Lauffman scored two goals in the first two periods and Art Jones and Tommy McVie tallied in the third period.

Veteran Don Head played the first period as goalie for the Buckaroos and rookie Rick Charbon took over for the final two periods.

Dufur, then, playing under a new mentorship, gave the Outlaws a taste of real football, as the locals and the Dufurites battled tooth and tongue for the remainder of the quarter. When the dust cleared, things were deadlocked 13-13. Dufur managed to tally another TD in the second stanza and then retired at the half holding a 20-13 margin over the mid-Oregonians.

Though down by seven at the half, it was the third quarter that spelled doom for Coach Gene McDonald's 8. Sisters ran only 12 plays from scrimmage and netted the same number of yards, 12. Six straight passes went incomplete. In the meantime, however, Dufur wasn't letting any grass grow under its feet.

Wasco County's blitz crew scored two TD's, adding 12 more points to its meld. Sisters, then, opened the game's final quarter with a savage attack that served notice Dufur might take it on the chin after all.

Hatt scored the Outlaw TD and ran over the extra point and Sisters added 7. When Dufur got the ball the hometown grid-ders didn't have it, and before long the Outlaws had the pigskin again.

Sisters opened another blitz and it looked like trouble for Dufur. It all came to a sudden end, however, when Dufur intercepted a Sisters aerial and ran it back 70 yards for a touchdown that left the mid-Oregonians out of the picture.

Dufur utilized a quick opening attack. Coach McDonald said the Outlaws were at first unable to contain things when Dufur filled a short count takeoff. Dufur filled the air with passes and completed at least 50 per cent of them, McDonald disclosed.

REBUILDS STADIUM

TOKYO (UPI) — The \$27 million rebuilding job on Japan's National Stadium for the 1964 Olympic Games was completed Friday. Same 2,000 Olympic officials and Japanese government figures attended the occasion marking the remodeling of the stadium, which was enlarged from 48,000 seats to 72,000.

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Honors shared by Al Balding, Phil Rodgers

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Canadian Al Balding fashioned a four-under-par 68 and ex-Marine Phil Rodgers shot a 70 to share the 36-hole lead with 138 going into today's third round of the \$125,000 Whitemarsh Open.

Balding, a 39-year-old pro from Toronto, said "all I did was make a lot of putts." Friday during his 33-35 round that trimmed two strokes from his first day, under-par 70 at the Whitemarsh Valley Country Club.

Rodgers, 25, Perdido Bay, Fla., used "common sense" to combat a stiff wind on the 6,807-yard course and card a two-under-par 70 to add to his first-round 68.

Mason Rudolph, Lehigh Acres, Fla., the first-round leader with a 67, slipped to a par 72 and tied for second place with Tommy Jacobs, Bermuda Dunes, Calif. with 139.

The field of some 140 pros and one amateur was cut to the low 75 for the final two rounds. Survivors in the cutoff at 151 included Arnold Palmer, this year's leading money winner, who had a 36-hole, 70-71 for 141; Jack Nicklaus, who had 148 after soaring to 77 in the second round; Julius Boros, 73-75 for a 148, and South Africa's Gary Player, 71-72 for 143.

Gene Littler, Rancho Bernardo, Calif., was tied with Palmer for third with 69-72-141. Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif.; Terry Dill, Hot Springs, Ark.; and Harold Kneese, Aiken, S.C., were tied at 142.

Don January, Walnut, Calif.; Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va.; and Roger Ginsberg, Alpine, N.J., were tied with Player at 143. Wes Ellis, W. Caldwell, N. J.; Jack Rule Jr., Cedar Rapids, Iowa, and Claude King, Virginia Beach, Va., were deadlocked at 144.
