

Panthers, 'Pokes, Buffs take IC grid losses

4 TD's in 2nd half

Baker explodes to top Prineville 33-6

BAKER — A Prineville boohoo on the kickoff commencing the second half gave the hometown Baker High School gridders the break they needed here last night as the Bulldogs suddenly exploded for four touchdowns to run roughshod over the Cowboys, 33-6.

It was the second Intermountain Conference defeat for Coach Bud Dowling's 'Pokes against a tie and a lone victory.

Prineville, down 6-0 at the intermission but still judging the fracas as anybody's contest, came out with renewed fervor for the second half of action, determined to get the six beans back.

They weren't quite prepared for what happened, however. Prineville safety man, Bob Harris, let the descending kickoff slip from his grasp and a Baker Bulldog fell on the ball on the Prineville 3. On the next play from scrimmage, Duane Barton, a Bulldog junior halfback, put an end to Cowboy hopes when he shot into the end zone for Baker's second TD. Mike Gardner missed his conversion try.

'Pokes Crushed

With the second half barely underway, then, it was Baker 12-0 instead of the 6-0 of moments earlier. It proved to be the crushing blow for the Cowboys. Coach Dowling's 'Pokes just couldn't seem to come back off the floor.

It wasn't long before Baker grid battlers turned the contest into a rout. Mike Durgan, a hard-charging Bulldog quarterback, had scored an earlier Baker TD in the second quarter on a 28-yard rollout. This came after an interception of a Prineville aerial on the 'Poke 45. Barton, Baker's left half, had scampered 17 yards

on the previous play.

Following Prineville's debacle in the opening moments of the second half, the Cowboys received the kickoff but couldn't budge the pigskin. Bob Holton, 'Poke end, was forced to punt. Baker took over on the Bulldog 33. Baker made it back to the 25-yard stripe following a 15-yard penalty, and it appeared that the Bulldogs were through for that series of downs.

Durgan Goes Wild

Nothing could have been further from the truth. Boom... it happened again. Durgan, who had himself a field day before hometown fans, went wide with a pitch-or-keep option, kept the ball, raced through a gaping hole in the 'Poke wall and ran through the Prineville secondary all the way for another TD. The play covered 75 yards and had the visitors auster, 19-0. Gardner's boot split the uprights.

In the fourth quarter things continued much the same. It was not too long before Baker had the pigskin resting on the Prineville 22. Durgan then dropped back to pass and hit Fred Bell in the end zone. Gardner kicked the extra point, and Prineville was six feet under, 26-0.

Then it was Prineville's turn. The 'Pokes, never willing to concede a thing until the last marble is in the bag, got some wind in their sails when Robb Rush, a 150-pound halfback, returned the following kickoff all the way back to the Baker 48.

Cowboys Score

Dowling's charge, then came on with a blitzkrieg. Von Thompson, a quarterback turned full, ripped off right tackle for 16

yards to the Baker 32. Rush then picked up 15 more to the Baker 17, and the Bulldogs were reeling. Thompson battered the line to the 10, and two plays later Rush dove to paydirt from three yards out. It was the Cowboys' only TD of the evening. Dick Richardson's kick failed.

Score: Baker 26, Prineville 6. To add insult to injury, Baker couldn't let the final stanza go without another score. The Bulldogs took the ball on the 45 and commenced a ground attack. It was finally Larry Derrick, a substitute field general, who picked up the six points. He tallied the final TD on a keeper from the 10. Gardner's boot was true and Baker had the Bulldogs out in front by the final margin, 33-6.

Baker Line Good

How did Baker make such a shambles of Prineville? Wayne Lundy, Prineville's assistant coach, explained it this way. "We got out-played in the line, especially in the second half... that opening kickoff of the second half broke our back."

Dowling disclosed that Baker "took good advantage" of Cowboy bobbles. Baker displayed good speed, running the ball a great deal from "a crazy spread." "Interceptions and fumbles hurt us all through the game," Dowling added.

Prineville's sudden find two weeks ago, quarterback Jim Elliot, had a bad night. "Baker put the rush on and Elliot didn't have much time to throw," Lundy pointed out. "Without our passing attack working," he added, "we were in trouble."

World Series heroes Larry Sherry, Don Larsen may get transfer to bolster loop expansion

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Former World Series heroes Don Larsen and Larry Sherry were regarded today as among likely candidates to be served up to the straggling New York Mets and Houston Colts in a National League move to bolster the expansion teams.

National League president Warren Giles announced Friday night after a 2½-hour NL meeting that all of the top eight teams would make four players available to the Mets and Colts. The tailenders can choose one of the four in alternate bidding, with the Mets winning the first choice by the toss of the coin.

Names also reported to be included on the tentative list were third baseman Don Hoak and pitcher Ryne Duren of Philadelphia; pitchers Harvey Haddix and Elroy Face and shortstop Johnny Logan of the Pittsburgh Pirates; pitchers Bobby Shantz and Sam Jones of St. Louis; infielder Charlie Neal of Cincinnati, and pitchers Billy Pierce and Billy Hoelt of San Francisco.

Unofficial sources said either Larsen or Pierce was regarded as expendable by San Francisco in the player pool.

In effect, the plan — which stipulates players named must have been carried on rosters Aug. 31 and bring a price of \$30,000 each — assures the eight clubs participating of losing no more than one man. But it also provides these teams with an option to give up any of the four nominees to the

Mets and Colts. Paul Richards, Houston general manager who originally made the proposal to assist the 9th and 10th place teams, said the "spirit of this new plan is time, but what the quality will be remains to be seen. We'll only know that when we see the identity of the 32 players placed on the list."

Met general manager George Weiss also was cautious in his optimism.

American League officials took no action at all in a similar meeting to discuss the plight of their expansion teams, Washington and Los Angeles.

The NL players, in addition to Sherry of the Dodgers — 1959 World Series hero — and Larsen of the Giants (of 1956 perfect

OSU opponent Baylor has seven wins over the coast

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Baylor Bears, winners of seven of eight games against Pacific Coast football teams in the past, throw the aerial wizardry of quarterback Don Trull against Oregon State tonight.

Trull led the nation a year ago with 125 pass completions for 1,627 yards, but Oregon State coaches hope they can match him with junior Gordon Queen.

Queen has thrown six touchdown passes in his first two games this fall as a replacement for graduated Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker.

Neither team has been beaten this year. Baylor clipped Houston 27-0 in its opener last weekend, while Oregon State has demolished Utah 29-14 and Colorado 41-6. The rival coaches agree neither team has had a real test.

Beavers Favored

Odds-makers have installed Oregon State as a four-point favorite but most observers figure each team will score at least three times. The weather forecast is for showers, which may make the turf slippery.

Prospect of a wide-open battle is expected to draw about 25,000 fans to Multnomah Stadium. The Baylor club arrived here yesterday and held an afternoon workout at the stadium.

Oregon State's rather thin ranks in the line have been depleted by injuries to guard Warren Cole and end Doug McDougall. Cole is definitely out of tonight's game and McDougall may see limited action because of a sore shoulder.

Defensive Ace Out

But the most decisive loss could be that of defensive halfback Jim Sinyard, who was injured last weekend against Colorado. Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro figured the Beavers would need all the defensive experience they had to stop Trull.

Oregon State's only previous game against a Southwest Conference team resulted in a 15-14 win

over Texas Tech in 1959. Baylor's only loss to a Coast team was 17-8 to Southern California the same year.

Fourth - rated Grant squeaked past Roosevelt 28-26 at Roosevelt in Portland.

Grants Pass and North Salem, ranked fifth and sixth in the poll, also turned in wins. Grants Pass topped Albany 33-0 at Grants Pass and North Salem won over Klamath Falls 19-2 at Klamath Falls.

Seventh-rated Sunset fell before Hillsboro 13-0 at Beaverton. Parkrose, ranked eighth, downed Molalla 36-12 at Parkrose and Cottage Grove, rated 10th, got past North Bend 27-14 at North Bend.

Top-rated Roseburg meets North Eugene at Eugene tonight and Jefferson, ranked ninth, played Lincoln at Jefferson in Portland today.

Phoenix, the top - rated team in the Class A-2 poll, wallowed Rogue River 60-0 at Phoenix.

Cats give scare

Redmond falls to Bucks 33-7

PENDLETON — Coach Doc Savage's visiting Redmond Panthers gave their high-riding Pendleton hosts a momentary scare last night by scoring in the game's early moments, but later yielded to a powerful Buckaroo running attack, dropping their third tilt of the season, 33-7.

Fans will tell you it was the best effort yet by any team against Pendleton, save, possibly, The Dalles who was bombed 34-14. Pendleton for the first time this season found a defense that

proved too much for its passing attack. And at halftime the Bucks were barely out in front 13-7.

Moore Explodes

Redmond halfback Dennis Moore put his teammates on the scoreboard the second time Redmond had the pigskin. He lugged the leather off tackle and sprinted 60 yards to paydirt. Quarterback Jim Kauffman, subbing for injured Keith Birkhofer, drilled one through the uprights and Redmond had Pendleton 7-0.

It was short lived, however.

Pendleton came roaring back with the following kickoff. A series of ground assaults put the Bucks on Redmond's five yard line before Eric Larson shot off tackle into the end zone. Steve Corey's boot knotted the count at 7-all.

From that point on, it was the Buckaroos' ball game. Pendleton scored lone touchdowns in both the second and third frames before gaining two TD's in the final stanza.

Jones-to-Larson

A five-yard pass from High School All-American selector Dick Jones to Larson netted the first of them. It came after the Bucks had moved the ball deep into Panther territory from their own 20 yard line. Jack Baird's conversion try was wide.

Pendleton chalked up another six in the third period when Corey plunged over the gaping 'Cat wall from the four. His TD climaxed a 60-yard drive. This time Baird split the uprights and Pendleton was out front 20-7.

Were it the usual dazzling passing attack (Jones-to-Rackly) coupled with the lightning ground assault by Baird, the whole thing would have been easier to understand.

Buck Passing Off

It was an abnormal performance. Redmond, for the most part, put the kibosh on the Buck passing attack. Pendleton had to do it on the ground. They did it, but it wasn't shot through on the winged heels of Baird.

Panther fumbles yielded the final two TD's that came in the contest's final quarter. Both were gobbled up by alert Buck defenders and turned into tallies. Both of these, however, were scored through the air. Jones threw seven yards to Rackly, and later to Scott Requa from the 13. The last score came with about four minutes remaining in the game.

Two of the Panthers' three football bobbles proved costly. All three Redmond fumbles fell into Buck hands. Pendleton, in turn, lost the leather twice.

Cats Learn

"We learned a lot tonight," Savage said following the game. "We're going to go hard next week with our workouts." Savage did not single out any particular players for having turned in top performances.

Mike Roach proved to be the 'Cat workhorse. Moore exploded for that one run, but it was Roach who moved the ball. Jim Sterling got in the midst of things throughout the contest from his right guard position. Kauffman turned in a surprising game, subbing for Birkhofer.

A look at the statistics tells grid fans that the Bucks had real trouble with their passing (relatively). The Bucks were held to 57 yards passing during the first half and limited to 43 in the second.

Jones didn't have a good night. He had trouble finding his receivers open. Several aerials overshot the mark. He did complete 11 out of 20, however. Pendleton was thus forced to go with a running game more than usual.

It was the fourth straight victory for the Bucks this season.
