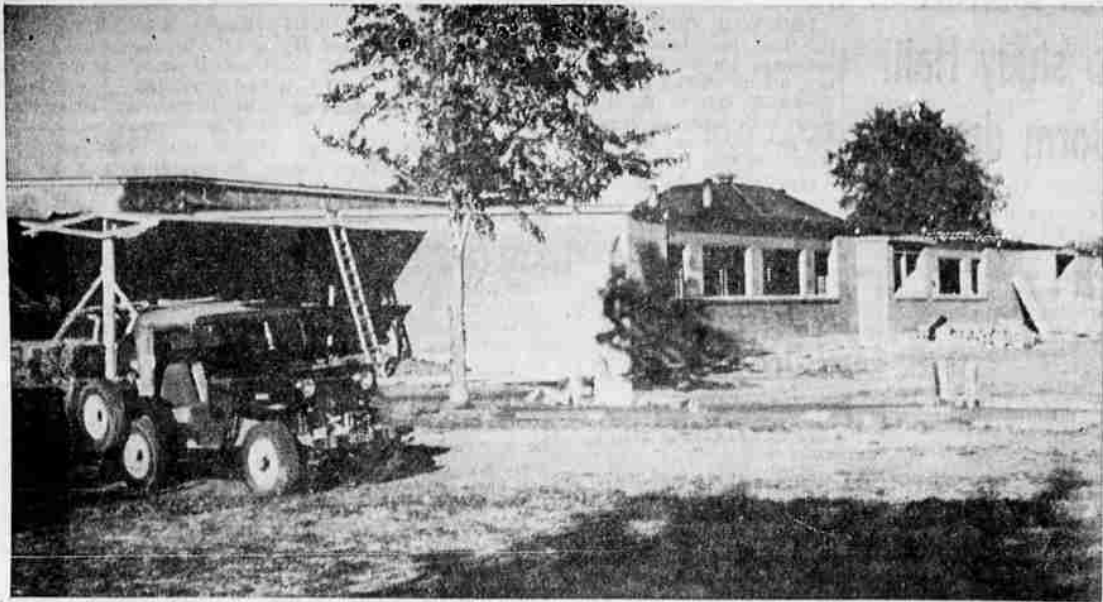

King sets up machinery for new demonstrations in Birmingham if desegregation demands not met

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. today began putting the machinery in motion to back up his threats of "bigger than ever" demonstrations if this city does not bow to Negro desegregation demands. Also scheduled for this afternoon was the trial of three white men arrested by police investigating racial bombings here. They were charged with the misdemeanor of illegal possession of dynamite.

King's "task force" which led some of the largest protests in Southern history here last spring planned a "non violent workshop" this afternoon and the Southern Integration leader was to address another mass rally tonight.

Started Demonstrations — The workshops and mass meetings were launching pads for the demonstrations last April and May in which King and more than 2,500 other persons were jailed in marches and sit-ins met by police with fire hoses and police dogs.

"If the conditions that brought on the dynamiting and the death of four beautiful little girls are not changed we will put on our walking shoes and demonstrate all over town," King said.

"Birmingham is the temple for segregation," he said. "We must turn on the temple."

Suits settled out of court

SPOKANE (UPI) — Suits totaling more than \$65,000 brought by two postal employees after a fatal train derailment in Northern Idaho have been settled out of court.

The suits had been brought by Millard D. Odgaard and George W. Lindelhof, Spokane, against the Northern Pacific Railway Co.

Both were hurt when the NP's Northeast Limited plunged into Granite Lake in March, 1962, killing two train crewmen.

Odgaard's suit was to have gone to trial in Federal District Court here Monday and Lindelhof's today.

Their attorney, Roland Wightman, declined to reveal the amount of the settlements but said both were "satisfactory."

Clux Klan backgrounds, and John Hall, 36, were to go on trial in city recorder's court on the dynamite charges.

Conviction for violation of the city ordinances could result in \$100 fines and 180 days in jail.

Elsewhere In The Nation — **Selma, Ala.**: More than 200 Negroes stood in line outside the Dallas County Courthouse to register to vote. An estimated 35 applications were received by registrars. A reporter - photographer and three photographers said they were roughed up by officers while attempting to take pictures at the courthouse.

Plaquemine, La.: Police used tear gas Monday to break up a protest march by about 400 Negro high school students. There were no injuries or arrests.

Orangeburg, S. C.: More than 100 Negroes were arrested Monday for defying a ban against racial demonstrations. The arrests boosted the number of such jailings to 1,448.

Oxford, Miss.: Following a year of racial turmoil on its campus, the University of Mississippi Monday reported its first enrollment decrease in more than a decade.

Greensboro, N. C.: An anti-segregation picketline was slated to be thrown up in front of a motel here today following a similar protest staged Monday night, the first such demonstration in the Gate City since June 6.

Tito nears end of his Mexico visit

MEXICO CITY (UPI) — Yugoslav President Tito, accompanied by President Adolfo Lopez Mateos, was flying today to the western provincial capital of Guadalajara, last official stop on his two-week visit to Mexico.

After two days in Guadalajara, Tito will go to the Pacific Coast resort of Acapulco for a week's vacation before flying to Washington.

Lopez had not been scheduled to accompany Tito to Guadalajara, but a government spokesman announced Monday night that the Mexican president had decided to do so.

Tito stopped overnight in the southern provincial capital of Merida on his arrival in Mexico and then came on to Mexico City, where he has spent four days.

Before coming here, he visited Brazil, Chile and Bolivia and talked with Peruvian President Fernando Belaunde Terry during an hour's stopover in Lima.

SOVIETS OFFER PLANT — **TEL AVIV, Israel (UPI)** — The Soviet Union has offered to set up a plant in Egypt to assemble MIG jet fighters, Israeli sources said here.

The plant was described as similar to one Russia offered India. A high-ranking Egyptian military delegation was to leave for Moscow soon to sign the contract, according to the sources.

Union rejects company offer

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Westinghouse Electric Corp. and the International Union of Electrical Workers (AFL-CIO) were scheduled to return to the bargaining table today following the union's rejection of the latest company contract offer.

The IUE Westinghouse conference board, representing 36,000 Westinghouse employees at 28 plants, criticized the firm's offer Monday as "totally inadequate" and "loaded with gimmicks."

At the same time, the board unanimously adopted a resolution urging locals to "take whatever action may be necessary to secure an adequate and satisfactory agreement."

Westinghouse offered a contract calling for a 14-cent hourly wage increase within 18 months. A spokesman for the firm said, "in an effort to reach a fair settlement without costly interruptions in our business we have held nothing back."

With the current three-year contract set to expire at midnight, Oct. 14, conference Board Chairman Robert Nellis charged the company with seeking contract changes that would "reward Westinghouse employees for their increased productivity by stripping them of their job security."

Nellis said the two sides would get together at 2 p.m. today and would continue to meet, as far as the union was concerned, whenever the company's schedule permitted.

The next conference board session is set for Monday, the eve of the strike deadline.

Most of the firm's plants, including large facilities at East Pittsburgh, Sharon, and Fairmont, W. Va., are located in the east.

Ben Bella planning action against rebels

ALGIERS (UPI) — The Algerian government will move in the next few days to crush the Berber uprising in the Kabylie Mountains, President Ahmed Ben Bella announced in a speech at Bougie today.

"We will mobilize 100,000 Algerians if necessary in vigilance committees to smash this counter-revolution," he told a cheering crowd of thousands of persons at a stadium rally.

"The only sort of dialogue (Hocine) Ait Ahmed and (Col. Mohand Ou) El Hadj (leaders of the counter-revolution) understand is the dialogue of the machine gun," Ben Bella said.

Ben Bella spoke for 15 minutes and frequently was interrupted by the wild cheering of the crowd. He has said he will not use the Algerian army against the rebels and his speeches are believed part of a plan to put down the uprising by force of overwhelming popular political opinion.

"In the near future we will assume our responsibilities, all our responsibilities, in the face of the counter-revolution," he said.

"The government and the people unanimously will say 'no' to divisionists so as to allow the so-

cialist revolution to continue its impetus.

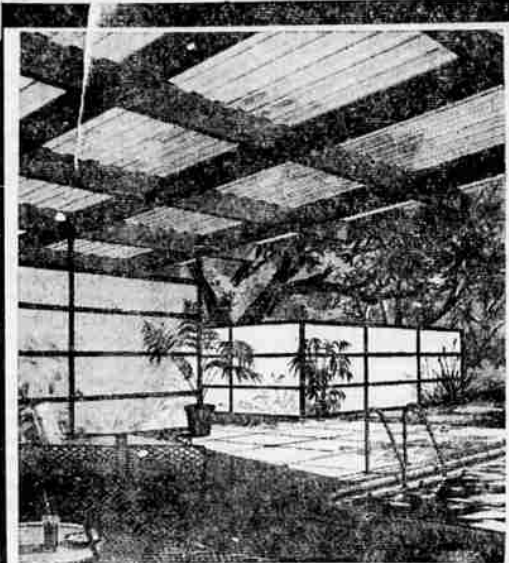
"We have proof that the revolution is linked with foreign plots. If necessary, we will mobilize 100,000 Algerians in vigilance committees to smash this counter-revolution."

Ben Bella said new and important sectors of the Algerian economy will be nationalized.

He said it was a time when

"our revolution is taking a decisive turn" — a reference to recently stepped-up nationalization measures, against which Ait Ahmed and El Hadj launched their counter-movement.

"El Hadj had a personal axe to grind," Ben Bella declared, "because he held important shares in a big Algiers cafe that recently came under nationalization."



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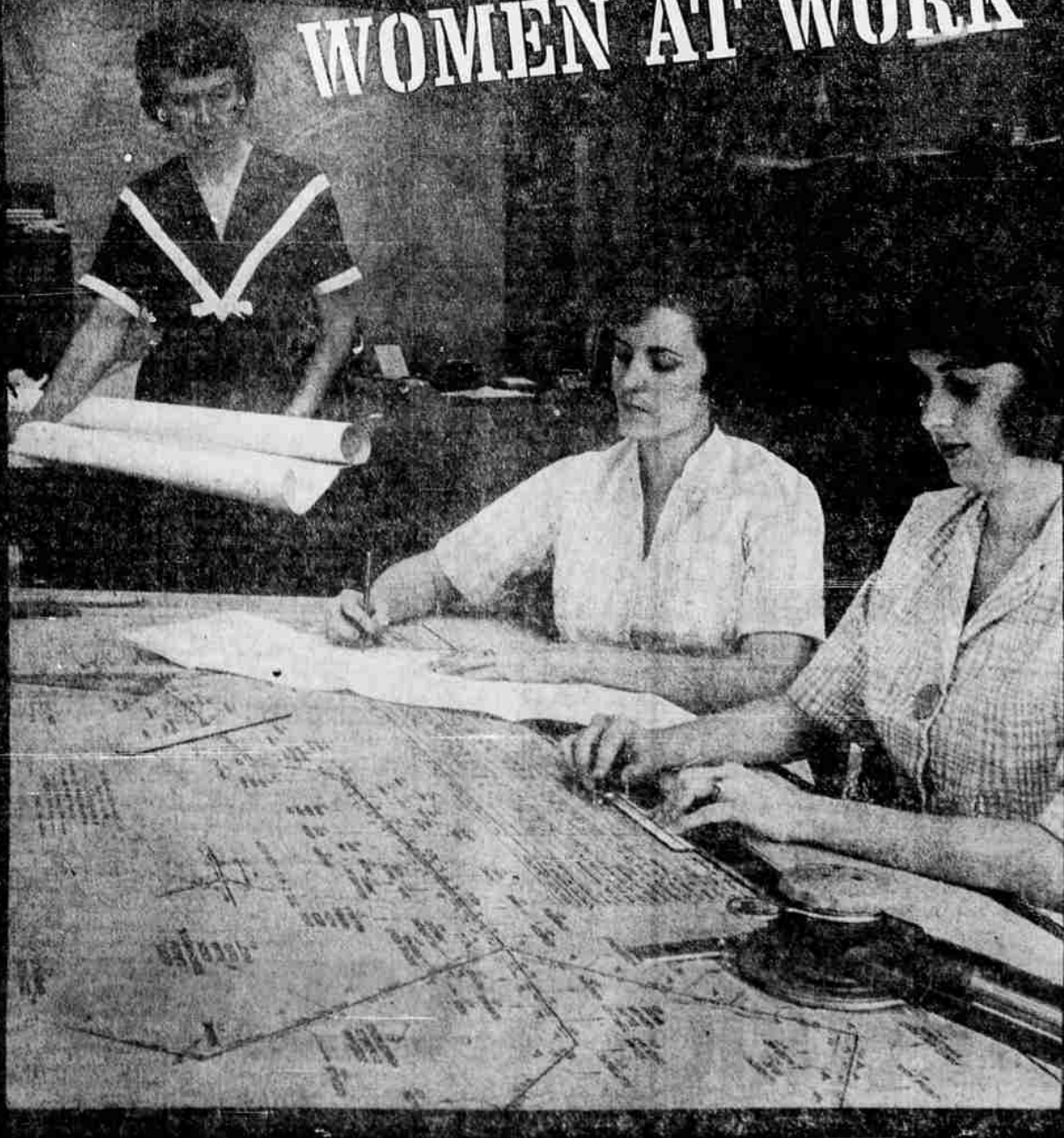
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
