

National League will never be the same about Yanks

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The National League is so cocky today over the manner in which the Dodgers walloped the Yankees four straight in the World Series that things threaten never to be the same in their regard for the silenced Bombers or the American League.

The boasting has become so arrogant in "El Pueblo de Nuestra Señora la Reina de los Angeles de Porciuncula" — the original full name of the City of the

Angels — that it's almost as if the cockiness of a fellow who picked them to win in one game. These Dodgers are so high that they have a scheme afoot for selling season tickets to the World Series.

It was only last Friday that the National League came up with a plan allegedly designed to aid the lowly New York Mets and the Houston Colt .45's, who fire more than their share of blanks. Each of the other teams are to put up four players and the two have-nots will paw over the merchan-

dis New York's Mayor's Trophy game and held it possible that "over the full season they probably would have won the American League pennant." That's sublimely ridiculous and would have to be taken with a ton or so of salt but illustrates how much higher is the National League than John Glenn ever thought of going.

Sandy Koufax won the car awarded annually to the series top star, Ralph Terry, who copped it last year when the

Yankees somehow beat the Giants, watched as the names of past winners were flashed on the scoreboard. He was able to chuckle when it said "Mazeroski — Pittsburgh — 1960." Terry was the victim that year of a Mazeroski home run which won the final game.

Terry Got Even

"I put him into the driver's seat and he didn't even offer me a ride," said Terry. "I got even later. I was speaking in Pittsburgh and he was attending the

dinner so I said he wasn't the only .250 hitter I had made famous. He came to me later and told me not to make him look so bad, that he was really a .260 hitter."

However, Terry and the other Yankees won't be doing much speaking this winter. The stenographer tones you hear will be those of National Leaguers extolling their league's magnificence. Here are a couple of early samples.

"The Yanks would be lucky to

finish fourth in the National League against our kind of pitching."

"We played the series perfectly. Take that leaping one-handed catch by Frank Howard on Mickey Mantle's drive in the second game at Yankee Stadium. Why, a fellow who is only six feet, six inches tall would have missed it."

Howard is six feet, eight. That makes him the smallest man in the National League as of the moment.

Okla. retains UPI poll 1st; USC rated 9th

NEW YORK (UPI)—Oklahoma maintained its grip on first place and Texas vaulted past Alabama into second spot among the nation's major collegiate football powers today in the weekly ratings of the United Press International board of coaches.

The Longhorns' advance suddenly made their meeting with the Sooners this Saturday at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas a clash between the two top rated college teams in the nation.

Penn State was the only newcomer to the first 10 in the major college list, jumping from 13th to eighth with a 28-7 victory over Rice.

Pittsburgh, Navy and Ohio State also moved up inside the top 10 while upset victims Northwestern and Georgia Tech tumbled to the second ten. The Panthers jumped from eighth to fourth, Navy from sixth to fifth and Ohio State from a 10th place tie to seventh.

Wisconsin Held Position

Wisconsin, idle last week, held its No. 5 position, Southern California remained No. 9 and Nebraska, tied with the Buckeyes for 10th last week, took over sole possession to complete the 10 elite.

The Sooners, idle last week after their upset of defending national champion Southern California two weeks ago, will be healthy and rested for college football's biggest game of the young season Saturday. They received 21 of the 35 first place votes and totaled 32 points.

Texas trounced Oklahoma State 34-7 to gain the nod over Alabama by the 35-man board of coaches, although the Crimson Tide received seven first place votes to only two for the Longhorns. "Bama defeated outclassed Vanderbilt, 21-6, but was un-

impressive.

Amazing Roger Staubach navigated Navy up a notch with a 26-13 win over Michigan and received one first place vote. Pitt garnered two first place ballots and Ohio State the other.

Texas was a distant second in the 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 point distribution for votes from first to 10th places, totalling 257. Alabama had 251 points, Pitt 165 and Wisconsin 151.

Illinois, Arkansas, Oregon and Kansas broke into the top 20 for the first time this season. Mississippi headed the second 10 for the second week followed by the Illini, upset winners over Northwestern, Duke, Georgia Tech, Northwestern, Oregon State, Arkansas and Missouri. Oregon and Kansas tied for 19th.

Ohio State, No. 7, meets 12th-ranked Illinois this weekend in the only other pairing of top 20 teams.

A surprising 8-man grid aggregation at Dufur, a tiny community in Wasco County, has emerged as the top prep grid squad in the Deschutes League this weekend, when wins and losses were computed to form loop standings.

Sisters, a perennial favorite, took it on the chin from the Dufurmen last Friday afternoon, putting the Outlaws' title chances behind the eight ball. It was the first time in 13 years that Dufur had beaten Sisters.

Sisters Coach Gene McDonald attributes the Dufur rise to power to the school's new coach. The new mentor, unnamed, has the material to work with, too. "They have good speed and a tremendous passing attack," McDonald said.

Culver, the other Central Oregon team in the loop, is almost out of the title picture with a loss and a tie. Cascade Locks holds the key to the situation, having yet to play Dufur.

Dufur will probably win the loop unless the Columbia River crew can get to them. Wheeler County (Fossil) apparently will bring up the rear. Arlington has played only one game and lost it. In spite of the loss, the Gilliam County crew is not entirely out of the title picture with most of its league games lying ahead.

Bend has fallen and The Dalles has ascended to make it a three-way deadlock for fourth with Mac Hi of Milton - Freewater. The teams each have two wins and two losses. The Dalles, apparently, is on its way with the Indians' two losses being the sea-

son opener against Baker and almighty Pendleton. The Dalles annihilated La Grande 47-0 Friday night after thumping highly-regarded Hermiston the weekend before. Pool attendance lowest in 10 years

Low temperatures and an abundance of cloudy days held daily attendance figures to the lowest recorded in ten years at the Bend municipal swimming pool this past summer.

The pool hosted a daily average of only 305 swimmers during the

three months and one day it was open. Highest daily attendance average was recorded in 1953 when 519 persons daily entered the pool. Total pool attendance in 1963 was 24,015, or 5,976 below the 29,991 figure listed in 1953.

Total income derived from pool admissions was \$5,394.90. This in-

cluded revenue from daily admissions, coupon book admissions, private and semi-private lessons and from suit and towel rental. The private and semi-private swimming lessons, inaugurated for the first time this year, raised total revenues over last year's \$5,776.60 figure.

Stanford leads in offense total

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Stanford, which has won only one game this season, leads the Big Six in total offense and rushing offense, according to statistics released today.

The Indians have averaged 287 yards per game on offense; and of these, they have picked up 192 rushing.

Southern California is tops in total defense, allowing an average of 220 yards per tilt; and in passing defense, allowing only 27 yards a game.

Washington State has the best rushing defense, allowing 126 yards; and Cal leads the passing offense with 129 yards per game.

49'ers to make one major change

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Coach Jack Christiansen of the San Francisco Forty Niners said today that there will be "at least one change" in the offensive backfield Sunday when the winless Prospects call on Baltimore.

One change could take place at tight halfback since Don Lisbon, a bright spot so far in the team's dismal season, pulled a hamstring muscle in the second quarter last Sunday at Detroit. It will not be known until Thursday if he'll be able to go against the Colts.

Another change could take

place at quarterback, where Bobby Waters had a rough day last Sunday.

Christiansen says that he will look at Waters and Lamar McHan in practice this week and start whoever looks better.

There was little question the offense needed shaking up after it piled up 61 yards total offense and minus 10 yards passing last Sunday. Both were all-time team lows.

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
