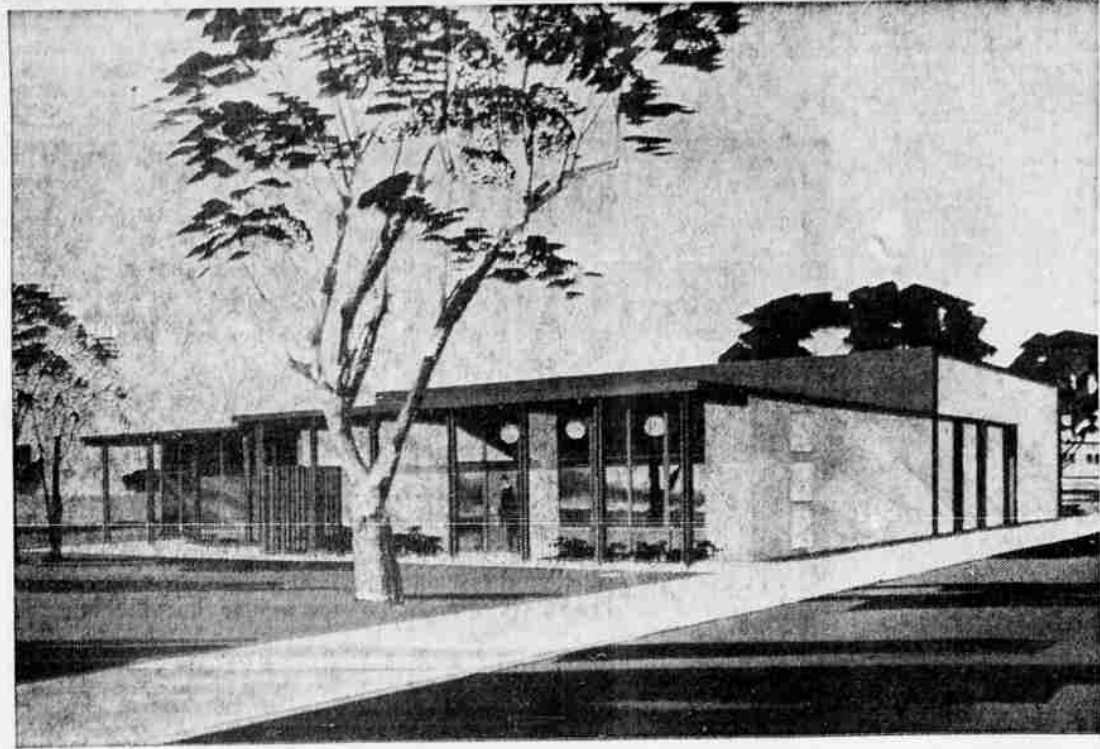

Prineville Elks set alterations

PRINEVILLE — The home of the Prineville Elks is to be enlarged, altered and modernized, with bids for the project to be received on November 19 at 2 p.m., at the office of J. F. Bodie, attorney in Prineville.

Specifications and blueprints may be obtained at Bodie's office on or after October 10. The building will have resilient flooring over slab on grade, walls of concrete block or wood frame. The ceiling construction will be basically glue-lam beams, decking and acoustical tile with a built-up roof.

Exterior of the building will be finished with resawn cedar vertical siding. There will be considerable electrical work, extension and enlargement of the plumbing facilities, as well as an additional new heating plant.

It is planned to have construction underway by Jan. 20, 1964. Bear, McNeil, Schneider, Bloodworth & Haves are architects in charge of the project.

The addition will hold approximately 32 by 80 feet. Present clubroom facilities are to be completely remodeled.

J. E. Garrett is chairman of the building committee for the lodge, No. 1814.

Panel planned on referendum

PRINEVILLE — A panel of experts will seek to clarify the issues at stake in the tax referendum of October 15, during the Chamber of Commerce luncheon on the previous day, at the Ochoco Inn.

Members of the discussion panel will be Senator Boyd Overhulse, Representative Kessler Cannon, and Mrs. Samuel Johnson, member of the State Board of Higher Education.

The panel is expected to cover such information as the outline of the bill itself, the effect if the bill is not passed and alternate action that can be taken if the bill is defeated.

R. P. McBae, president of the chamber, has invited the general public to the luncheon because of the importance of the issue at stake in Tuesday's election, he states. A question period will be allowed at the end of the panel discussion and personal statements of opinion will also be allowed, McBae said.

Highlights of Kennedy press meet given

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Highlights of President Kennedy's news conference Wednesday:

Wheat — He announced approval of a "one shot" \$250 million wheat sale to the Soviet Union. He said the sale would improve the U.S. balance of payments deficit, improve the economic outlook for the nation's farmers, provide additional earnings for the United States because the wheat must be carried in American ships when available, and cut the nation's whopping surplus wheat stocks.

Viet Nam — He vigorously defended the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) against charges that it had followed an independent policy in South Viet Nam.

Politics — He believes Sen. Barry M. Goldwater of Arizona could be the Republican presidential nominee in 1964 but that Goldwater faces a "trying seven or eight months." He dodged a question about when he himself will declare for re-election.

Latin America — He reaffirmed the United States strong opposition to military takeovers in Latin America calling them "self-defeating" and an aid to the Communists. He said he believed the administration had done all it could to prevent coups that overthrow the governments of the Dominican Republic and Honduras recently.

Space — He said he had received no indication from the Russians that they are ready to cooperate in a joint moon expedition, and added that such cooperation would not be possible unless "barriers of suspicion" are lowered.
