MADRAS — An earlier date for its annual fund drive and addition of Channel 8 to stations being rebroadcast by the Jefferson County Television, Inc., to viewers in the Madras and Culver areas was announced this week by spokesmen for the corporation.

Users of the service are asked to contribute \$10 to provide operational funds for the service in the coming year.

It was announced that the corporation has accepted a bid for installation of equipment to broadcast Channel 8 and construction is expected to start in about a month as soon as the Federal Communications Commission approves an application for a permit to add the third channel. The service already broadcasts Channels 6 and 12 from Portland.

Weariness hampers Mme. Nhu's attempt to woo American opinion

NEW YORK (UPI) — Weariness seems to be hampering Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu's three-week campaign to woo American public opinion, but the first lady of South Vietnam scheduled a talk at Fordham University today and two television appearances.

The petite Mme. Nhu, sister-in-law of South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem, was exhausted Thursday night on returning from a talk at Sarah Lawrence College for Women in Bronxville, N. Y.

Dr. Lawrence Alpert, a physician, was summoned to her suite at the Hotel Barclay here and gave her sedation. The doctor said she was suffering from "exhaustion," but would be able to carry on her speaking schedule.

In appearances Thursday, her third day in this country, Mme. Nhu repeated assurances made previously about the regime of her brother-in-law and the Buddhist opposition that is rocking his Roman Catholic administration in Saigon.

Tiredness delayed the talk at Sarah Lawrence, but she recovered her energy to appear before a group of students and faculty members and assure them that "America is backing Viet Nam because it is the last bastion against Communism."

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Program given on winter plants

Forcing of the traditionally spring-flowering bulbs, for winter blooms indoors, was demonstrated at a meeting of the Mirror Pond Garden Club Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. David Wilson, chairman, directed the planting of narcissus and hyacinth bulbs which she had ordered previously from Holland. The members brought their own containers. On top of a layer of stones and charcoal, the soil was placed loosely in the pots. The narcissus were placed close together and all bulbs were buried about three-fourths of their depth.

The rules for planting stated that bulbs should be started early and kept in a cool, dark place, about 40 degrees, until the root system has developed well. Then they may be put in a slightly warmer place until growth starts.

Later they may be given more heat, a temperature of 55 to 60 degrees being warm enough. If too warm the stems and leaves grow tall and weak. The soil should be kept moist but never wet. A profusion of blooms is anticipated by the middle of December.

Khrushchev salutes signing of test treaty

MOSCOW (UPI) — Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev has saluted the signing of the nuclear test ban treaty and called for solving "other ripe international issues."

He implied that one solution would be the withdrawal of Western troops from Berlin.

Khrushchev's comments came in a special message, released here Thursday night, to President Kennedy and British prime minister Harold Macmillan. Observers noted it was released at almost the same time Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko was meeting with President Kennedy in Washington.

The message also came while Soviet officers were holding up an American army troop convoy for 15 hours on the East German autobahn between West Germany and West Berlin. It was the longest delay of this nature since the Communists built the Berlin wall.

Khrushchev called for the "liquidation of the vestiges of the Second World War." This is the phrase usually used by the Russian when they attack the continued Western troops presence in West Berlin.

The Soviets claim that East Germany is sovereign and that the West no longer has occupation rights in West Berlin, located 110 miles behind the East German frontier.

Khrushchev's message was sent from somewhere in the Soviet Union. He was last reported on an extensive farm tour he began after critical harvest reports.

Khrushchev said the test ban pact, which went into effect

Thursday, could lead to other East-West agreements.

"The agreement on banning experimental nuclear explosions, important as it is for the people, does not solve itself the main in international problem of our epoch — does not eliminate danger," he said.

"Now it is necessary, and our governments proclaimed themselves in favor of it, to develop the success achieved still further to look for the settlement of other ripe international issues," he said.
