Police report busy month

PRINEVILLE — Prineville's police department reports 37 arrests made during September, including 15 county prisoners lodged. Eight of the arrests were for drunkenness and six for driving while intoxicated, according to police chief Mike Thompson.

The department lists 51 complaints and investigations made, including nine for larceny of articles valued at less than \$75. One burglary was reported and cleared, two collisions were reported and 28 traffic citations were issued.

The number of juvenile citations soared to 17 during the month as compared to five or six juvenile problems listed during most months. Of the juveniles who encountered the law, six were cited for possession of beer, four for curfew violation, three for shoplifting, three for malicious mischief and one for the lack of an operator's license.

Police issued 318 parking tickets and referred 168 calls to the state police or sheriff's office.

Access road plans lauded
PORTLAND (UPI) — An access road which will open up a 14-mile area along the lower Deschutes River is "the first breakthrough in one of the state's knottiest access problems in 30 years," a Bureau of Land Management official said Thursday.

A survey crew now is staking out the road in Wasco and Sherman counties. The government recently appropriated \$296,000 for its construction.

Robert E. Wilbur told the Westmoreland Chapter of the Izaak Walton League that private clubs and individuals have kept 60 miles of the lower Deschutes bottled up for the last 30 years.

Wilbur warned that serious access problems remain to be solved along the river, however.
