'Copter crash claims six

NEW YORK (UPI) — A New York Airways helicopter crashed and burned on takeoff at Idlewild Airport Monday, killing six persons, police reported. Police said four passengers and two crewmen on the 25-seat twin-blade craft were killed.

The Federal Aviation Agency control tower at the airport said the helicopter, a Boeing Vertol 107, crashed at 12:33 p.m. EDT while taking off. The helicopter was barely off the ground when it plunged to earth, eyewitnesses said.

Firemen quickly extinguished the blaze, and the bodies were removed to an open area. The area was strewn with wreckage. A large number of airlines' employees quickly raced to the scene, a section of the sprawling airport between the cargo area and several domestic passenger terminals.

Development plans discussed

Special to The Bulletin PRINEVILLE — The relationship of this community with other cities of the state and with visitors from other states has been of primary concern to several community leaders in recent days.

R. P. McRae, president, and Ivan Chappell, manager, Chamber of Commerce, have met with representatives of other communities, in Portland, to discuss plans to encourage interested California industry to consider Oregon in industrial expansion.

These plans were discussed with the State Planning and Development department. It was agreed that volunteer teams would be established. Chappell reports, to follow up on leads furnished by the state board. A number of communities are expected to join in efforts to develop more industry in the state, Chappell said.

Jim Carder, of the Chamber's industrial committee, reported in committee session that he had called at the headquarters of the Oregon Motor Association, Portland, to discover why Prineville has been excluded from strip listings, and why no recent writup on Prineville has been used by the OMA.

Carder stated that he was invited to furnish an up-to-date summary of the community, and that inspection of local facilities will be made by the OMA before the next printing of their information material distributed to motorists.

Nielsen urges support for Bend Skyliner group

Bend's mayor E. L. Nielsen has called on residents of the community to give full support to the Skyliners in several events planned for the near future.

The request was made in the form of a proclamation, urging support that will react in the furtherance of the Bachelor Butte recreation area and the Skyliners in their varied activities.

The proclamation urges support of a Skyliner ski movie on October 19 at the Bend Senior High School gymnasium. This is Warren Miller's "The Sound of Skiing."

Support of Skyliner membership is also sought, with that campaign to open on October 23.

Mayor Nielsen also asks support of various programs sponsored by the Skyliners, such as junior racing, the Mighty Mite training, the Skyliners' ski school and mountaineering.

Finally, the proclamation urges support of the Skyliner's third annual rummage sale on October 26 at the former City Drug Building, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Land bank sets record dividend

SPOKANE (UPI) — About 23,500 Northwest farmers and stockmen will share in a record dividend declared by the Federal Land Bank of Spokane. The 6 per cent dividend will go to 61 farmer-owned federal land bank associations in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, who in turn will pay most of it to their members.

Last year the bank declared a 5 per cent dividend totaling \$740,000, this year's payments will total about \$1 million, according to president Fred A. Knutsen.

King denounces city's rejection of Negro pleas

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Negro leader Martin Luther King Jr., bitterly denouncing the city's rejection of his desegregation demands, threatened Monday night to lead demonstrations of "more numbers than any man can count."

"We will demonstrate until they integrate," he told a rally of more than 1,000 Negroes. But he did not say when such segregation protests, which brought around 2,500 arrests last spring, would begin.

King spoke several hours after Mayor Albert Boutwell said that solution of the city's racial problems "will never be done in response to threats or deadlines from anyone." Boutwell referred to a demand by King that the city hire 25 Negro policemen within a two-week period ending next Monday or face new racial demonstrations.

Boutwell's executive assistant, W. C. Hamilton, said civil service regulations requiring a six-week clearance check for new employees would make it "impossible" to meet King's deadline without an act of the legislature.

Boutwell said an "intensive and completely impartial survey" was being made to determine the best kind of police force for Birmingham and he would not permit "other interests to intervene or defeat" that study.

Other racial developments: Clinton, La.: A Louisiana court Monday issued a warrant for the arrest of James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) for leading racial demonstrations. Farmer failed to show up for a hearing Monday against Negroes charged with violating a restraining order against picketing white merchants.

Gastonia, N.C.: Several hundred Negroes picketed two segregated movie houses Monday night without incident. It was the second consecutive evening of picketing.

Tallahassee, Fla.: A group of white Florida State University students carrying "Ban the Ban" placards picketed an official campaign hangout Monday to protest its refusal to serve Negroes.

Jacksonville, Fla.: A hearing was scheduled in U.S. District Court Wednesday on a suit to enjoin St. Augustine city officials from interfering with anti-segregation demonstrations.

New York: The Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) said it would stage demonstrations today when five demonstrators jailed five days ago are released. The five had been arrested in demonstrations protesting alleged discrimination in union hiring practices at the Rutgers housing project in Manhattan.

Birmingham: Gov. George C. Wallace denied in a television address Monday night that Birmingham is experiencing economic setbacks because of racial troubles.

Jackson, Miss.: The Mississippi Supreme Court Monday was asked to uphold a lower court order saying that Byron De La Beckwith, accused of slaying of civil rights worker Medgar Evers, is not required to have a mental examination.

New seal trade ship in service

SEATTLE (UPI) — A converted Army refrigerator ship, the FSR-791, arrived here Monday from Camden, N.J., to replace the MV Penguin as the vessel serving the Pribilof Islands' fur seal trade.

The ship will haul millions of dollars worth of prime pelts from the Bering Sea's St. Paul and St. George Islands.

U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries officials estimated that \$7 million worth of pelts were awaiting shipment south at the present time. Hunters took 85,000 pelts this year. Of these 43,000 were young bachelor seals and 42,000 were immature females and cows. Prime male and female pelts in the last year have sold for as much as \$125 a pelt.

The 791 not only will return the pelts here but also will carry supplies to the islands. She is 210 feet in length and has a cargo capacity of 1,200 tons. She is on loan to the bureau from the Army.

The Penguin, which broke down last winter, had only a 500-ton capacity.

C. Howard Baltzo, director of the bureau's marine mammals resources program, said the Army vessel might bring back seal carcasses for mink food as well as pelts. The carcasses now are waste.

Oregon claims spruce record

EUGENE (UPI) — A forester of the Willamette National Forest says Oregon can claim the nation's largest Englemann spruce, an honor which has long belonged to Idaho.

Marston Kuehne said the tree was found in the Bruno Meadows in the Detroit Ranger District. It stands 140 feet high, has a circumference of 20 feet, 7 inches; and a crown diameter of 34 feet, a measurement of the limb spread.

Kuehne said the tree is larger than Idaho's giant spruce in the Cache National Forest.
