Currently resting on my desk are two excellent, handy little booklets which, no doubt, will get used and re-used.

Number one booklet bears the crest of the city of Innsbruck, Austria, and is entitled "IX Olympic Winter Games."

Special Meaning

1964's U.S. Olympic team has special meaning to us in Central Oregon. Coach Bob Beattie had his Olympians quartered at Elk Lake this summer for summer training on the high, permanent snow field on Bachelor Butte.

Among the Olympians was Jean Sautberg of Lakeview. Jean call her a local product.

So, then, the 1964 Olympics have a double meaning... mid-Oregon ski fans will be watching the fortunes of the U.S. team with a very special interest.

Football Book

For the football fans, there exists on the free market a book that contains just about everything the avid fan could want in a single package.

Compiled and edited by the United Press International, this booklet is sponsored by the Equitable Savings & Loan Assn. Grid features in this information-packed handbook include, pro and college bowl game recaps; a pro and college schedules; a 1963 forecast; and a special about enjoying TV football.

Not only does it have these features, but it has many tidbits. A complete schedule for colleges (both large and well-

known small ones) awaits the fan's scrutiny. Accompanying the 1963 sked is the game score from the year before between the two schools.

Good Ol' Susquehanna For instance, suppose you want to know about a relatively insignificant (to us in the West) grid team from the East... say... like Susquehanna.

On October 26, the booklet says, the Suskies face Trinity of Connecticut. Last year Susquehanna won the title 20-16, and finished out the season with a 9-0 win-loss record.

Some of the small college dynamos of certain local areas, however, are omitted because they are not nationally known. The Pacific Northwest edition, then, to fill this void, has included some on the inside front and back covers.

Take the College of Idaho, where so many mid-Oregonians lately have played and are still playing their college careers. The book tells you that this weekend, the Coyotes are playing Eastern Washington State at Cheney.

Perhaps the most interesting feature to connoisseurs of the rock 'em sock 'em sport, however, is a very special stuffing at the end called college football's greatest moments. There are 10 of them. The third one on the list tells of the first use of the forward pass. It reads, "Nov. 1, 1913—Gus Dorais and Knute Rockne revolutionized football by making the first effective use of the forward pass as Notre Dame, then a small Indiana college, upset Army 35-13. Dorais completed 13 of 17 passes, most of them to Rockne."

A tenth entry reads, "Nov. 16, 1957—Oklahoma's proud 47-game winning streak was broken by Notre Dame when Dick Lynch ran for a touchdown that gave the Irish a 7-0 victory."

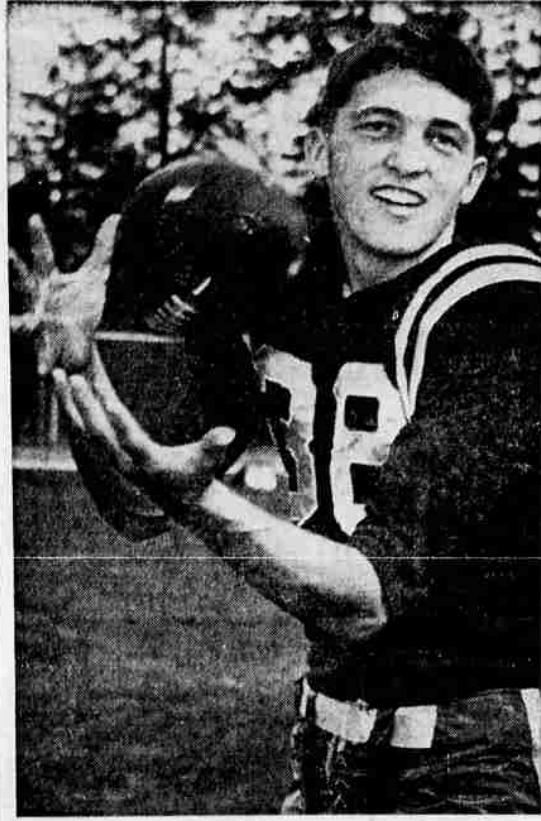
It's got it all, capsule-wise.

Seals batter Blades, new Denver whips Vancouver in WHL action

The defending champion San Francisco Seals seem to be taking up where they left off last year in the Western Hockey League—but newcomer Denver is hanging in tough.

Both teams scored victories on enemy ice Tuesday night to move to the top of the standings in the young season. San Francisco downed Los Angeles, 5-2, and Denver defeated Vancouver, 5-3.

Pete Panagabko got the Seals off on the right foot with a 15-foot shot in the first period. Duke Edmundson and Nick Mickoski each scored in the second, and Jenn-Mark Picard and Al Nicholson hit in the third.

Camile Bedard, purchased by Los Angeles from the Seals last week, scored both goals for the Blades. He fired a 45-foot screen shot in the first period and hit again in the third.

The game was delayed 10 minutes when Frank Arnett of the Blades and Charlie Burns of the Seals tangled, and Edmundson joined in to make it a free-for-all.

Denver, a new entry in the WHL, jumped to a 3-2 lead in the first period and split a brace of goals with the Canucks in the middle frame.

Denver scorers were Fred Hucul, Dick Lamoreaux, John Fleaver, Steve Witruk and Rudy Migay. Buddy Boone had a pair of Vancouver's and Jim Baird scored once for the Canucks.

In tonight's only game, Denver plays at Portland.

Basketball practice begins at Oregon's 3 universities

Basketball practice began yesterday at Oregon's three major universities.

At Oregon State, coach Slats Gill began his 36th year as head coach by greeting six lettermen from the team that finished fourth in the nation after winning the Western regional championship last spring.

Heading the list was 7-foot center Mel Counts, the Beavers' leading scorer last year. Other returnees are Rex Benner, Jim Kraus, Frank Peters, Jim Jarvis and Lynn Baxter.

California junior college transfers Terry Dreisewered, 6-5, from Mt. San Antonio and John Chamber, 6-2, from Antelope Valley make their OSU debuts, along with sophomores Rich Whelan, Larry Enos, Dave Fox and Scott Eaton.

At Oregon, coach Steve Belko has forwards Steve Jones, Jim Johnson and Larry Cooley and guards Elliott Gleason and Bob Yates back from last year's team.

He is faced with the problem of finding a center to replace the graduated Glenn Moore. Sophs Gene Brockmeyer or Lew Patterson, each 6-9, are under consideration.

Other members of a large sophomore crop are forwards John Franz, Ed Vetter and Bill Jennings and guards Wally Palmberg, Don Dushane, Rich Potter, Dave Kufoury and Jim Moyer. Also on hand is Gary Powell, a transfer from Pacific, and non-letterman Pat Loy, both guards.

Coach Al Negretti greeted what is potentially one of the strongest teams in University of Portland history.

He has seven lettermen, seven sophomore prospects, and two promising junior college transfers. The lettermen are led by 6-8 Steve Anstett and 6-6 Cincy Powell, and include Tom Nichols, Jim Dorch, Dave Cooper, Dennis Channing and Kent Soldan.
