

Demonstrators throw eggs, rocks as Mme. Nhu arrives for address at Princeton

PRINCETON, N.J. (UPI)—Angry demonstrators hissed, booed and threw ice cream cartons filled with eggs and rocks Tuesday night when Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu arrived at Princeton University to speak out for her brother-in-law's regime in South Vietnam.

But the fiery little woman wearing an ankle-length gold ao-dai, a native garment, retained her poise as she alighted from a car for an address to a student debating society.

Several of the cartons struck the auto but did not hit Mme. Nhu or her 18-year-old daughter, Le Thuy, who was riding with her.

Later, when she arrived in Washington, D.C., she called the demonstration "unworthy of human beings."

Buddhists Picketed Hall

Five American Buddhist monks, wearing scarlet and orange robes, picketed outside Alexander Hall where Mme. Nhu delivered a 10-minute speech to the Whig-Glossophic Society.

The audience alternately cheered and booed during the speech and the 40-minute question and answer period that followed.

She said that Buddhist monks who have burned themselves to death to protest the policies of her brother-in-law, South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem, were "victims of excitement."

Her family has been criticized repeatedly for its alleged persecution of Buddhists. Mme. Nhu has claimed the religious demonstrations were Communist-inspired.

The audience cheered the loudest when one questioner asked what she thought of American college students and she replied: "I was young once myself."

Distorted By Press

Mme. Nhu told the students that her "declarations are still being distorted" by the American press.

She denied reports that she had called American soldiers helping the South Vietnamese in their battle against the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas.

West German Bundestag elects Ludwig Erhard as successor to Adenauer in 279 to 180 vote

BONN, Germany (UPI)—Ludwig Erhard, who as economics minister engineered West Germany's postwar boom, was elected the nation's second chancellor today to replace resigned Konrad Adenauer.

The Bundestag, lower house of parliament, voted, 279-180, in favor of Erhard.

The Christian Democratic Union which Adenauer and Erhard turned into the most powerful vote-getting machine in German history, voted for Erhard along with their coalition partners, the Free Democrats.

The opposition Social Democrats voted as a bloc against Erhard.

Speaker of Parliament Eugen Gerstenmaier turned to the stocky Erhard and said,

"I ask you, Member Erhard, do you accept the election?"

In a strong voice, Erhard replied, "I accept the election." A storm of applause swept the hall.

It was a far larger margin than Adenauer himself had received in his first election to the chancellorship. At that time, in 1949, it was his own single vote that put him in power.

Adenauer stepped down Tuesday at the age of 87 after 14 years and one month in office, but he promised he would continue to speak "often and well" from the back benches in Parliament, where he will represent the Bonn area as a Christian Democratic Deputy.

Erhard had the support of the Christian Democrats and their Free Democrat coalition allies.

The pudgy, cigar-smoking Erhard thus won the job he thought he should have had at least four years ago. But few observers believed he would hold onto it as long as Adenauer did.

The Socialists, headed by West Berlin Mayor Willy Brandt, hoped to end the "Erhard era" in two years' time when Brandt and Erhard will fight national elections.

Erhard has waited for this day for a long time. In 1959, Adenauer decided to stand for the presidency and let Erhard move into the chancellery. But the chancellor suddenly changed his mind, while Erhard was in Washington, and announced he would remain head of government. He said he doubted Erhard's ability to do the job.

In Washington, Erhard was furious. He was said to have stormed through the rooms of the German Embassy on R Street shouting that he was returning to Bonn immediately to force "Der Alte" to eat his words.

By the time he reached home however, Erhard had cooled off. After getting Adenauer to agree to a declaration that the economics minister was fit for high government office, he subsided.

After the 1961 election, Adenauer opponents in the coalition forced Adenauer to make a written promise to resign halfway through the four-year legislative period to give Erhard time to get settled into harness before the 1965 election.

Adenauer received tributes in Parliament Tuesday to his career, which saw West Germany rise from the ashes of total defeat to a place among the great nations of the world.

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Jackie feels better as she nears end of her vacation

MARRAKECH, Morocco (UPI)—Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy neared the end of her Mediterranean vacation today with her own diagnosis that "I feel better."

The Moroccan-Algerian border battles only 200 miles away apparently did not disturb the First Lady's visit or change her plans to stay here until Thursday morning and catch a commercial flight to Washington.

Mrs. Kennedy, recuperating from the death of her infant son, Patrick, two months ago, was scheduled to visit King Hassan II today.

Mrs. Kennedy went to a black-lie dinner party given in her honor by Hassan's brother, Moulay Abdullah, Tuesday night and summed up her two-week tour of Greece, Turkey and Morocco with the words, "I feel better."

She saw some Moroccan shooting Tuesday, but it was strictly peaceful—an exhibition

by 400 Berber tribesmen who staged a spectacle for her on grounds next to the king's palace.

The First Lady curled up on rugs in a desert tent while the Berber horsemen shot and shouted around her.

At one time a rider fell off his horse during a charge by 30 horsemen racing straight at Mrs. Kennedy. The riderless horse dashed toward her but stopped within a few yards as American Secret Servicemen jumped in front of the President's wife.

During the spectacle, Mrs. Kennedy sat on Moroccan wool rugs, sipping sweet mint tea from tiny golden glassware.

The spectacle ended when two snake charmers entered Mrs. Kennedy's tent and, to the exotic wall of the flute, wound cobras around their heads.

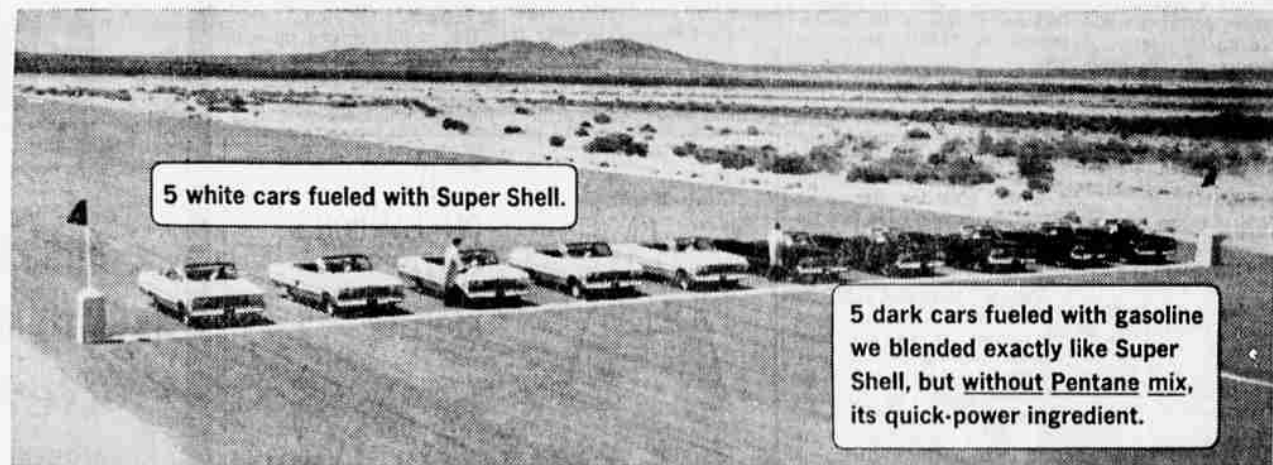
