IWA threatens Coos Bay tie-up

COOS BAY (UPI) — Local 3261 of the International Woodworkers of America and the Weyerhaeuser Company's Coos Bay branch met today under threat of a strike involving wages for boom crews.

The IWA has asked that boom crews required to work with power saws receive higher wages.

Kenneth Johnson, business agent for the local, said a three hour meeting Wednesday night produced "some progress."

He said the union demands include reimbursement of wages crews would have received since they were dismissed when the dispute broke out, and that wages be paid all union members suspended by the company Tuesday.

Johnson said if no settlement was reached there would "be no alternative but to act on the mandate of the membership and call a strike."

Howard Hunt, company branch manager, said workers who did not report for work Wednesday in order to attend a union meeting were suspended from jobs until Monday.

Hunt said about 20 per cent of the total work force was on the job today. The mill in North Bend had a full crew on Wednesday night.

The union said the suspensions were considered illegal lockouts.

Johnson indicated the dispute had been brewing for several weeks since woods boom crews were told to use power saws, but did not break out until last week.

Five of the orchestra members changed from white ties and tails to after-hour casuals, and showed up at the night club for a jam session. What they played, I understand, is progressive jazz.

The first progressive movement, after the music started, was of one group of patrons away from the table nearest the combo. One member of the party had a snare drum in her lap; another nearly got her hat knocked off by the trombone.

The pianist, Wayne Hearne, who plays a double bass in the symphony, established himself at the keys, cigar in mouth, spectacles balanced precariously on his nose. His brown hair, the forelocks bleached blond, bobbed up and down as he got in the groove.

Drummer Mike Mahaffey, from the symphony's percussion section, beat up a storm, mouth slack, eyes glazed.

Bearded James Smith, who is recognized as one of the leading exponents of both classical music and jazz, improvised on the trumpet. The performance was considerably different from his solo part in the concert.

Tom Corlett on the trombone and Jerry Magill from the bass section, playing the same instruments as in their longhair roles, completed the quintet.

Among orchestra members in the audience was Herman Jobleman, who occupies first chair (or would, if he sat down) in the bass section. He has played the bull fiddle at the Hoti night club in Portland, formerly Amato's, for the past 15 years.

In the course of the evening, some of the musicians ran the gamut from Tchaikovsky's Fourth Symphony to Chain Gang. You have to admit it. They're versatile.

PRINEVILLE — Oral bids for two million board feet of timber to be sold by the Ochoco National Forest as the Wildcat Sanitation Salvage sale, will be received November 12, at the Ochoco forest office, Prineville, according to C. L. Clark, forest supervisor.

The sale contains a million board feet each of ponderosa pine and Douglas fir and other species. Sale area covers some 1300 acres, and is located 20 miles east of Prineville, just north of Highway 26, Clark stated.

The minimum acceptable bids per thousand board feet are: pine at \$10.05; Douglas fir and other species, \$5.25.

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Court reverses Jones conviction

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon Supreme Court today reversed the second degree murder conviction in Portland of George Jones, and remanded the case back to Circuit Court for a new trial.

Jones was accused of stabbing a man to death in a Portland tavern. The question involved in the appeal was whether the trial court erred by instructing the jury that there was a conclusive presumption of an intent to kill from the deliberate use of a deadly weapon.

The Supreme Court suspended from the practice of law Portland attorney Alton John Bassett, who recently was convicted in Federal Court of income tax evasion.

Man dies from bullet wound

McMINNVILLE (UPI) — An autopsy Wednesday revealed that Herbert Gustav Rydell, 58, of Willamina died from a bullet from his hunting rifle.

He was at first believed to have died Tuesday as a result of a fall under a tractor. Authorities said Rydell's rifle apparently discharged and the bullet struck him in the knee and chest while he was crouched on the tracks of the tractor.
