

Gov. Hatfield calls lawmakers back Nov. 11

SALEM (UPI) — The Oregon legislature will meet in special session at noon on Veterans' Day, Nov. 11, to try to find a way out of the fiscal crisis caused by Tuesday's defeat of the \$60 million income tax measure.

Gov. Mark Hatfield announced the session Wednesday afternoon following a meeting with legislative leaders. He was expected to call it could be held to 10 days.

Hatfield said he would ask the legislature to give him authority to make cuts in basic school allotments and to approve a one-shot speedup of withholding tax collections to raise \$12 million.

No New Tax

He said he would not ask the legislature to adopt any new tax measures.

The bill defeated Tuesday, passed after a record 141-day session, would have hiked state income taxes by \$48 million. It also included the withholding speedup. The legislature's two-year budget was \$404 million.

Hatfield also announced he had ordered \$35 million in selective cuts in state services. He said \$10 million of the state's \$15.5 million capital construction program had been scrapped.

Hatfield said he would attempt to limit the severity of cuts in welfare services.

"I will not be a party to moving the aged and infirm and sick into the streets," he said.

Belt Tightening

There will have to be belt tightening, the governor said.

"Education must reduce its costs."

The governor said he had asked legislative leaders to pledge to attempt to limit the special session to the fiscal crisis.

Hatfield made the announcements after an hour and a half meeting with Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, Speaker of the House, House Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery, R-Eugene; Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, and Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yturri.

Hatfield said he would ask the legislature to allow him to make the cuts in basic school support.

Short Session Possible

He said he hoped for a short special session. Musa anticipated a 10 day session, and Barton said he believed it would take from 5 to 10 days.

The legislative leaders said they had agreed to work to limit the session to the fiscal crisis.

Both Barton and Musa said they opposed enactment of any new taxes. Montgomery said he probably would not work for a cigarette tax, such as he had called for Wednesday.

Montgomery, Barton and Yturri all agreed there was merit to referring a sales tax measure to the people, but Barton commented "The people aren't interested in any new taxes. They want spending cut."

Child's illness still mystery

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—A 2-year-old Mexican girl waged a quiet fight for life today against an illness that still posed an unsolved mystery to doctors.

The condition of Marivale Olea, of San Luis, Mexico, was critical although slightly improved at Children's Hospital where she has been undergoing extensive tests to determine the cause of her illness.

"She appears calm and seemed to sleep some in the afternoon," a nurse said Wednesday night.

When doctors at Yuma, Ariz., suspected the girl suffered from gangrene resulting from an infected mosquito bite, she was flown here for treatment in a compression chamber. But tests discounted the possibility of gangrene, and other treatment—including oxygen, intravenous feeding and 24-hour attention—was ordered instead.

to tell of Brazil

The Rev. Earl E. Mosteller, superintendent of Church of the Nazarene work in Brazil, and his wife, will speak and show color slides tonight at 7:30 at the denomination's local church at 1203 E. Third Street. The public is invited.

The Mostellers, home on their first visit since being assigned in 1958, are engaged in deputization work in the United States. They served 12 years previously in the Cape Verde Islands, and were back on furloughs from there in 1951 and 1956.

They pioneered the work of the church in Brazil, and are stationed at Campinas. The principal language is Portuguese, which they learned to speak in the Cape Verde Islands.

They organized a Nazarene Bible school at Campinas, and a \$30,000 headquarters church was dedicated this past June. The denomination now has 10 missionaries, 12 national pastors and 11 churches and preaching points in Brazil.

The Rev. M. Mosteller is a graduate of Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho. He pastored the Nazarene Church at Hemlock, Oregon, before being sent to the Cape Verde Islands. He and his wife have four daughters now attending high school or college.

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Two Britons, Australian win Nobel prizes

STOCKHOLM (UPI) — The 1963 Nobel prize for medicine was awarded today to two British researchers and one Australian for their discoveries concerning the operation of nerve cells.

Winners of the \$51,158 award were Alan Lloyd Hodgkin, 49, and Andrew Fielding Huxley, 45, both of Cambridge University, England and Sir John C. Eccles, 60, Canberra, Australia.

Their citation said they were receiving the prize for their discoveries concerning the ionic mechanisms involved in excitation and inhibition in the peripheral and central portions of the nerve cell membrane.

Sources said earlier that other top contenders for this year's prize in medicine were Drs. Jonas Salk of Pittsburgh and Albert Sabin of Cincinnati for the development of the anti-polio vaccines which bear their names. Also under consideration was Professor Horace Magoun of the University of California.

Research On Impulses

The Nobel committee said Eccles was given the award for his research on the fundamental transmission of nervous impulses. It said that Eccles had established a connection between inhibition of nerve cells and the repolarization of the cell's membrane.

The committee said Eccles thus solved what has long been one of the main riddles in the physiology of the central nervous system.

Hodgkin's and Huxley's prize-winning work concerned the physical and chemical nature of nerve impulses, the committee said.

The prize for medicine is the first of four Nobel awards to be announced here during the next three weeks. It will be followed by the prizes for literature, chemistry, and physics.

U.S. biochemist Linus Pauling, who won an earlier Nobel prize for chemistry, was named as the winner of the 1962 Peace Prize in Oslo last week. The Norwegian Peace Prize Committee gave the 1963 award to the International Red Cross and Red Cross Committee.

Salk, 49, developed the world's first effective vaccine against polio. He spent six years in the research work, often working 18 hours a day, seven days a week.

Inoculates Three Sons
Salk was so convinced the vaccine was safe that he inoculated his three sons with it in 1953. Two years later, he was honored at the White House by former President Eisenhower as a "benefactor to mankind."

The March of Dimes estimated last year that Salk's vaccine prevented 154,000 cases of paralytic polio in the states alone and saved at least 12,000 American lives.

Sabin, 57, developed the first live virus vaccine, which can be administered orally in little cubes of sugar. It was tested and given to 77 million Soviet citizens before being approved in the United States in 1960.

Sabin, born in czarist Russia, has been a U.S. citizen since 1930. He began work on a polio vaccine in 1935 and first tested his live virus type on human beings in 1955.

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Astronaut Slayton gives up A.F. career

HOUSTON (UPI) — Maj. Donald K. (Deke) Slayton, 39, whose "grossly irregular" heartbeat made him the only original U.S. Mercury astronaut never to make a space flight, has given up his Air Force career.

He will continue with the national space agency as a civilian.

"Maj. Slayton feels that in a civilian capacity, he can better carry out his supervisory activities," a spokesman for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) said.

Slayton said in his letter of resignation from the Air Force that he felt that as a civilian, he can participate in selection of flight crews without the possibility of appearance of partiality towards any one branch of the service.

He asked that the resignation be made effective Nov. 20, giving proper time for processing of his records. Slayton will then be appointed a civilian astronaut and coordinator of astronaut affairs through civil service.

He will be the third civilian astronaut among America's first 16 chosen for space. The others are former civilian test pilots Neil Armstrong Jr. and Elliot See.

"Being a civilian gives Slayton a sense of permanency," the NASA spokesman said. "It means that he will not just be assigned here as an Air Force officer, but will be here with us permanently."

All military astronauts are on loan to NASA from the various branches of the service.

Slayton still hopes to participate in a manned spaceflight. His civilian status will neither hamper nor help him accomplish this, the NASA spokesman said.

Ironically, it was the Air Force medical board which passed Slayton for his original space flight. It was the civilian cardiologists who countermanded the Air Force decision.

In Slayton's opinion, his "grossly irregular" heart beat "isn't anything unhealthy. It's just like having one blue and one brown eye."

The move was the first major slash made in the wake of the voters' rejection of the tax increase measure.

Applying also said he had voted against the tax measure.

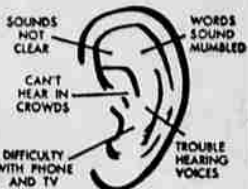
Mrs. Kennedy's plane left
