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Plans underway for study of freight rates

OLYMPIA (UPI) — A special committee will be named next week to select a consultant who will make a study of freight rates affecting shippers in Seattle, Portland and Eastern Washington.

Francis Pearson, chairman of the State Utilities and Transportation Commission, said the selection committee would represent the commission, the Department of Commerce and Economic Development, and the transportation industry.

In some cases, Pearson said, it is cheaper to ship goods to Eastern Washington or Puget Sound areas from Portland than from Seattle.

"It is a complicated and complex situation," he said, "but apparently the lower rate is in rail tariffs for some goods. If it had been used much we would have known about it before."

Pearson said a special consultant was necessary because commission officials "just don't have the time to make a study of the magnitude that this one will have to take."

Pearson said the decision to make the study was made at a commission meeting several weeks ago. He announced it Thursday.

The study was prompted by a series of mergers between out of state companies and firms in the "short line" business as well as the growth of industrial parks outside of metropolitan areas.

"They have made a completely new transportation picture," he said. "There are certain rates in Eastern Washington we have to look at, too, but the Puget Sound area is more important at the moment."

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Cook to fight Hatfield plans

GRESHAM (UPI) — State Sen. Vernon Cook, D-Gresham, said Thursday he will fight Gov. Mark Hatfield's request that the legislature give him authority to make budget cuts.

Cook accused the governor of trying to set up a dictatorship in Oregon and charged legislative leaders with abdicating their responsibility in a closed session with the governor Wednesday.

The voters' rejection of a \$60 million tax increase program Tuesday "was as much a repudiation of Gov. Hatfield's administration... as it was a rejection of the budget and tax programs proposed by the governor and the legislators," Cook commented.

"I am deeply shocked that these so-called legislative leaders have raised no objections to the governor's proposal," he continued.

Cook referred to a meeting among the governor, Senate President Ben Musa, Senate minority leader Anthony Yturri, House Speaker Clarence Barton and House minority leader F.F. Montgomery Wednesday. It was after that meeting that the governor announced he was calling a special session of the legislature Nov. 11.
