

Redmond upends Prineville 13-0 in annual war

Cats hit with offense, Roach, Moore get TD's

REDMOND—Redmond's Panthers, a grid aggregation which never could "get up" to do battle with their neighboring arch-rivals from Crook County, soared high above James Pollock Field last night to hand visiting Prineville a 13-0 Intermountain shellacking.

Redmond, the team which admittedly lacked an explosive offense and a scoring punch all season, turned right around with a blitz last night and battered the Crook County Cowboys right off the gridiron.

Coach Doc Savage's Panthers whipped their adversaries up front. Cat linemen allowed hard-charging fullback Mike Roach and three other backs to amass 236 net yards rushing. The Panthers rolled up 17 first downs to the Cowboys' 6.

Hard Fought

Though a hard fought contest right down to the wire, Redmond gained a sound victory, whipping the 'Pokes in just about every department. The Redmond line out-charged the Cowboys, the Cat blocking was better, and the Panther backs ran harder.

It was what was needed to win.

With the Panther forwards paving the way, Roach led the ground eaters with consistent gains on straight ahead charges over tackle and guard. He tallied the first Redmond TD in the second quarter when he smashed into the center of the 'Poke wall for two yards, initiating a 41-yard march.

Aided mightily by a pass interference penalty against the Cowboys, the Panthers remained on the ground the rest of the time and chopped away at the yards remaining between them and paydirt. Following Roach's two-yard blast, Keith Birkhofer tried to boot the extra point, but Prineville's Bill Hollowell slipped through and slapped the pigskin back into the turf.

Cats Earn Tallies

Both Cat TD's were hard earned. Until the Panthers denied the Cowboy goal line, the contest was up for grabs. Both teams demonstrated that they could move the ball, though the Cats did it better. The game's outcome was still in question.

It was Dennis Moore who picked up the second Panther tally. It came in the final quarter when the Cat speedster hit over right tackle, cut back to the west sideline and raced 35 yards into the 'Poke end zone. Keith Birkhofer booted the extra point and Redmond fans began to breathe a little easier.

Prineville had a big moment late in the second stanza, when fullback Bob Harris took a kickoff following the first Redmond TD, and raced down the east sideline 82 yards before a desperate lunge by safety man Wayne Marquess hauled him down on the Panther 5.

Goal Line Stand

It appeared as a shoo-in. The Cowboys had the pigskin resting on Redmond's five with

four downs to punch it over. The Panther line, enraged by the resulting predicament, refused to budge. Redmond turned on the charge and for four plays staved off what was almost a certain Prineville TD.

An assault into the center of the Panther line on the first play went for no gain. Quarterback Greg Vernon, then swung right for a flank movement but got nowhere. Bob Harris, then on third down, boomed through a hole at right tackle but fumbled. A 'Poke recovered it, but the Cowboys only gained two yards.

Then came the big play that was to make it or break it for the desperate 'Pokes. Vernon rolled out right on an option pass-or-run play and darted around Redmond's left flank. Frantic Redmond, however, smothered him about two yards short of the promised land.

Pokes Commence Passing

Redmond took over and ran out the clock to halftime.

Hard tackling and savage line play continued to rage through the third quarter. Prineville began to move the ball on the ground but couldn't keep it up. The next time the Cowboys laid their hands on the ball, they took to the air. Vernon's efforts were hampered. Prineville suffered inconsistencies.

A clipping penalty gave the 'Pokes the ball on their own 34 instead of the 49. Vernon was decked for a 7 yard loss, trying to pass on first down. Vernon then overshot Bob Holton with a long bomb, but on third down connected with Dennis Gerke for 10. It wasn't enough and the 'Pokes had to punt.

Off Target

Vernon's passing on the long bomb was off. He would wind up and throw deep to racing receiver Holton, but time and again Vernon's aeriels overshot the mark. Prineville also had troubles moving the ball on the ground.

Prineville's best gains came at the hands of fullback Phil Powell. Powell several times lined up adjacent to Vernon, and took the direct snap from center instead of Vernon. A hole in the scrambling Redmond line would loom and Powell would bolt through it and most of the secondary. He emerged as the Cowboys' top ground gainer. There wasn't much ground eating.

Apply Stopper

Coach Bud Dowling's crew was held to 86 yards net rushing for the entire game. Redmond's defensive forwards out-charged the 'Poke linemen all evening. Redmond kept its reputation as being a solid aggregation on defense. Prineville backs, though lacking the required speed for flank maneuvers, were further hampered by lack of running room. Several times Bill MacDonald turned sweep plays inside and closed in to nail the ball packer.

For a team who wasn't sup-

posed to have the wherewithall to move the ball, especially in the air, the Panthers did plenty of it last night. End Bill Hughitt turned in a good pass receiving performance on looks from sophomore quarterback Wayne Marquess. Marquess, subbing for injured regular field general Paul Harvey, did a yeoman's job of moving the Panthers.

Last night's victory shot Savage's charges out of the cellar where they were deadlocked this week with Madras. Both squads needed wins desperately. Redmond went into last night's contest with a 1-4 win-loss record. Prineville was only an inch better with a single win against three losses and a tie.

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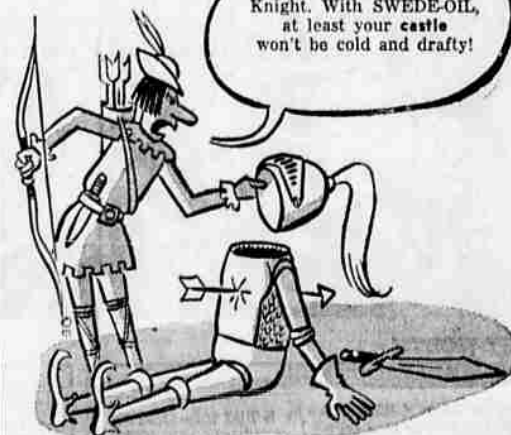
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Barnes shines The Dalles thumps Madras Buffs 31-7

THE DALLES — A battling bunch of Buffaloes from Madras descended upon the Indian band here last night, but fell short of their objective as The Dalles Tribe struck in the air and on the ground to post a 31-7 Intermountain League prep grid victory.

Amazing, rugged The Dalles fullback, Joe Petroff, dazzled local fans with a brilliant scoring display, tallying three six-pointers on runs of 4, 7 and 1 yards. Petroff paced the Indian effort all night with his rugged line assaults.

Petroff's effort was complemented by teammate Gary Ord-

way, who scored two touchdowns. One was an 18 yard gallop and the other was an 85-yard punt return.

Via Overland, Air

The Dalles romped over the Central Oregonians both in the air and on the ground. The Indians rolled up 157 yards passing, and amassed 203 yards net rushing. Madras had to settle for 83 in the air and 88 on the ground.

Coach Frank Bood's scalped Buffs, however, held the edge in the percentage of completions. Larry Barnes did almost all of the throwing, as the Buffs completed 10 for 18. The Indians completed 10 out of 19.

Madras' touchdown came in the third quarter via the air route. Barnes hit fullback Adrian Smith with a 14-yard TD bomb on a last-gasp fourth down heave.

Barnes Impressive

According to reports from the Columbia River city, Barnes set Indian fans agog with his maneuverability and his passing. The look-in pass worked well for the Buffs all evening. Barnes' TD shot climaxed a 66 yard sustained drive. He did it with difficulty.

After a couple of look-in passes, and two good gains by Adrian Smith, Barnes and the Buffs had the pigskin on the Indian 9. An illegal procedure penalty moved the ball back to the 14, and it was second and seven. Barnes threw to end Bob Kramer incomplete, and then tried it to Adrian Smith, but again it was no good. This made it fourth and seven with the ball still resting on the 14.

Smith Nabs TD

Barnes then rolled out right and heaved a "bullet" to Adrian Smith who gathered it in on the 10 yard line and galloped around Indian defenders the rest of the way to paydirt. Barnes hit Kramer and Doug Stewart with passes all evening. Alvis Smith and cohort Adrian Smith turned in top ball - carrying chores for the Buffs, but found the Indian red dog too much most of the evening. Rod Smith, another Buff head, had the best luck.

Speedster Wayne Maw who rumbled so successfully against Bend in the first quarter a week ago, couldn't get untracked. It was a great evening for the Indians' Petroff and Ordway, however, as the pair consistently ripped off chunks of yardage through the sagging White Buffaloes.

The Dalles suffered shocking setbacks from the referees all night long. The Dalles was penalized 10 times for 119 yards. The Buffs were put back 30 yards on four rulings.

Cappelletti leads Boston to 40-21 AFL win

The season is only half gone but one American Football League individual race already looks pretty well settled.

Veteran Boston Patriot end Gino Cappelletti did his best to eliminate the worries of competition Friday night while pacing his team to a 40-21 conquest of the Denver Broncos.

Cappelletti personally accounted for 22 Boston points to more than offset the entire Bronco total. Since he already had been league scoring leader, he came out of the game with a 31-point bulge on nearest challenger Chris Burford of Kansas City and, more important, a 34-point spread on defending champion George Blanda of Houston.

Full League Schedule

The game was the first of a full AFL round in which the other six teams see action Sunday. Kansas City was favored over Western leader San Diego by six points while Houston ruled as a five-point choice over Buffalo and Oakland was a two-point pick over Eastern leader New York.

The San Diego at Kansas City game will be televised in the Central Standard, Mountain and Pacific time zones. New York at Oakland, will be shown only in New York while the Buffalo at Houston game will be viewed in the Eastern and Central Daylight time areas.

When Cappelletti was kicking his four field goals at Boston Friday night, Babe Parilli was throwing passes and the Broncos were losing another passer. Parilli threw for two touchdowns, 24 yards to Cappelletti and 31 yards to Tony Romeo. Rookie fullback Harry Crump twice plunged the final yard for touchdowns after Parilli aeriels had set the scoring stage.

Parilli wound up with 358 yards from 21 completions in 31 shots. But Boston's passing attack had to be good because the Pats were held to a net 43 yards rushing.

Denver, at the same time, was riddling Boston's league-leading pass defense for 250 yards.

Before he was hospitalized with a possible concussion following a second-period collision, rookie quarterback Mickey Slaughter completed seven of 11 passes for one touchdown.

His emergency replacement, former Houston and San Diego reservist Don Breaux, managed 12 for 17 for 174 yards and another score.

The Kansas City clash pairs off the two hottest passers in the league, Len Dawson of the defending champion Chiefs and Tobin Rote of the front-running Chargers.

If they follow the pattern they have established in the league statistical race, Rote will complete more passes but Dawson will throw for more touchdowns. And, since San Diego is fourth and Kansas City fifth in league pass defense, the duel should be a wide-open aerial battle.

UW, Stanford today had top coast football battle

Stanford and Washington battled in Seattle today in a Big Six conference battle to highlight a busy afternoon of grid activity along the West Coast.

Stanford, which has lost three in a row, is depending on a trio of sophomore quarterbacks to fill in for injured Clark Weaver, while the Huskies have fullback Junior Coffey back in top form after recovering from a broken foot.

Washington's offense bogged down through three straight defeats, but roared last week against previously unbeaten Oregon State. There is a feeling that the Huskies could start on the road to Pasadena by winning their first Big Six battle today.

A couple of intersectional battles found Ohio State at Southern California and UCLA at

Notre Dame. Other games saw California hosting San Jose State, Oregon State taking on Washington State, and Oregon playing Arizona.

The University of Pacific was the underdog at Idaho and Fresno State clashed with Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo in the CCAA conference lid-fitter.

In a game Friday night, it was Occidental 21 Claremont-Mudd 7. In one Friday afternoon, Moffett Field disposed of USF 24-0.

Van's Vikings to battle LA Rams

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Coach Norm Van Brocklin sends his surprisingly sturdy Minnesota Vikings against the winless Los Angeles Rams Sunday at Memorial Coliseum and his young quarterback Frank Turkenton is expected to steer the visitors to a victory.

The Vikings have a 2-3 record and missed beating the Green Bay Packers last Sunday only by a blocked field goal. So the hand-writing is on the wall for the Rams' sixth consecutive loss of the season.

Turkenton is the National Football League's seventh-ranking passer with a 55.1 completion percentage and has tossed six TD passes.

The Rams have been using three quarterbacks this year and only one of them has thrown a touchdown pass—Zeke Bratkowski has three to his credit.
