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## Water storage in good shape

**PRINEVILLE**—Both reservoirs of the Ochoco Irrigation district are going into the winter season with a considerable amount of storage water, according to latest report from the OI.D.

At the Prineville reservoir, with a capacity of about 155,000 acre-feet, water level this week is 90,000 acre-feet, or about the level to which the reservoir is lowered, in any event, for flood control in the spring. At this level, this reservoir is almost certain to fill to capacity before the 1964 growing season.

The Ochoco reservoir, the smaller and older of the two storage units, has a water content of about 20,000 acre-feet this week in a basin with a capacity of 46,500 acre-feet. This reservoir is less certain to fill to the spillway in the spring, although a wet season would accomplish this.

The two reservoirs, used together, supply irrigation for the entire irrigated farm and ranchland area around Prineville each summer. Both are also used extensively for recreational purposes. The newer Prineville reservoir saw its state park filled to capacity each weekend last summer, reaching the rank of being among the top ten state parks in Oregon for usage by water sports and camping enthusiasts.

PORTLAND (UPI)—The mayors of Delake, Oceanlake and Taft Monday disclosed tentative plans to have a vote on consolidation of their three Lincoln County communities before February.

The mayors—Mrs. Rosalie Pompel of Delake, Jerry Parks of Oceanlake and Manville Robison of Taft—said they were in favor of consolidation.

The following is a clarification of a news story Monday concerning use of the term "slot machines" in connection with a burglary of the Century Tap Room:

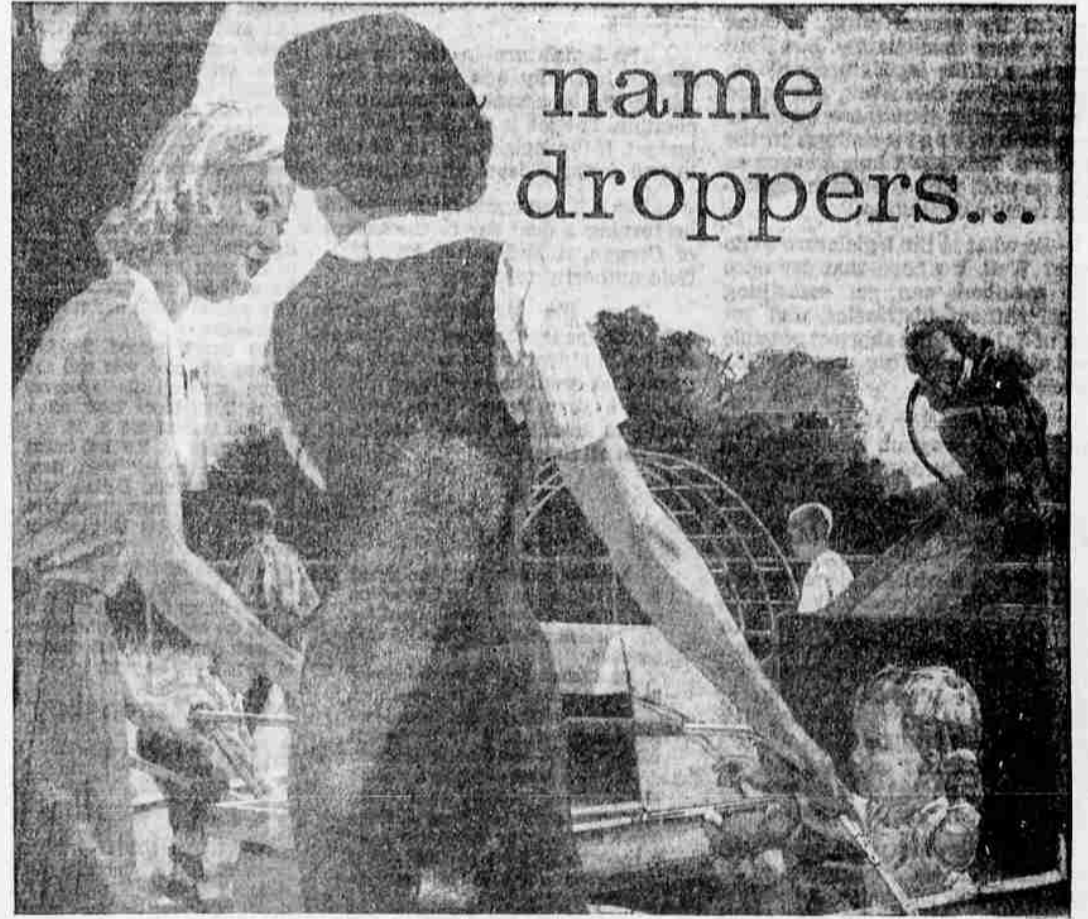
The machines burglarized were a bowling device, automatic record - player, gun machine and pinball machine.
