Nuclear power topic for talk before clubmen

"Where we are in Nuclear Power" was the topic of Howard Arnett, division manager for the Pacific Power & Light Co., in Bend in a talk before Lions Club members Tuesday.

He touched on the background of nuclear power experiments and developments, referred to gradually decreasing cost of nuclear power production and said the Pacific Northwest is in a most favorable position as nuclear power plants take shape across the country.

Unlike the Northeastern states and Europe, the Pacific Northwest is not in need of nuclear power at present, Arnett noted, pointing to the comparatively low cost of hydro-electric power in the region.

Consequently, Arnett noted, the Pacific Northwest can watch the development of nuclear power plants in other areas, keep in touch with research and in time take advantage of the developments.

Arnett noted in his talk to the clubmen that, contrary to general belief, there is a little danger in harnessing the atom for power development.

Glenn O. Ratcliff, club president, was in general charge of the meeting. Ellery Hickman, program chairman, introduced Arnett.

Club members joined in a moment of silent tribute to one of their long-time members, the late Glenn H. Gregg, who died in Bend this past week.

Speaker named for U.N. Day observance here

Dr. Austin F. Walter, who will speak at a United Nations Day observance at First Methodist church Saturday, following a potluck dinner, brings with him an impressive background, according to Dr. Don Pence, president of Central Oregon College, who will introduce him.

Dr. Walter is currently a professor and chairman of the political science department of Oregon State University and he is also vice president of Oregon United Nations Association and member at large of Oregon Great Decisions Council.

He obtained his B.A. degree at Carleton College, Northfield, Minn., his M.A. degree at Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Medford, Mass., and his doctorate at University of Michigan. He has traveled in Asia and Europe and in 1956 was the recipient of a German Travel grant.

Dr. Walter's topic will deal with Castro, Khrushchev, Kennedy and the United Nations. It is anticipated a lively question and answer period will follow his talk, which will begin at 7:30 p.m. Mrs. Marion Poor, chairman of the event, has requested that questions be directed to Larry Christian who will relay them to Dr. Walter.

Both the dinner and the meeting are open to the public.

Bend man gets lodge position

Dr. R. D. Ketchum of Bend was elected to the office of supreme representative of the Grand Lodge of Oregon, Knights of Pythias, at the convention last week in Portland. He will serve a four-year term. He is the first member from Bend to be chosen supreme representative.

In his new office, he will be one of the two official representatives from Oregon to the international convention of the Supreme Lodge next August in Washington, D.C.

The national capital was chosen for the centennial convention, as the order was founded there on Feb. 19, 1864.

Dr. Ketchum has been active in the organization since he became a member of Deschutes lodge No. 103 March 1, 1922, in Bend. He was elected to a one-year term as grand chancellor of the Grand Lodge of Oregon in 1948.
