## Quimet put golf on page 1 50 years ago...Frenchman

PARIS, France (UPI)—Fifty years ago an unknown Frenchman by the name of Francis Quimet put golf on page one in the United States. Today a couple of Yankees named Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus are doing the same thing in France.

Golf mushroomed in the U.S. after Oumet defeated two famous British golfers, Harry Vardon and Ted Ray, in a play-off to win the U.S. Open championship in 1913.

The game is far from popular in France — there are only 15,000 golfers in the country — but the appearance here of Palmer and Nicklaus in the Canada Cup and International Golf Association matches is expected to give golf in this country the same shot in the arm that Oumet gave it in the States.

Palmer, golf's leading money winner, and Nicklaus are heavily favored to defend successfully the team title which the U.S. won in the matches at Buenos Aires last year. Then Palmer, who this year became

the first golfer ever to exceed \$100,000 in official money winnings, teamed with Sneed to win the team title.

Palmer showed he was ready for the challenge Tuesday when, off the plane which brought him from the U.S. only a few hours earlier, he shot a three under par 33 on the front nine of the St. Nom la Breche course, 12 miles from here.

Later, he played a couple of more holes with Nicklaus, the young U.S. Masters and PGA champion, who just Sunday brought his money winnings only a few dollars short of the \$100,000 mark by winning the Sahara Open at Las Vegas. Palmer, completely recovered from the burstis which had brothered his right shoulder, praised the course, one of the most plush in Europe with its brilliant green fairways, exacting greens and rolling acres.

"Actually," grinned Palmer after his warmup session, "it's just like playing in Philadelphia, Akron or anywhere else back in the States."

## Delaware, top scoring team, moves up to 2nd

NEW YORK (UPI) — Delaware, the highest scoring team in the nation, ran up its lowest point total of the year Saturday, yet jumped from third to second place today in balloting for the country's No. 1 small college football team, a scant seven points behind leader Northern Illinois.

The Blue Hens, defending eastern champions, defeated Ohio University, a major college team, 29-12, to draw 12 first-place votes, the same number as Northern Illinois, and 261 points from the 35-man United Press International Board of Coaches.

Florida A&M, which walloped Morris Brown, 66-0, still fell a notch to third with four first-place votes and 238 total points. Texas A&I remained solidly entrenched in the fourth spot for the third straight week, and San Diego State continued its hold on fifth place despite a 43-30 loss to Los Angeles State last weekend. The first four teams all have perfect records.

Wittenberg and Montana State changed positions with the Ohio Tigers placing sixth and the Bobcats dropping to seventh. The only newcomer to the top 10 was South Dakota State, which leaped from a 14th-place tie to 10th as a result of the Jackrabbits' 61-0 rout of South Dakota.

Massachusetts and Western Kentucky both moved up a notch into eighth and ninth positions, respectively, as Central Oklahoma State fell clear out of the top 20. McNeese State climbed one rung to 11th, Western State (Colo.) advanced from 20th to 12th, and Lewis and Clark jumped from 17th to 13th. Fresno State slipped from a 12th place tie to 14th and St. John's (Minn.), tied for 14th a week ago, settled into a 15th place tie with East Tennessee State, which is making its first appearance of the year in the top 20.

Northeast Oklahoma, East Carolina, Los Angeles State and Emporia (Kan.) followed in order.

## Yogi Berra to sign Thursday as Yankee chief

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sound thinking Yogi Berra, faced with a choice of two managerial jobs will prove once again he's no body's dummy when he officially signs to manage the New York Yankees Thursday for \$50,000.

The squat, 38-year-old Yogi thus will turn his back on a decidedly less tempting opportunity to manage the Baltimore Orioles.

His signing at an appropriately elaborate press conference also will complete a high echelon reshuffling by the Yankees which began Tuesday when 44-year-old Ralph Houk succeeded 61-year-old Roy Hamme as general manager.

The naming of Berra as the Yankees' new manager may come as something of a surprise to the general baseball public but it certainly won't bowl over Yogi.

Like Houk, Berra was fully aware all last year that he would step up the Yankee ladder at this time.

When the Boston Red Sox showed interest in Yogi as a manager before they hired Johnny Pesky a year ago, the Yanks advised Berra to "sit tight."

And when President Lee MacPhail of the Orioles inquired as to Yogi's availability during the past two weeks, the Yankees told him they had managerial plans for Berra themselves.

**Began With Yankees**  
Berra, who began his career with the Yankees in 1946 and served as a player-coach last season, batted .293 for them this year and hit eight homers. He owns a .285 lifetime batting average and his 358 homers are the most ever hit by a catcher in major league history.

Winner of the MVP award in 1951, 1954 and 1955, Yogi has played in 13 World Series and holds more than a dozen series records.

He will be strictly a bench manager next season, leaving not only the coaching lines but also the hitting to someone else.

Berra will take over the job at which Houk was so eminently successful during his three years at the helm.

Houk won three pennants in as many tries and two World Series.

## Jimmy Foxx in hospital with heart ailment

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (UPI) — Baseball Hall of Famer Jimmy Foxx, 36, was in a hospital today suffering an acute heart ailment.

A hospital spokesman said Tuesday night Foxx was "resting very well and is doing as well as could be expected."

Foxx intended to return to his Lakewood, Ohio, home Tuesday but woke up with dizzy spells and sent for a physician. Dr. J. W. Probst said Foxx's heart "sounded like a trip hammer."

"His heart went bad on him but I wouldn't call it a coronary," Probst said.

The doctor took Foxx to Faith Hospital for treatment. "He would have collapsed if he had tried to return home," Dr. Probst said.

## English coal miner asks for title bout with Ortiz

LONDON (UPI)—Coal miner Maurice Cullen of Shotton, England, today demanded a title fight with lightweight champion Carlos Ortiz because of the unpopularity of Ortiz' non-title 10-round referee's decision over him here Tuesday night.

Only a knockdown in a blazing last round enabled Ortiz of New York to emerge as one of the four Western Hemisphere winners in the big trans-Atlantic fight show before a sellout 10,000 at the indoor Wembley Empire Pool.

Ortiz weighed 138 pounds; Cullen, 136 1/2.

In another non-title bout, world featherweight champion Sugar Ramos of Mexico City stopped helpless young Sandy McSpadden of Scotland in the second round. They were scheduled for 10.

Ramos, 128-pound champion, scaled 135; McSpadden, 138.

Heavyweight Jeff Davis of Las Vegas, Nev., also scored a technical knockout over Jim Cooper of England at the end of the seventh round because of bloody cuts about the eyes. Jim is the twin brother of British Empire heavyweight champion Henry Cooper.

Davis registered 198 1/2; Cooper, 201 1/2.

In the only 15-round match on the program, Bahama-born Gomo Brennan won the vacant British Empire middleweight title on a decision over Ireland-born Mick Leahy of Coventry, Eng. The Empire title was vacated by Dick Tiger of Nigeria after he had won the world title last year.

Brennan weighed 157 1/2; Leahy, 159 1/2—just under the 160-pound limit.
