Council may not finish work for several years

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Highly-placed sources said today it may take until 1966, or even longer, to complete the work of the Ecumenical Council.

This forecast came from informants who are in a position to know how much work remains to be done on the key theological documents which Pope Paul VI has indicated he regards as "must business" for the council.

It also reflects their assessment of the speed with which the council can reasonably be expected to act.

"We wanted freedom of debate at the council, and we got it. Now we're paying the price for it," ruefully observed one bishop who is identified with the council's liberal wing.

At its first session, in the fall of 1962, the council completed debate on, and approved in general principle, a document providing for far-reaching reforms in Catholic liturgy, including the use of modern languages rather than Latin in large portions of the Mass.

At this second session, which began Sept. 29, the fathers have been voting on details of the liturgical reform document. They already have approved about 100 amendments, but have many more to go.

In addition, they have listened to four weeks of debate on the second major document on the council agenda—dealing with the structure of the church. It contains several significant and controversial provisions, including authority to ordain married deacons, and recognition that bishops share with the Pope responsibility for teaching and governing the whole church.

Session fails to get accord

PORTLAND (UPI)—Negotiations between union leaders and Weyerhaeuser Co. officials here Friday failed to settle a strike which has shut down the firm's Coos Bay area operations. Federal mediator Leroy Smith reported.

Another session was scheduled for next Wednesday.

The strike, which has idled 980 men for more than a week, was called by International Woodworkers of America local 3261.

Friday's talks involved local and regional union officials and Weyerhaeuser representatives from its main office in Tacoma and from Coos Bay.

Smith did not disclose details of the bargaining session or the exact nature of the employees' grievances. However, the union earlier demanded higher pay if members of boom crews used power saws, and pay for 3 workers suspended by Weyerhaeuser when they laid off to attend union strategy sessions.

Destruction of Great Lakes fish urged by FDA

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The nation's housewives were urged today to destroy all smoked fish known to have been caught or processed in the Great Lakes area.

Commissioner George P. Larrick of the Food & Drug Administration (FDA) ordered the emergency measures into effect Friday night in a move to stem new outbreaks of the deadly type-E botulism poisoning.

Larrick said the "destroy" order was aimed at smoked fish products that are "packaged in sealed plastic wrappers and those that are sold in bulk without any package." Canned fish products are not involved, he said.

Study Recent Deaths

Larrick issued the order after receiving a report from FDA scientists and from an advisory panel of experts who made an independent study of seven recent deaths traced to botulism-E and stemming from smoked whitefish processed by the H. J. Hornbos & Bros. Co. at Grand Haven, Mich.

In the course of the investigation, the FDA said, traces of botulism-E were found in at least three other fish processing plants in the Great Lakes area.

The emergency measures proposed by the panel were adopted "with modifications," Larrick said, pending development of more complete information on the sources of contamination. He said the FDA's investigation of the botulism hazard was continuing.

In a notice to wholesalers, retailers and processors, the FDA urged that all supplies of smoked fish products made from Great Lakes fish or processed in the area also should be destroyed.
