

'Big Lift' may prove to be embarrassment

Notes from the foreign news cables:

Too Good:
Mechanically, Operation "Big Lift", the job of flying a complete U.S. division to Germany in little more than 60 hours, was a total success. But in Bonn they are saying it may prove a long-term political embarrassment. Despite U.S. assurances, jittery West Germans are not convinced that the massive airlift was not a forerunner to reduction of U.S. forces in Europe. Pressures now may begin building on new Chancellor Ludwig Erhard to start being nicer to President Charles de Gaulle.

Closer and Closer:
Expect Britain to move even closer to the United States under the new leadership of Sir Alexander Douglas-Home. The new prime minister, even more than Harold Macmillan, has been a staunch supporter of an Atlantic policy in firm alignment with the United States. Douglas-Home has been the driving force behind Britain's decision to join the United States in talks with other allies on the possible creation of a multi-nation nuclear naval force. He held out against strong opposition in the cabinet when he was the foreign minister in Macmillan's set up.

Closer with France, Too:
Despite the decision to retain close ties to the United States, a marked improvement in relations between France and Britain may also be in the offing. The meeting at the Hague last Thursday between French Foreign Minister Maurice Couve de Murville and Britain's new foreign secretary, R. A. Butler, may mark a fresh start after nine months of deep freeze that followed De Gaulle's blackball of Britain for Common Market membership.

Austerity:
The French government is bracing for a troublesome round of strikes this fall, particularly in nationalized industries such as the rails, and gas and electricity. But De Gaulle, Premier Georges Pompidou and Finance Minister Valery Giscard d'Estaing reportedly feel time and public opinion will be on the government's side in defending its save-the-franc austerity program, including a temporary wage freeze.

Voter Apathy:
A thunderous silence so far has been the voter reaction to Japan's general election campaign. Number of candidates for the Japanese parliament is the smallest since the war. The issues—high prices, the U. S. alliance, reconciliation with South Korea—have not stirred voter imagination.

Eight members of migrant family killed in crash in New Mexico

One of the worst traffic accidents in New Mexico history killed the father and seven children of an Oregon migrant family early Sunday.

Oregon traffic accidents took the lives of three other residents during the weekend. Another man died of accidental burns and one was electrocuted at a Wyoming construction project.

A car pulling a small trailer collided head-on with a truck on U.S. Highway 666 about 36 miles north of Gallup, N.M., in the pre-dawn darkness Sunday.

The crash killed Luz B. Garza, 37, and seven of his 10 children—Noelia, 16; Odilia, 13; Irma, 11; Viviano, 8; Lupe, 5; Mercedes, 4, and Rojelio, 1.

The mother and the other three children were injured, none of them critically. So was the truck driver, William D. Wakefield, 48, Aztec, N.M.

Lived At Nyssa
The Garza family's last permanent address was Nyssa, Ore. Friends said Garza had farmed in Malheur County for five years and managed a tavern at Adrian three of those years. The family was on its way to visit Mrs. Garza's relatives in Texas.

Another accident east of Portland Sunday night killed William Wardrip, 21, and Wayne Williams, 19, both of Portland. Multnomah County Sheriff's deputies said their car left skid marks for 430 feet before hitting a tree.

Mark Ellis Nelson, 20, and Richard A. Cox, both of Portland, were hospitalized with injuries.

Ramona Belez, 21, Milwaukie, was killed in that city when her car was struck by a Southern Pacific passenger train Saturday.

Lloyd Long, a 61-year-old transient, died in a Portland hospital Saturday after suffering burns on most of his body. Police said he was sleeping under an approach to the Steel Bridge and apparently rolled into a fire he had built to keep himself warm.

Michael Nolen, 20, Klamath Falls, was electrocuted on a missile base construction site near Pine Bluffs, Wyo., Saturday. He was cranking an auxiliary boom to set up floodlights when it brushed an overhead power line.

Title insurance increase due
SALEM (UPI)—Title insurance rates will be increased \$2.50 on Nov. 1 to \$25 per \$1,000, Insurance Commissioner Walter Korlann said today.

Korlann said the increase was requested by title insurance companies.
