

Miss Keeler must stand trial on charge of lying

LONDON (UPI) — Christine Keeler, whose cost War Minister John Profumo's job and nearly brought down the British government, was ordered today to stand trial in Old Bailey on charges that she lies sent a discarded lover to jail.

The 21-year-old red-haired call girl and three co-defendants all pleaded innocent to conspiracy and perjury counts after a five-day pre-trial hearing and were admitted to bail pending their criminal court trial.

No trial date was set. Its earliest start could be Nov. 12 when the next session at the Old Bailey begins.

Bail for Miss Keeler—whose lawyer said the entire story told against her was "false"—was set at \$3,400, and lesser amounts were asked for the others. Her roommate Paula Hamilton-Marshall, 23, was freed under \$4,200; her housekeeper Mrs. Olive Brooker, 56, \$2,100, and the same amount was set for Rudolph Fenton, 29.

'Coexistence' line is taken by Red China

MOSCOW (UPI)—A Chinese Communist, in a marked departure from the usual Peking line, told 6,000 applauding Russians and others today the Chinese favor peaceful coexistence and continued friendship with the Soviet Union.

Chao Kuo-chiang, secretary of the All China Federation of Trade Unions, spoke of mutual solidarity in a speech to the 13th Soviet trade union congress.

His brief address, in moderate tones, followed a weekend appeal by Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev for an end to the bitter propaganda exchanges that have poisoned party and governmental relations between Peking and Moscow during the past year.

Chao, leader of the Chinese observers among 80 foreign groups attending the convention, was all sweetness today except in his reference to "aggressive American imperialism" as the alleged cause of all the world's troubles.

He seemed, however, to stress people-to-people friendship between China and Russia rather than party and governmental relations.

He gave clear approval to peaceful coexistence, the main bone of contention between Peking and Moscow.

"We are firmly fighting the policy of aggression and war conducted by the imperialists for the implementation of peaceful coexistence between countries with different social systems," Chao said.

With Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in the hall, trade union chief Viktor Grishin Monday attacked Peking's policies and urged unionists throughout the world to rally to Moscow.

Grishin, one of the Soviet negotiators at last summer's unsuccessful ideological talks with Chinese leaders here, told the union members of "serious differences" between the two Communist nations. He said they went beyond Communist party relations and created an "abnormal" situation between the two governments.

(In Peking Monday, Chinese Foreign Minister Chen Yi told visiting Japanese journalists that China will not be able to develop its own atomic bomb for several years. He blamed many factors for the delay, including the withdrawal of Soviet aid and technicians.)

Portland man gets Demo post

EUGENE (UPI)—Norman A. Stoll, a 50-year-old Portland attorney, was elected Democratic National Committee member for Oregon here Sunday afternoon.

He succeeds C. Girard Davidson, who announced his resignation earlier.

Stoll, who has practiced law in Portland since 1954, was the only person nominated at a meeting of the State Democratic Central Committee.

The new committeeman said he had been given a "tough job" to interpret on the state level what's going on at the national level.

"We have to put Oregon in the plus column in 1964 and further the responsible liberal leadership demonstrated by President Kennedy," Stoll said.

Stoll was alternate chairman of the Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee from 1956 to 1960. He was an assistant attorney general for Oregon during the administration of Gov. Robert Holm.

Eleven facing sabotage counts in South Africa

PRETORIA, South Africa (UPI) — Eleven men—Africans, whites, and an Indian—today faced sabotage charges that carry a possible death penalty in a trial condemned by the United Nations.

They include two former leading officials of the banned African National Congress (ANC) and the son of a former member of parliament.

They are charged with organizing or committing 222 acts of sabotage, including bomb attacks and raids on jails and police stations, in the two years before their capture last summer.

The state accuses the group of trying to prepare for guerrilla warfare within South Africa and armed invasion from without to overthrow the government of Premier Hendrik Verwoerd.

The United Nations urged earlier this month that South Africa stop the trial and free the prisoners. It was apparent from speeches supporting the U.N. action that most delegates regarded the 11 men as political prisoners and not saboteurs. South Africa ignored the appeal because it considers the trial an internal affair.

Police took strong security measures around the Pretoria Supreme Court building today. All entrances were guarded and police reserves stood nearby with tear gas grenades. Informants said anti-government demonstrations were feared.

The accused are: Nelson Mandela and Walter Sisulu, both former presidents of the ANC; Govan Mbeki, former ANC provincial leader; and three other Africans—Elias Matsoseli, Andrew Mlangeni, and Raymond Matlaba.

The Indians are Ahmed Mohammed Kathrada, former secretary of the Transvaal Indian Congress.

The whites are Dennis Goldberg, former leader of the banned Congress of Democrats, a left-wing group; Lionel Bernstein, an architect; James Kantor, a lawyer, and Bob Alexander Hepple, whose father was a labor member of the South African parliament.

She was director of Windham House, New York City, and served as a department associate secretary at the World Council of Churches in Geneva, Switzerland.

An informal tea will be held following the program. Child care will be provided. All women of the community are invited to attend.

The program will include a dedication of gifts assembled by participating women for world relief work. The offering will be for a new United Nations church center, to train selected women leaders for effective peace action.

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Graham hits big government

HOUSTON (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham, who says he has no political ambitions, Monday took a swipe at the bigness of government.

Graham, on a three day speaking tour before Houston religious and civic groups, said "our people look to the government instead of to God."

He said "it will destroy the moral fiber of our nation when our people look to the government for everything to fill our needs."

Graham was emphatic when he said he has no political ambitions because "I am not qualified and besides, nobody would vote for me."

Ginny spews welcome rains on New England

Hurricane Ginny churned toward Cape Cod today, spewing welcome rain across drought-weary New England and causing tides two feet higher than normal from Atlantic City to Boston.

A wintry storm off Lake Erie dumped an inch of snow in northeastern Ohio during the night. Gale warnings were posted from the Virginia capes to Eastport, Maine, and winds up to 45 miles an hour buffeted the coast.

A hurricane watch was in effect from Provincetown, Mass., south to eastern Connecticut. An inch and a half of hail pelted Cleveland and nearly an inch of rain soaked Nantucket, Mass.

Huge fishing fleets off the New England coast headed for the safety of port as the storm blew up 13-foot waves. Visibility was as low as half a mile in fog and rain.

The weather bureau said winds would increase to 70 miles an hour in the hurricane watch area and tides would range up to 6 feet above normal.

High waves and breakers along with high tides will cause considerable flooding of the coastal lowlands along eastern Long Island and on the mainland from eastern Connecticut to Provincetown.

Heavy rains in southeastern New England were not expected to cause flooding problems, but the weather bureau warned residents to be on the alert.

The weather bureau also said snow would fall during the day in the mountains of Maryland and the Virginias. Snow flurries were expected in Pennsylvania and New York high country.

Protest spurned by school board

PORTLAND (UPI) — The David Douglas High School board refused Monday night to halt publication of its newsletter, "Young Schools."

The publication came under fire from some residents of the district because its October issue came out before the Oct. 15 tax election and contained an article on the referendum election by State Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marcola. Eymann was the sponsor of the tax program.

Opponents questioned the legality of the school board publication and were upset over what they said was a one-sided presentation of the issue.

"We think it is a good way to inform the people," said Supt. Floyd Light. He said the publication will continue unless someone proves it is against the law.

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Sen. Morse hits U.S. aid bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., delivered a scathing attack on the \$4.2 billion foreign aid bill Monday and said the Senate should take three weeks if necessary to rewrite it.

Morse ripped into the bill after Chairman J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee opened debate on the measure with a plea for approval despite admitted shortcomings of the aid program.

Fulbright said the Senate should approve the measure because "any large scale departure" from the present program "would pose unacceptable risk" in foreign policy.

Senate leaders had hoped to finish action on the long-delayed, controversial aid bill this week. But Morse made it clear that he planned an extended fight. He said the Senate has a "clear duty to rewrite this bill on the floor of the Senate in the next three weeks."

Otherwise, he said, the bill will do more harm than good in Latin America and be welcomed by Communists everywhere because it "strengthens the anti-freedom forces" with aid to strong-arm governments.

Morse, formerly an aid supporter, cast the only recorded vote against the bill when the foreign relations committee approved it by voice vote.

Tax repeal being sought

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., Monday introduced a bill to repeal the excise tax on women's purses and handbags sold for less than \$15.

"This tax has long outlived its usefulness," she said. "It is an unnecessary hardship on low-income women."

International Red Cross marks 100th anniversary

GENEVA (UPI)—The International Red Cross, which grew from a Swiss humanitarian's dream into the world's biggest relief organization, marked its 100th anniversary today.

On Oct. 29, 1863, Henri Dunant, 35, met with four other citizens of Geneva and the representatives of 16 nations and signed an agreement embodying the rules of an International Red Cross movement.

Since then the Red Cross has circled the world. In war or during natural disasters, it goes immediately to the aid of victims with hospitals, food and housing.

Suggestions have been made to have the Red Cross participate in any world disarmament plan, but officials feel this would be too political a role for the organization.

Today the League of Red Cross Societies is made up of 102 national Red Cross organizations with 170 million members. This year the Red Cross and the League jointly were awarded a Nobel Peace Prize—the organization's third.

Grocers back food stamp plan

PORTLAND (UPI) — Delegates at the Oregon Independent Grocers Association voted unanimously Monday to endorse the Federal Food Stamp Plan.

"Because the Oregon welfare budget will be reduced in 1964, due to the tax defeat earlier this month by the voters, we urge the Oregon Welfare Commission and local counties to use the food stamp plan throughout the state," association members said.

They also voted not to take a stand on a sales tax. However, they agreed if one is voted next year, there should be exclusion of food and drugs from the tax.

Jerry Horn of Lebanon was elected president, Wally Pease of Corvallis was re-elected first vice president and Glenn Gaylor of Portland was chosen second vice president.

A speaker at the convention was Gene Autry, 55-year-old star of numerous western movies who also is a radio and television station owner and part owner of the Los Angeles baseball team of the American League.
