

Budget-minded board planning special session

PORTLAND (UPI) — The budget-minded State Board of Higher Education has called a special meeting one week after the special session of the legislature ends.

The special session meets Nov. 11.

Meanwhile, the board closed a two-day meeting Tuesday by telling state-supported schools to cut some \$1.5 million out of non-teaching and student fund allocations. The way the money will be cut was left up to the schools.

Such cutbacks would affect fees paid to support student government, athletics, and campus press services. They also would reduce maintenance and janitorial services.

William E. Walsh, chairman of the board, said action on other cuts would be held up until after the legislature meets. Gov. Mark Hatfield has asked that higher education take a cut of \$8.2 million because of voter rejection of the income tax measure Oct. 15.

Tuition Hike Eyed
Chancellor Roy Lieuallen has suggested holding faculty salaries at present levels and boosting tuition and academic requirements, the latter to hold enrollment to this year's levels.

Proposed cuts also would affect the University of Oregon Medical School Hospital by cutting 46 beds and reducing the number of patients receiving crippled children's care. One ward at the tuberculosis hospital in Salem would be phased out but Lieuallen said no one needing treatment would be denied it.

A cutback of \$8.2 million would affect such items as educational television, agriculture experiment station work and forestry and fishery research.

One proposal called for raising of annual tuition by \$75, or \$25 a term.

Some college presidents appeared to be against a proposal to raise entrance requirements for Oregon students above the present two-point, or "C" average. One suggestion would have students with lower high school grades deferred until winter term.

Lieuallen presented three top priority capital improvement projects among those now frozen. They are, in order, a science building for Portland State; funds for Campbell Hall at Oregon College of Education, and money for access walks to the new building at Oregon Technical Institute in Klamath Falls.

Primitive area plan refused

Application for a winter-sports development inside the Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area on the eastern slopes of Three Fingers Jack has been turned down by the Forest Service.

Resorts, roads, and mechanized equipment are excluded from Primitive, Wilderness, and Wild areas of the National Forests. These classified wilderness-type areas are established for public benefit as natural, undeveloped environments, it was explained by J. Herbert Stone, Regional Forester.

The application for the winter sports development, by Western Star Development Company of Salem, would involve construction of about five miles of access road from the Santiam Highway in the vicinity of Square Lake in the Deschutes National Forest. The Mt. Jefferson Primitive Area also includes portions of the Wilamette and Mt. Hood National Forests.

Proposal for reclassification of the Primitive Area to Wild Area status was announced by the Forest Service in August. A public hearing, to give interested persons an opportunity to present their views, will be held sometime after February 5 if there is sufficient demand.

Prosecution rests its case in murder trial

SEATTLE (UPI) — The prosecution rested its case here Tuesday in the first degree murder trial of Mrs. Thelma Ann Swenson, 28, who is accused of murdering the husband of Mrs. Mary Campbell, 39, in 1961.

Mrs. Swenson, on trial for the second time on the charge, is charged with persuading Frederick Arthur Ferguson to kill Mrs. Campbell, the mother of six children, in her Kent home.

Both Ferguson and Mrs. Swenson were convicted on the original charge but the State Supreme Court last June ordered a new trial for Mrs. Swenson ruling she had been denied a fair trial. Ferguson is serving a life sentence in the state penitentiary on his conviction.

Curtis Campbell, 45, now of Athens, Ala., the husband of the slain woman, testified Tuesday. He said there had never been a romantic relationship between him and Mrs. Swenson.

In an opening statement earlier in the trial the prosecution contended Campbell had become the "focal point" of Mrs. Swenson's interest prior to the crime.

Bend man joins Army Reserves

James S. Dalrymple Jr. of 615 Georgia Avenue, has enlisted in the Army Reserves with the 210th Transportation Company (heavy truck), located in Prineville. Dalrymple joined the 210th Transportation Company during a drill last Monday night.

Under present military regulations, Dalrymple will serve approximately 19 weeks of active duty at Fort Ord, Calif., and then attend reserve meetings with the 210th Transportation Company until his military obligation is fulfilled. In the reserve unit Dalrymple will be trained as a heavy truck driver.

Prior to moving to Bend last year, Dalrymple lived in Yakima, Wash. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James Dalrymple, Yakima. At the present time he is employed by the Cascade Natural Gas Corporation.

15 days given for complaint

SALEM (UPI) — Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. Tuesday was given 15 days in which to file an amended complaint against Harrison E. Spangler.

Marion County Circuit Judge George Duncan ruled that Appling's original complaint insufficiently stated a cause of action.

Spangler is the author of a book titled "The Political History of Wayne Morse." Appling has charged that the book was campaign literature against Morse, and that Spangler should be required to file publication and distribution expenses as campaign expenses under Oregon election law.

Spangler claims he is not required to do so under the law.
