

FCC warns of transmittal of information relative to New Hampshire 'sweeps'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A Federal Communications Commission (FCC) official warned today that broadcasters face possible stiff penalties if they transmit information about the New Hampshire sweepstakes "under the guise of a news story."

The New Hampshire lottery—based on horse races at Rock-

ingham race track—will pay up to \$200,000 to holders of winning tickets sold by the state. It is the first state-operated lottery since Louisiana abolished one in 1894.

FCC Secretary Ben F. Waple urged broadcasters to exercise "great care" in airing stories relating to the lottery which begins next year. He said that only "in unusual cases" would lottery information be considered news.

Waple made his comments in reply to a letter from Richard G. Rozek, president of the United Press International Broadcasters Assn. of New Hampshire. Rozek asked FCC Chairman E. William Henry for guidelines in broadcasting lottery information.

Rozek asked whether the FCC would authorize the transmission of numbers and winners of the sweepstakes. He also said, "we assume, or course, that legitimate news about the lottery is authorized by the commission."

Waple noted that federal criminal law forbids broadcasters from transmitting "information concerning any lottery" with penalties ranging up to loss of license and \$1,000 fine and one year of imprisonment. He said the FCC "may not authorize actions contrary to the criminal statute."

The FCC official also took issue with Rozek's assumption that the FCC would approve news stories about the lottery.

"It must be pointed out that this assumption may not be justified in view of the statutory prohibition..." Waple said.

The period for which wages were sought was from Aug. 27, 1962, through January, 1963.

Chiang marks 76th birthday

TAIPEI, (UPI) — Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek today marked his 76th birthday, still the unquestioned leader of Nationalist China but no closer to his dream of returning to the Communist-ruled mainland.

Chiang appears in good health and looks 20 years younger than he is.

But at his age the question of who will succeed him is a pertinent one.

Vice President and Premier Chen Cheng is next in line constitutionally. But Chen has been ill for years and it is possible he will not be available when the time comes.

The only other man generally considered in line for the job is Chiang Ching-kuo, the Generalissimo's oldest son.

The 54-year old lieutenant general holds several nominal jobs in the Kuomintang party, including one that gives him a place in the cabinet.

Water backs up behind dam

PORTLAND (UPI) — Filling of the reservoir behind the \$54.7 million Cougar Dam on the McKenzie River's south fork probably will be completed about the end of November, Army Engineers said today.

Filling of the reservoir started Sept. 23. The dam, at 515 feet above the foundation, is the highest rockfill dam ever built by Army Engineers.

Cougar Dam, located about 50 miles east of Eugene, joins eight other completed flood control dams in the Willamette Basin, with a total investment of almost \$300 million.

ACCEPTS RESIGNATION

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy has accepted the resignation of two members of the Civil Rights Commission and its staff director.

The White House announced Wednesday that those resigning were Commissioners Spottswood W. Robinson III and Robert G. Sotrey, and staff Director Berl I. Bernhard. Robinson has been named a federal judge for the District of Columbia.

Hoffa denies charge he owes on 1959 taxes

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has charged that Teamster President James R. Hoffa and his wife owe \$20,295 in additional income taxes for 1959, it was disclosed today.

Hoffa challenged the claim and has asked for a trial on the issues in federal court in Detroit.

The Teamster leader's latest run-in with the federal government came to light when he filed notice with the U.S. tax court that he would fight the IRS determination.

The government said that union-paid insurance, legal fees, hotel expenses and transportation for Hoffa fell in the category of personal income and that he should have paid taxes on it.

In their answer, the Hoffas claimed these payments were not subject to taxation on grounds they were either tax-exempt or ordinary and necessary expenses connected with his business as a union officer.

The IRS said the Hoffas' taxable income for 1959 was reported as \$71,407.25 and a tax of \$33,706.73 was paid by the union chief and his wife.

The government contends their taxable income should have been listed at \$100,519.77. The tax on that would be \$54,001.85.

The tax proceeding is civil, not criminal.

In addition, the government said that Hoffa claimed \$10,000 too much in a capital loss carryover deduction from 1958 to 1959 in connection with the sale of the Hoffas' interest in Joll Properties. Hoffa said the amount deducted was correct.

The legal fees apparently were paid in connection with Hoffa's federal trial in New York City on wiretapping conspiracy charges. He was acquitted after the second trial. The first ended in a hung jury.

New bargaining talks underway

PITTSBURGH (UPI) — Bargaining between representatives of the Westinghouse Electric Corp. and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW) resumes today in the face of a strike deadline at midnight tonight.

Federal mediators, who helped settle the company's contract dispute with the International Electrical Workers Union (IUE) earlier, gave no indication of any progress after day long sessions Wednesday.

The federal mediators entered the IBEW - Westinghouse talks Tuesday.

The union represents 12,000 members at 60 Westinghouse locations. If no agreement is reached by midnight tonight, about 600 workers at 20 locations will be free to strike.

The 40 other locations where the IBEW is represented operate under local contracts and would be unaffected.

Meanwhile the company is also negotiating with the United Electrical Workers (UE) union which has been bargaining on a day-to-day basis since Oct. 14 under a contract extension.

SUM RESTORED

WASHINGTON (UPI)—House and Senate conferees have restored \$1,060,000 to the military construction authorization bill for a large crane at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard, Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D-Wash., said today.

Funds for the crane, to be used at a new drydock, were cut by the House but restored by the Senate.

Mrs. Luce comes to the defense of Madame Nhu

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former Ambassador Clare Boothe Luce charged Wednesday that Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu has been treated "as a vicious enemy of our country."

She said that by comparison Soviet Premier Khrushchev had been treated like a public hero during his visit to America.

Writing in the current issue of the National Review Magazine, Mrs. Luce defended South Viet Nam's first lady against charges that her government was oppressing Buddhists.

Taking note of American criticism that the Diem family controls the South Viet Nam government Mrs. Luce said that because of the Kennedy administration it amounted to the pot calling the kettle black.

She said that President Kennedy had put "Bobby in control of our secret police—the FBI" and had engineered the election of his other brother, Teddy, to the Senate.

Svenson to stay in East Berlin

BERLIN (UPI) — A U.S. Army captain from Scranton, Pa., who defected to East Germany, said today he will live in East Berlin and work to inform Americans about communism.

Alfred Svenson, 31-year old Lithuanian-born soldier, crossed the East-West border on May 4 and asked to be allowed to stay in Communist East Germany. He was given a minor editorial job with the East German radio.

Svenson recently denied reports that he tried to flee back to the West and was beaten by Communist plain-clothesmen.

"As a journalist I want to do my part to contribute to a policy of peaceful coexistence and help avert a new war," he said today in the East German magazine Zeit Im Bild.

Svenson claimed one of the reasons he deserted was that he was forced to tell lies about communism to the men under him.

"I asked the German Democratic Republic for asylum because the contradiction between what I was allowed to tell my soldiers and what I knew about the realities caused the pangs of conscience," said Svenson.

Coos Bay girl crash victim

COQUILLE (UPI) — A one car accident on Highway 42 between Coquille and Myrtle Point took one life and injured three other persons early today.

State police identified the victim as Diana Lee Russell, 18, Coos Bay.

Injured in the crash were Keith Brame, 21, Empire; Guerry New, 21, Empire; and Janet Hendricks, 19, Myrtle Point. Officers said the car went off the road about 12:30 a.m. today.

No relief seen in sight in drought-stricken area

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The eastern two-thirds of the United States remains, for the most part, in the grip of an old-fashioned drought and government weather experts see no good possibility of relief in the near future.

November is a month when weather can change fast. But forecaster James O'Connor said

today the freakish mound of high pressure that has kept parts of the country bone dry for as long as six weeks shows no sign of breaking up.

There have been a few cases of local relief in the drought area east of the Rockies. But most of these have been nothing more than temporary, weather experts said. The untoward effects in this harvest season have been chiefly shortages of reservoir and well water, dry pastures, parched winter plantings of small grain and fire-threatened forests.

No major forest fires have been reported although the East and Southeast are described by the Agriculture Department's forestry branch as in "very critical" danger from the dryness.

There have been reports of towns bringing in water by pipeline when local supplies were on the verge of drying up. Pastures in the Midwest have had some relief in the last few days but sections of

the area got only enough moisture to help for a few days.

The winter wheat crop is not yet in danger in the Great Plains, the weather bureau's crop bulletin said, but east of Kansas and Nebraska dry weather already is retarding germination.

Fall crops such as the Midwest's vital corn harvest were helped by the dry weather in one aspect. The corn was low in moisture content, which is good. However, some cornfields in the Midwest were so dry until rains of last week that farmers were reluctant to take mechanical equipment into them for fear of touching off fires, climatologist John Baldwin said.

Holmer plans return to job

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (UPI) — Freeman Holmer said today he will return to his duties as Oregon director of finance and administration prior to the Oregon legislature's special session next month.

Holmer took a leave of absence from his post earlier this month to conduct a market survey for a private firm. He is in Albuquerque attending the Western Conference of the Council on State Governments.

"Initial findings of the survey did not warrant a recommendation to the firm that the survey be completed at this time," Holmer said today.

"Accordingly, I have requested and Governor Hatfield has granted a termination of my leave of absence in time to participate in preparations for the special legislative sessions scheduled for Nov. 11."
