## Archaeologists set symposium

The Very Rev. Sherman E. Johnson, dean of the Episcopal Seminary in Berkeley, Calif., and his wife will conduct a symposium based on their archaeological expeditions, on Saturday, November 2 at the Trinity Episcopal Church. Hours are from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 5 p.m.

## Belton leaves posts vacant

**SALEM (UPI)**—State Treasurer Howard Belton said today he would not fill four vacant positions in his office, but otherwise planned no budget reductions.

The Finance and Administration Department cannot cut the treasurer's budget. Budgets of constitutional offices—secretary of state, governor, treasurer, courts or the legislature—do not come under allotment control.

Belton said the budget approved for his department by the legislature didn't contain any fat. He said he had to maintain his present staff to maintain the required level of service.

Both the governor and secretary of state announced they would make reductions in their budgets after voters rejected the income tax increase at the Oct. 15 election.

## FIRE DESTROYS COTON

**HOLLY SPRINGS, Miss.** (UPI) — Fire destroyed \$1 million worth of cotton on a train Thursday and then was swept by strong winds into the Holly Springs National Forest.

The flames leaped to the 500 cotton bales on five flat cars from grass fires along the railroad tracks. Fires also destroyed an old church building and one under construction at the community of Hickory Flat.

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## Council seat due for Czechs

**UNITED NATIONS, N.Y.** (UPI) — Czechoslovakia today appeared assured a seat on the U.N. Security Council in an East-West compromise agreement splitting its term with the new British Commonwealth Federation of Malaysia.

General Assembly President Carlos Sosa Rodriguez of Venezuela scheduled the routine election for the afternoon session. In the morning, Secretary General Thant planned to report on Portugal's African policy.

The agreement on the council elections was worked out earlier in the week to break a voting deadlock. In 11 ballots, neither Malaysia nor Czechoslovakia reached the required two-thirds majority.

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## Algerians open attack against town on border

**RABAT, Morocco (UPI)**—Algerian forces launched a massive artillery and infantry attack against the border town of Figuig at dawn today. A short time later, King Hassan of Morocco announced that his troops had withdrawn about a mile from the town.

Figuig is 37 miles northeast of Colomb Bechar. With an estimated population of more than 10,000 persons, it is the biggest town yet to figure in the Algerian-Moroccan border fighting.

On French maps it is shown about three miles inside Morocco. The attack began at 7 a.m., today, the king said, some 18 hours before the cease-fire, agreed to at Bamako this week, is scheduled to come into force. The truce was signed by Hassan and Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella.

Reports from the front said the Algerians also were attacking Mengoub, an important road and rail center 45 miles west of Figuig and shown on French maps as about 15 miles inside Morocco.

The king called newsmen to his throne room at midday and told them "a criminal Algerian attack has been in progress since this morning against Figuig."

He said the population of Figuig suffered "loss of lives and property among men, women and children." Border reports said the Algerians used artillery and heavy mortars to shell the town before their infantry moved in.

The king said Figuig was defended by one company of Moroccan army troops. Correspondents who visited the town recently said arms had been handed out to civilian volunteers to defend the town.

The Moroccan news agency MAP reported that "the civilian population is resisting heroically."

## 3 trapped miners brought safely out of German mine

**PEINE, Germany (UPI)** — Three men trapped more than a week in a flooded iron mine rode a steel capsule one at a time to the surface today.

Officials said they went directly into a decompression chamber on top of the mine to prevent them from getting a case of the "bends" following their long ordeal under high air pressure.

Rescue worker Paul Syska went down in the capsule first through a 262-foot escape shaft punched through to the miners by an American-made drill early today in a precision operation. He helped them into the 10-foot-long capsule and they rode to the surface one at a time.

Syska then made the last trip to the surface and joined them in the decompression chamber.

They were expected to spend

about three hours in the decompression chamber becoming accustomed to normal air pressure. They had been caught in a 300-foot-long air bubble in which the pressure was the only thing keeping the water from them.

Emil Pohlai, 34, was the first of the trapped miners to be rescued, followed by Fritz Leder, 36, and Gerhard Hanusch, 43. Pohlai entered the decompression chamber shortly after noon (6 a.m., EST) and Syska, the last man, climbed into it 23 minutes later.

The rescue capsule was tested by ballast before Syska went down in it. Strict secrecy was maintained until he did.

## Honors received by Allen cow

"Sunnyrest Vivid Laree," entered by Lawrence Allen of Bend, won the junior Guernsey female honors Thursday night at the Grand National Livestock Exposition in San Francisco.

The top winner was one of three Guernseys entered by Allen. LaFair Acres Norwyn Labeth, eight-year-old producing cow, placed second in the aged cow class. Her daughter, Ubilla Watchful Lymph, placed seventh among two-year-olds.

Allen's cows were among 24 Guernseys entered from Oregon, comprising the second-place state herd. He made the trip to California with Mr. and Mrs. Hans Leuthold, Tillamook.
