

Police disperse roving Negroes in Philadelphia

Police dispersed roving bands of Negroes Thursday night in a Philadelphia neighborhood that was the scene of rioting earlier this week.

About 200 officers, directed by police Commissioner Howard R. Leary, kept Negroes from congregating on various streets in a new protest against the slaying of a Negro theft suspect by a white policeman.

Patrolman John Tourigan, who said he fired in self-defense when the Negro lunged at him with a knife Saturday night, has been suspended during an investigation of the shooting.

Elsewhere in the nation:

New Orleans—Police arrested 25 Negroes in City Hall Thursday. The Negroes had entered the City Council chamber, the cafeteria and the mayor's reception room to emphasize their desegregation demands.

Jackson, Tenn.—Four Negro college students were arrested Thursday during sit-in demonstrations at a number of restaurants. They later were released.

Americus, Ga.—Five civil rights workers were to begin testimony today in a federal court hearing into state charges of insurrection against four of them.

Jackson, Miss.—A state court Thursday recessed until Dec. 17 a hearing on the city's request for a permanent injunction against racial demonstrations.

Memphis, Tenn.—The International Association of Fire Chiefs, meeting here, said Thursday firemen should not be used to aid police in quelling riots and mob demonstrations.

Richmond, Va.—A federal appeals court Thursday overruled a lower court and ordered that a desegregation order against the Arlington County school board remain in effect.

Montgomery, Ala.—A new appeal attempt by a Negro woman held in contempt of court for demanding to be addressed as "miss" while on the witness stand has been turned down by the state Supreme Court.

Washington—President Kennedy said Thursday he hoped U.S. Steel Corp., the biggest employer in Birmingham, Ala., would work toward racial harmony in that troubled Deep South industrial city.

Stinson calls for resignation of Gilpatric

SEATTLE (UPI)—Rep. K. W. (Bill) Stinson, R-Wash., Wednesday called for the immediate resignation of Assistant Secretary of Defense Roswell Gilpatric.

Stinson, in a speech before the Seattle Downtown Rotary Club, said Gilpatric was involved in a possible conflict of interest "to an even greater degree" than resigning Navy Secretary Fred Korth in the awarding of the TFX fighter plane contract to General Dynamics.

The Boeing Co., headquartered in Seattle, was General Dynamics' chief rival in the bidding for the TFX contract.

Stinson said Gilpatric was a partner in the law firm of Craveth, Swaine and Moore. He said this firm received more than \$300,000 in legal fees from General Dynamics between 1958 and 1963.

The last fee paid was \$31,500 in the first quarter of 1963 after Gilpatric had become assistant secretary of defense, Stinson added.

He said Gilpatric handled the General Dynamics account when he was a member of the law firm. After Gilpatric had taken a leave of absence to enter the Defense Department, the account "was taken over by Mr. Moore, who also became a member of the board of directors of General Dynamics," Stinson charged.

He added that Gilpatric has received fees from Craveth, Swaine and Moore for past services rendered since becoming assistant defense secretary.

Mayor in audience Eyewitnesses describe blast tragedy

EDITOR'S NOTE — Indianapolis Mayor Albert Losche was in the audience when an explosion ripped the Indiana State Fairground Coliseum Thursday night. This is his story.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—I've never seen anything like it. It's the worst tragedy in the history of Indianapolis.

It must have been some sort of gas explosion, but I don't know for sure. Ordinarily, I would have been sitting in the section that blew up. I always get 10 Shrine Night tickets on the south side of the coliseum, but this year I was late buying my tickets and ended up on the extreme north side.

Everybody was enjoying the show, but all of a sudden there was a terrific explosion and bodies started flying onto the ice. Flames were shooting 25 to 30 feet into the air.

Fumes started building up and people were screaming and trying to get out. The aisles were all jammed and it was very difficult to get out of the building.

Just about the time I got my guests outside the first firemen showed up to put out the fire.

EDITOR'S NOTE — Richard Crowell, 20, Indianapolis college student, was with his parents and girlfriend at the Indianapolis Coliseum when an explosion ripped through it. The following is his account.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI)—They had this special where you buy two tickets and get two free. My folks got the tickets and invited me to bring my girl.

Dad got box seats that were right above one of the main sections. In front of us there were about 10 rows of wooden chairs with people right next to the ice.

The show was superior to any we had seen before. The skit just before the finale involved two comedians who slid off the ice with firecrackers going off.

Then the finale began and just when the stars were going through their final spins, there was this great noise — like a huge firecracker.

All around us was the smell of smoke and the dust of the explosion. About 15 feet away was a geyser of flame. I didn't know where my mother or father were but Karol (17-year-old girlfriend) was on my right. She was half buried in the rubble. I was thrown up in the air. I lost my glasses.

If I hadn't been holding on to Karol I probably wouldn't have found her.

I pulled her out by the arm-pits, she was unconscious. My left leg had been wedged into the rubble, I sprained it when I pulled it out.

There was popcorn from the concession stand beneath us ... all over us.

I carried Karol to a section that was still standing. I could see people screaming and running. Legs and arms were sticking out of the rubble.

On the way out we had to cross persons I believe were dead. One man had his head sticking in the flames.

When we got outside, Karol was crying. Dad met us and feared another explosion. We heard ambulances but decided it would be quicker to go by car.

Dad drove us, honking through several red lights, down to St. Vincent Hospital. We were among the first to arrive at the hospital.

School fund raid charged

EUGENE (UPI)—Sen. Edward Fadeley, D-Eugene, charged today the governor was "raiding the basic school fund in favor of welfare."

Fadeley referred to a \$1.2 million reversion balance in the basic school fund which has been earmarked for the Welfare Department.

"In effect, the governor is trying to appropriate money to welfare which the legislature has already appropriated for basic school support. The mechanics of the transfer don't quite show this, but the results are the same," Fadeley said.

"The result is that local school district voters will be asked to vote property taxes to replace money sliced off from the basic school fund—the same as a local property tax for welfare," the Eugene senator said.

"This action on the governor's part is in my judgment improper. The legislature appropriated the money for schools, the governor should not try to appropriate it for something else."

CONSERVES WATER SUPPLY

NEW YORK (UPI)—Armand D'Angelo, city commissioner of water supply, gas and electricity, has taken another step in the campaign to conserve New York's dwindling water supply.

D'Angelo said Thursday that he was having his official limousine washed with a bucket of water rather than a hose.

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JFK assures troops to stay in W. Germany

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy has given flat assurance that U.S. combat forces in Germany will remain there at present strength.

Moving to calm West German jitter caused by reports of a U.S. troop reduction, Kennedy told his news conference Thursday: "We intend to keep our combat forces in Germany as they are today; that is, more than six combat divisions."

Kennedy said that as part of a reorganization of the Army's European logistics (supply) forces, there are plans for some reduction of "non-combat" personnel.

"But we do not," he said, "intend to bring back any units or personnel whose return would impair the military effectiveness of our forces in Germany."

Pentagon sources indicated some combat reductions had at one time been proposed, but were overruled in the face of strong West German objections. Earlier Thursday reports from Europe had predicted return of 5,000 or more men, including an armored cavalry regiment from Germany.

Kennedy told newsmen that not only would the six U.S. Army combat divisions stay in Germany, but also six additional combat units sent in during the 1961 Berlin crisis would remain "as long as there is a need for them."

'Miss Teenage' to be selected

DALLAS (UPI)—"Miss Teenage America, 1964," will be crowned tonight in a dazzling, nationally televised pageant featuring 50 of the nation's most poised and lovely 13 to 17-year-olds.

Six semi-finalists were announced Thursday, and will be spotlighted in the hour-long telecast. Each of the 50 contestants will be introduced while the program builds toward the crowning.

Semi-finalists are Mary Jane Daly, 15, Miami Beach, Fla.; Judy Doll, 17, Akron, Ohio; Peggy Ann Nielsen, 17, Seattle, Wash.; Marilyn Roat, 17, Shreveport, La.; Eileen Melody Speerin, 15, New York City; and Jeanine Zavrel, 16, Washington, D.C.

In a blaze at the Mayaguez Theater in San Juan, P.R., 150 persons died June 20, 1919. A fire in the Ringling Brothers circus tent in Hartford, Conn., killed 168 persons July 6, 1944.

Most recently, a circus fire in Niteroi, Brazil, Dec. 17, 1962, killed 323 persons and injured 800.

Schools set open house

MADRAS — Open house at all Madras schools has been announced for the first and second weeks in November in observance of American Education Week.

Madras high school has scheduled a Parent's day for November 7 at which time parents will meet at 8 p.m. for a general session and then will follow their child's normal schedule for 15 minute periods. Teachers in the classes will discuss course work and objectives of the course. Refreshments will be served at the conclusion of the meeting in the school library.

On November 12 at 7:30 p.m. the junior high school will have a similar program with parents attending seven minute classes to hear teachers explain course procedures and objectives.

Madras grade school will have an open house at 7:30 p.m. on November 14 when parents can meet and talk with the teachers.

Others never came home. An explosion ripped through a huge section of a coliseum at Indianapolis, Ind., where thousands of parents had taken their children for a special Halloween "treat"—a visit to an ice show.

Massive chunks of concrete and tiny bodies flew through the air, showering the glittering ice with dead and injured. At least 67 persons were dead and 331 injured.

Another explosion shattered a drug store filled with shoppers and children dressed in Halloween costumes in Marietta, Ga., killing seven persons and injuring others.

The blast came as hundreds of persons gathered for an informal Halloween parade. Boys and girls in gawdy and grotesque costumes milled about as ambulances screamed back and forth in the night.

A speeding car at Chattanooga, Tenn., swerved out of control on a street corner and slammed into four young girls making "trick or treat" rounds. Two of the girls, aged 6 and 14, were killed. The other two were seriously injured.

Other boys and girls were struck and killed by cars at Los Fresnos, Tex., Southampton, Mass., Wadsworth, Ohio, and Broussard, La. A 4-year-old girl wearing a scary mask darted between parked cars at Detroit, Mich., was hit by another car and critically injured.

A 10-year-old boy was found hanged in his bedroom at Groveland, Mass., a short time after his parents told him he could not go to a Halloween party. The death was ruled a suicide.

A woman at Collingswood, N.J., gave boys and girls about 500 pills and capsules ranging from sleeping tablets to drugs used in the treatment of heart victims. She said she thought the capsules were candy.

Bandits took advantage of Halloween to stage hold-ups. Two bandits, one wearing a black Halloween mask, robbed the owner of a hot dog chain of \$1,500 at Johnston City, Ill. Two men wearing masks stole \$11,000 in gems from a jewelry salesman at Prairie Village, Kan.

"BOOMERANG" RETURNS STOCKBURY, England (UPI)—William Reed said today his mongrel puppy has returned to his home here three times after being sold.

The dog's name is "Boomerang."

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
