

Alternate water plan certain to raise hackles

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—A Los Angeles city official Friday suggested an alternative within the Udall water plan that was certain to raise hackles in the Pacific Northwest.

Samuel B. Nelson, general manager for the Los Angeles Department of Water and Power, urged construction of a 59-mile aqueduct to tap surplus water in the Snake River, a tributary to the Columbia River.

"They're going to scream," Nelson said of the northwesterners, who have so far done everything possible to protect their water and power resources against outside use.

Nelson made his suggestion during a special meeting of the California Water Commission, called to take testimony on the five-state water plan proposed last August by Interior Secretary Stewart Udall.

The plan, aimed at easing water shortages in the booming desert regions of the Pacific Southwest, calls for exporting 2.4 million acre-feet of Northern California water annually into Southern California and Arizona.

It also proposed a vast system of dams, reservoirs and water conservation projects within the five states of California, Arizona, Nevada, Utah and New Mexico. Nelson said that he favored this part of the secretary's proposal.

Nelson proposed taking the 2.4 million acre-feet from the Snake at a point 20 miles northwest of Twin Falls, Idaho. After passing through his proposed aqueduct, it would dump into Lake Mead on the Colorado River, northwest of Las Vegas, Nevada.

"Under the plan advanced by Udall," Nelson said, "the cost of delivering the same amount of water (from Northern California) would be \$2.2 billion." He estimated his project's cost at \$1.4 billion.

Nelson said that water delivered through his Snake-Colorado project would cost approximately \$32 per acre foot. He said that Udall plan deliveries would cost \$44 or more for the same amount. (An acre-foot will cover one acre to a depth of one foot.)

Nelson said that his plan would enable the Metropolitan Water District, which serves six million persons in Southern California, to continue taking water from the Colorado River. Under the Udall plan, the district would eventually lose its Colorado River supply and face what Nelson called "the junking" of its aqueduct to the river.

"Even if the people of Southern California should be reimbursed for the money they have invested in this aqueduct," he said, "it would be a gross waste of resources to abandon a project that still has a useful life of 50 years or longer."

Nelson was among 30 witnesses representing nearly every facet of California opinion who testified in opposition to the Udall plan. Several also recommended against its introduction into Congress next year, as Udall plans to do.

Cancer traceable to virus may have been found

PORTLAND (UPI)—A British surgeon told the Oregon Society of Pathologists Friday night he believes he and his colleagues have found the first cancer traceable to a virus.

Dr. Denis Burkitt reported on his work with children in African hospitals. He said African lymphoma, found most commonly in children about seven years of age, appears to have the characteristics of a virus-caused cancer.

The tumors cannot be treated by surgery, but the Mulago Hospital at Kampala, Uganda, has had great success in chemotherapy through the use of Cytosin, he said.

Chemotherapy was tried because the hospital has no radiotherapy equipment, the Britisher said.

The cancer affects children of all races in Africa, but is not found at higher altitudes where the temperature drops below 60 degrees or in areas of sparse rainfall.

Sales tax bill to be offered

SALEM (UPI)—A sales tax bill that would raise \$48 million the last year of this biennium will be introduced at the special session of the legislature, Rep. Joe Rogers, R - Independence, said Friday.

Rogers called for the sales tax proposal to be submitted to the voters at the May 15 primary. He said co-sponsors of the plan are Sen. Eddie Aherns, R-Salem, and Reps. John Dellenback, R-Medford; Winton Hunt, R-Woodburn, and Mrs. E. G. Chulnard, R-Portland.

"If the measure were approved by the voters at the May 15 Primary, it would become effective July 1, 1964, the beginning of the second fiscal year of the biennium," Rogers said.

The sales tax proposal would exempt food, seed, fertilizer and prescription drugs.

Rogers said contemplated cuts in basic school support, building programs and other services and maintenance could be restored if the sales tax were adopted.

The proposal calls for 35 percent of the net proceeds to go for property tax relief, 15 percent for income tax reduction, and the remainder to the general fund. Rogers said this would mean about \$24 million for tax reduction and \$24 million additional to the state's general fund.

"It would also put Oregon on a sound financial basis for 1965," he contended.

Rogers said he did not believe the Oct. 15 vote was a mandate of the voters to cut the basic school support fund.

Accidents take lives of four in state Friday

Accidents claimed four lives in Oregon Friday. There were two traffic deaths, a hunting fatality and a logging death.

Madgie Laney, 46, Klamath Falls, was struck and killed by a car on State Highway 39 about 10 miles south of Klamath Falls. State police said she was crossing the highway when she was hit by a vehicle driven by Elmer Frisvold, 52, Tulelake, Calif.

Michael Latendresse, 17, Medford, died in a one-car accident in Medford. City police said the St. Mary's High School student was a passenger in a car driven by Stephen Erb, 17, Medford, which went out of control, hit several mail boxes and struck a utility pole. Erb was injured.

Sanford Nance, 51, Portland, was shot and killed while elk hunting about 40 miles northeast of John Day near the community of Granite. He was the state's 18th hunting season fatality.

State police were investigating but have been unable to determine who fired the fatal shot.

Floyd Ferguson of John Day, an employee of the San Juan Lumber Co., died when a falling tree struck the cab of a truck he was operating about 20 miles north of John Day near the community of Tinker Creek.

In addition, Grayce A. Drump, 55, Grants Pass, died of a heart attack Thursday after hunting elk 35 miles east of John Day.

Insurrection law struck down

AMERICUS, Ga. (UPI)—A three-judge federal tribunal Friday struck down Georgia's death-penalty insurrection law, freeing five civil rights leaders held in jail since last August.

The five walked out of jail after 70 days behind bars and immediately announced they would resume integrationist activities that had led to their imprisonment.

The federal action came after a day and a half of testimony in which Sumter County authorities admitted they had filed the insurrection charges to curb civil rights demonstrations that broke out in this south Georgia city last Aug. 8.

There were tears, handshakes and shouts of congratulations when the 2 to 1 decision was handed down leading to the freedom for John Perdue, 21, Denver, Colo.; Zev Aelony, 25, Minneapolis; Don Harris, 24, New York; and Ralph Allen, 22, Melrose, Mass., and Thomas McDaniel, Americus.

Harris and McDaniel are Negroes. The other defendants are white. McDaniel was jailed on charges of unlawful assembly.

Allen said that sheriff Fred Chappell approached him when he was released and said:

"I hope you have learned your lesson."

Allen said he replied: "I hope you have learned yours, too. Maybe if we keep learning we can straighten this out."

Weekly disease report issued

Jefferson County, with 20 cases of influenza, led three counties in numbers of communicable diseases listed this week by the Tri-County Health Department.

Other communicables listed by all its available medical sources were six gastro-enteritis, two chicken pox, two pneumonia and one shigella.

Deschutes County, with 72 percent of its sources reporting, listed five influenza, four pneumonia and two measles.

Crook County's 13 percent of sources announced no communicables.

Ullman sees area mecca for tourists

"Central Oregon will someday be one of the most widely advertised and popular tourist centers in the nation," predicted Congressman Al Ullman, speaking Friday to students at the Bend Senior High School.

Ullman discussed the "See America Year" resolution that he has sponsored in the Congress to encourage greater emphasis on tourist travel in the U.S. and to help relieve the critical balance of payments problem. He said that the response to his proposal has been "swift, enthusiastic and positive" and has already resulted in plans for a nationwide promotion campaign by interested trade associations.

"By helping to relieve our balance of payments problem, this campaign will, at the same time, give a shot in the arm to the nation's tourist areas. Oregon will benefit greatly by its participation," Ullman said.

"A further look into the future," Ullman told the group, "holds the promise of tremendous strides in the development of tourist and recreational resources of Central Oregon. As the Interstate Highway System becomes nearer completion, it will significantly shrink the distances that have limited family tourism in the past. New vistas will open for the city dweller seeking the wide open spaces."

"The scenic beauty of Oregon is unparalleled in this nation and affords the widest variety of recreational opportunities for travelers."

Ullman issued a challenge to Central Oregonians to "join together in a major community effort to attract and welcome tourists during See America Year."

Plans reported for oil drilling

PORTLAND (UPI)—Drilling for oil off the Oregon coast will begin in the summer of 1965, according to a prediction by Hollis Dole, director of the State Department of Geology and Mineral Industries.

He said Friday he has learned from the Bureau of Land Management that substantial amounts of Oregon and Washington coastal lands have been nominated for leased bidding.

He said that between 500,000 to 750,000 acres will be opened for lease bidding. More than a dozen companies have been conducting offshore oil exploration tests in recent summers, and Dole predicted an increase in that activity next summer.

Highlights of the Week

Fear may have triggered overthrow of Diem

Overthrow of the Ngo Dinh Diem regime in South Viet Nam may have been triggered by fear instead of discontent.

Diem's authoritarian government had been criticized repeatedly for its harsh actions against the Buddhists and some American financial aid had been withdrawn, but the regime remained in power.

There were persistent reports, however, that Diem emissaries were conducting secret talks with Communist North Viet Nam, whose Viet Cong guerrillas are at war with South Viet Nam.

Even though Diem was disliked because of his dictatorial ways, he was considered a lesser evil than Ho Chi Minh, the cunning president of North Viet Nam.

Brilliant Strategy
Ho has been a dedicated Communist through the years, a brilliant strategist whose army defeated the French at Dien Bien Phu, a victory that led to the partition of Viet Nam at Geneva and eventual French withdrawal from Indochina.

During the fighting in Asia during World War II Ho tried to line up with the United States Army but Gen. Joseph (Vinegar Joe) Stilwell would have no part of him, despite American need for more manpower.

It was recently reported that the bearded Ho called on Diem to declare South Viet Nam neutral and tell the Americans to get out. In turn, Ho would end the Viet Cong's activities.

Fears that any rapprochement with North Viet Nam eventually would end with Ho Chi Minh in control of both nations were evident.

Deal Reported
A Saigon Radio broadcast monitored in Tokyo Friday said "evidence" that Diem was trying to make a deal with Ho was one of the causes of the coup.

In November of 1960 two battalions of paratroopers descended on Saigon but were beaten off after two days of fighting.

In February of 1962 two planes bombed Diem's palace but he survived unscathed.

This time, however, the military turned against Diem and he didn't have a chance. The triumphant military called Diem's ouster a triumph for anti-Communism.

Indianapolis — An explosion killed 64 persons watching a Halloween ice show. At least 13 of the 340 injured onlookers were reported in critical condition. Cause of the blast is unknown but an investigating team reported suspicion that a broken valve on a gas tank may have been responsible.

Marrietta, Ga.—A blast in a drug store caused the death of seven persons.

Moscow — Russia sent up a new type satellite that can go from one orbit to another. Earlier Friday Khrushchev said he approved a joint U. S. - Soviet manned moon flight if "more practical steps in disarmament" can be reached.

New York—Party-giver Elsa Maxwell died at the age of 80. She had entertained royalty and heads of state for many years.

Algiers—A cease-fire between Algerian and Moroccan troops went into effect at midnight Saturday. Subsequent reports from Rabat said fighting was renewed when Algerians violated the border treaty.

Washington—A House committee cleared a \$600 million a year bill that would jump Congressmen's salaries from \$22,500 a year to \$32,500.
