## Race track suits planned by state

CORVALLIS (UPI) — The state of Oregon is planning to sue race tracks for unclaimed parimutuel winnings. Rep. Dick Hoyt, R-Corvallis, said today. The amount could run into several hundred thousand dollars, Hoyt indicated. He estimated about \$35,000 a year is unclaimed by holders of winning tickets at the horse and dog races. Track officials have denied that any such amount is involved.

The suit is being filed in Marion County Circuit Court through the State Racing Commission, the office of Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton said.

Hoyt said his investigation indicates race tracks now hold the unclaimed money for a year and then "absorb" it.

The attorney general's office said there is no statute of limitations on how far back the state could collect.

Hoyt said he had sought legislation requiring payment of the unclaimed winning to the state, but was told by state attorneys that such a law is already on the books.

## Jury awards vacation pay

Two former employees of radio station KGRL were awarded vacation pay totaling \$766.65, in a district court trial Friday. Attorney's fees of \$125 were also allowed.

N. O. Nilsen, commissioner for the Oregon Bureau of Labor was the plaintiff, on behalf of Barbara Lou Johnson, who was awarded \$493, and Shirley Anderson, now in Florida, who was awarded \$363.65.

The defendant was KGRL, Inc., an Oregon corporation, doing business as McAlpine Broadcasting Co.

## Commissioner urges changes in FCC set up

PORTLAND (UPI) — The Federal Communications Commission should revise the categories of information it seeks from broadcasting applicants and licensees, one of its commissioners said Friday.

Lee Loevinger, discussing FCC procedures before the fall meeting of the Oregon Association of Broadcasters, said the commission "must exercise imagination and flexibility in its approach to the problems of broadcasting."

Program information now being sought, he said, has "no relationship today to program quality, service to the public or any matter more significant than statistics so far as the commission is concerned."

Rather than seeking information only as to the numbers of commercials broadcast by a station, Loevinger said, the commission might well ask for the actual amount of time devoted to commercials.

He said the FCC still is considering possible limitations on commercial time. He said this might simply mean adoption of the code of the National Association of Broadcasters (NAB), but he asked for more imaginative suggestions from the industry.

An alternative, he said, was the possibility that the FCC might require every broadcaster in effect, to prescribe his own code and specify his proposed performance in terms of maximum commercial content and minimum news and public service content.

Edmund Bunker, president of the Radio Advertising Bureau, (RAB) told the Oregon broadcasters that radio is "underpriced" and stations should increase rates. He said they lagged behind those of other media and had barely kept up with the increase in living costs.

"Quality radio is not cheap, and our costs are going up," he said. "We can increase rates up to 50 per cent and still be the best advertising buy."

Dr. Robert E. Fischer, GOP county chairman, said he was amazed that the commission "completely ignored the precinct workers of the party" in passing over Paxson.

The vice chairman, Mrs. H.G. Russell, said she was "deeply disappointed" in the action.

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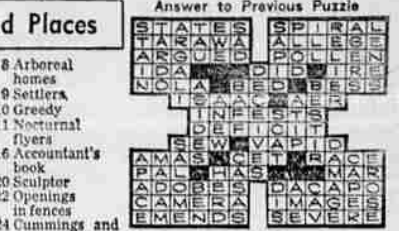

## Hard-nosed, tight-lipped prober sought for Baker investigation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Wanted: a hard-nosed, tight-lipped investigator to take charge of the Senate inquiry into the "outside activities" of former Senate official Robert G. (Bobby) Baker.

The Senate voted \$50,000 Friday night for a Rules Committee investigation of Baker's wide-ranging business ventures. The 35-year-old former page boy resigned his \$19,600-a-year job Oct. 7 after a number of his outside interests came to light.

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
