Bulldogs hand Buffs 40-14 pigskin lacing

MADRAS — Those Hermiston Bulldogs have done it again. . . another trip to Central Oregon and another victory.

This time it was 40-14 in a second half dash-away. Coach Frank Good's Madras White Buffaloes produced another good first half effort, but gave up the ghost in about the middle of the third quarter.

Actually, it was simply a case of too much Webb and some superb blocking. Bob Webb, Hermiston's tricky tailback in its single wing onslaught, turned in another top performance. He picked the Buff defenses apart with a wide variety of passes and then pulled the rug out several times by running instead.

Webb has gained more than 200 yards per game on the ground, himself. And according to Bulldog statisticians, after last night's exhibition he may be approaching the 2000 yard mark for the season.

Hermiston did it all in the second half. Madras took advantage of several Bulldog offensive errors in the first half and battled the visitors right down to the halftime whistle. The two squads retired at intermission deadlocked at 14-14.

But in the second half it was a different story. Hermiston managed to shake the jitters that kept them from jelling in the first half, and put on one of its top offensive displays of the season. Coach Bob George's charges also found the where-withal to apply the stopper on the Buffs.

Madras, known to go to rack and ruin defensively in second halves, might not have last night were it not for a very hard-luck booby. It was one of those kind that really kill.

It was in the middle of the third quarter, and the count was still knotted at 14-14. Madras found itself in a fourth and three situation on the Hermiston 47, and the Buffs decided to punt. Punter Bud Miller, ready for the snap, saw the center's pass soar over his head. He ran back, picked up the pigskin and eliminated two Bulldog tacklers before he was boomed down for a 23 yard loss.

This blew the lid off. It spelled doom for the locals. Hermiston took it on into the end zone from there (31 yard line) in five plays. In that series it was bruising line-smasher Terry Williams that contributed mightily to the cause, with a 12-yard burst up the gut. A 15-yard penalty for face mask grabbing added several yards more and Webb took it to pay-dirt from the 2 on the following play.

From that point on, the Buffs began to wane. Hermiston's power play to either side off the single wing, coupled with the fine running of Webb, began to rip the Buffs asunder. Hermiston moved the ball well during both halves via the air lanes. It was one of those same old stories for the Buffs. They got in the score board first, but

couldn't hold the lead. Hermiston couldn't move the ball on the first series of downs, and decided to pass on fourth down with two yards to go. Webb was nailed for a two yard loss.

Madras then took over on the Hermiston 45 and in seven plays pushed across the game's first tally. Buff scooter Alvis Smith hit off left tackle and boomed ahead for seven yards when he was hit by a Bulldog tackler. The unidentified defender tried to bulldog the Buff down, and in so doing hurled him into the end zone.

Harold Smith then drilled one through the uprights, and Madras was out in front 7-0 with just under four minutes gone in the contest.

It was then that the Bulldogs really put on the passing display. Webb hit Skip Shanafelt and Brad Cermak with three short bombs before Buff defender Bob Smith intercepted for Madras. But the Buffs could not move the ball either, so Miller punted and it went out of bounds on the Hermiston 49. The Bulldogs then began mixing the plays.

Two sizable gainers went on the ground. Webb picked up 15 and a first down when he swept left and then followed with 16 more when he cut inside left end. It was finally Webb crashing over right guard that produced the tally. John Seibel split the uprights for the extra point and it was knotted at 7-7.

A few minutes later Hermiston came right back with another. It was first down on the Madras 30, and Webb went back to pass but decided to run with the ball when he found the rush on and his receivers covered. He swept left then cut back to the right and went all the way. Seibel again split the uprights and the visitors were out in front 14-7. The TD was set up on two penalties (one a 15-yarder for face mask grabbing) and a 15-yard pass play from Webb

It was then that the Bulldogs put themselves in a fix which eventually resulted in a Buff TD. A clipping penalty made it second down and 30 on the 13 yard line. The dilemma was compounded when Buff troopers stormed Webb who decided to run with the ball instead of passing. He was nailed for an 11 yard loss. This forced the Bulldogs to kick, though it was only second down. It wasn't a good one and it went out on the Bulldog 34.

Madras then came alive. Two snucks at the center of the line produced four yards before quarterback Larry Barnes hit glue-fingered Doug Stewart with a pass. It went for eight and a first down on the Hermiston 23. Barnes followed with a keeper on an option pass-run play and picked up eight.

Barnes then hit Stewart with another bomb that covered 8 yards, and it was first and goal on the seven.

Alvis Smith then hit the line for two before he dented the line about four more. . . but he fumbled. The ball squirted loose twice in the scramble for it, and when they unstaked the pileup on the goal line, Frank Orrell was hugging the pigskin a foot inside the end zone. Only 1:31 remained on the first half clock. The conversion was a must for the Buffs.

Back to boot it was big 230-pound Harold Smith. A high pass from center, however, made him jump for it. Out of position to kick, he was forced to run. Crashing defenders were caught napping and "big Harold" churned the long 12 yards to paydirt to tie it up 14-14.

After that disastrous bad pass from center in the third quarter, Madras fell apart. The Bulldogs began to hit their stride.

Webb, who tallied 30 points on five TD's, scored three out of the four second half tallies. He took it over from 20 yards out on a fourth and goal situation. He ran with the ball instead of passing. Late in the fourth stanza he did it again, only this time he galloped 69 yards on a fourth and four situation. It was a power sweep. In between Webb's two TD's, Terry Williams picked up six points with a 2-yard smash over right guard.

Unbeaten Pendleton scores 46-14 victory over Baker

Unbeaten Pendleton and Parkrose scored their eighth wins of the season to win league titles and berths in the Oregon high school Class A-1 football playoffs Friday night.

Pendleton, ranked fourth in the Oregon Journal poll, rolled over Baker 46-14 at Baker to capture the Intermountain League championship. Parkrose, rated ninth, walloped Scappoose 40-0 at Parkrose to gain the Wilco League title.

Fifth-ranked Grant gained a tie for the Portland Interscholastic League championship and a berth in the playoffs by defeating Madison 14-7 at Madison in Portland. Eighth-rated Beaverton clinched a tie for the Metropolitan League crown and a probable spot in the playoffs by topping Clackamas 14-6 at Clackamas.

Grant also now has a 8-0 record.

Roseburg, the top-ranked team in the poll with a 7-0 mark, can virtually wrap up the Midwestern League title and a berth in the playoffs if it beats Marshfield at Coos Bay tonight.

In other top games Friday night, second-ranked Medford walloped Ashland 42-7 at Medford, sixth-rated North Salem shut out Lebanon 33-0 at Lebanon, seventh-ranked Central Catholic was upset by Gresham 3-0 in Portland and 10th-rated Cottage Grove defeated North Eugene 20-14 at Cottage Grove.

In class A-2 competition, Brookings virtually collected the Sunset League title with a 26-0 win over Bandon.

Juan Rocky Rivero snaps Fernandez KO win string

NEW YORK (UPI) — Despite a controversial knockdown, Juan (Rocky) Rivero's upset victory over middleweight contender Florentino Fernandez earned Rocky another television fight today at Madison Square Garden, Dec. 13.

The December opponent for Argentina's body-belter will be contender Rubin (Hurricane) Cartet of Paterson, N.J., matchmaker Teddy Brenner said.

Stocky Rivero, 26, snapped the 1963 knockout string of Cuban Fernandez at five straight Friday night on a unanimous decision in their nationally televised 10-round slugfest match at the Garden before about 1,800 rainy-night fans.

Rivero weighed 161 pounds; Florentino, 157½. Rivero, an underdog at 3½ to 1, was credited with an all-important knockdown in the eighth round. Fernandez and many observers claimed it was merely a "slip" without being hit.

"I had blocked a punch with my right glove," Fernandez explained in Spanish, "and was trying to counter with a left hook when my feet slipped out from under me. I wasn't hit."

Referee Johnny Colon, former light heavyweight contender, thought otherwise.

When Fernandez rose immediately, and Rivero tried to rush him, the referee pushed Rivero away and gave 27-year-old Florentino a mandatory eight-out on his feet.

The three ring officials favored Rivero on a rounds basis as follows: Colan, 5-4-1, judge Leo Birnbaum, 6-3-1, and judge George Walsh, 5-5 on rounds and 6-5 on points. New York state has a back-stopping points system in case a ring official has a rounds-even score.

The United Press International had Fernandez winning the bout, 5-4-1.
