...so Near and Yet so Foreign!

Our auto trip from Mexico City, on Sunday, Oct. 27, to Taxco (pronounced Tascó) took us over a four lane, modern highway to Cuernavaca. The mountain pass we crossed through is 10,000 feet high. The terrain is mountainous and covered with green vegetation, some being pine trees much like our own jackpine. Cuernavaca is a city of approximately 100,000 population. There are many fine homes there with outdoor swimming pools. Here we visited the original palace of Cortes with the large Diego Rivera Murals on the veranda. Hope the pictures we took of the mural turn out. The famous Borda Gardens are also here. We strolled in them, where once Carlota & Maximilian also walked. The Borda brothers are largely responsible for developing the silver mines at Taxco. From Cuernavaca we rode over winding roads to Taxco where we stopped overnight at the Hotel de la Borda. Taxco is a quaint and fascinating city, nestled in mountains at an elevation of about 5,000 feet. It is a town of the size of Bend in population. The government has maintained the town as a colonial monument. It has cobblestone streets, reminiscent of a Renaissance village of Old Italy. The Santa Prisca Church has the most elaborate altar and ornaments we have ever seen. It was built in about 1535. After an overnight stay, we motored over modern highways, through more mountainous country for three and one-half hours to reach Acapulco, the Riviera of the Western Hemisphere. Here we are staying at the Caleta Hotel, which is owned by Western Hotels. Our room has a terrace overlooking the beautiful bay & harbor. Dress is very informal here much like that in the Hawaiian Islands. Words simply cannot describe the beautiful setting in which this city is built. One has to see it himself to really appreciate it.

'Decent' aid bill expected

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leaders told President Kennedy today they expect to be able to come out of "a fairly long siege" of debate on foreign aid with a "decent" authorization measure.

The Senate bill to authorize \$4.2 billion for one more year of economic, military and technical assistance to friendly nations came up for discussion at Kennedy's weekly meeting with Democratic congressional leaders. The House has passed a \$3.5 billion authorization—\$1 billion less than that asked by the President.

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ORC meeting due Wednesday

The Oregon Reclamation Congress will open its 52nd annual meeting here tomorrow afternoon as various committees go into session to consider matters ranging from research and agriculture to new projects and public relations.

All meetings will be held at the Thunderbird, with the annual business session scheduled for November 8, final day of three day conference that will bring reclamationists here from all parts of the state.

Presiding will be John Stewart of Klamath Falls, ORC president, and joining in the discussions will be LaSelle Coles of Prineville, immediate past president of the National Reclamation Association. Coles, recently returned from a tour of Russia, will discuss reclamation projects in the Soviet Union.

Also participating in the Congress sessions will be Harold Nelson, Boise, Idaho. He is regional director of the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation. Nelson will be one of the featured speakers.

Dr. Emery Castle, OSU professor of agricultural economics, will discuss continued reclamation in the face of agriculture surpluses. State Rep. Kessler Cannon, Bend, will review happenings in the 1963 Legislature that apply to reclamation and agriculture.

Some 150 persons are expected for the meeting.

YOUTHS FINED

HAIFA, Israel (UPI)—Eight youths, all Jewish religious zealots, were fined and given suspended jail sentences Monday for rioting in a Christian school in September.

They were given the choice of a \$175 fine or 60 days in jail and nine month suspended sentences. They were also placed under \$80 bond for three years against their good behavior.

Nobel prize winners named

STOCKHOLM (UPI) — Two Americans, including a woman nuclear scientist, two Germans and an Italian today were awarded the 1963 Nobel Prizes in physics and chemistry.

The physics award winners were Dr. Maria Goeppert Mayer of the University of California, Prof. Eugene Wigner of Princeton University, and Prof. Hans D. Jensen of the University of Heidelberg.

The chemistry prize was shared by Drs. Karl Ziegler of Muehlheim, West Germany, and Giulio Natta of Milan, Italy.

Both prizes carry cash awards of \$51,158. Half the physics prize will be shared by Dr. Mayer and Prof. Jensen, with the other half going to Professor Wigner. Ziegler and Natta will split the chemistry prize equally.

Dr. Mayer and Jensen were given their award by the Swedish Academy of Sciences for their joint discoveries concerning nuclear shell structure.

Wigner's prize was for his contribution to the theory of the atomic nucleus and the activity of elementary particles.

COLDEST TEMPERATURE

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Possibly the coldest temperature ever recorded in the earth's atmosphere—minus 289 degrees Fahrenheit—was reported Monday by the federal space agency and Swedish researchers.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the University of Stockholm took the reading last August with a Nike-Cajun rocket.

Hoffa will meet with national and regional teamster officials Wednesday to appoint a committee to draft contract proposals for the negotiations. The Trucking Industry, Inc., a national organization, has been authorized to represent the truckers in the talks.

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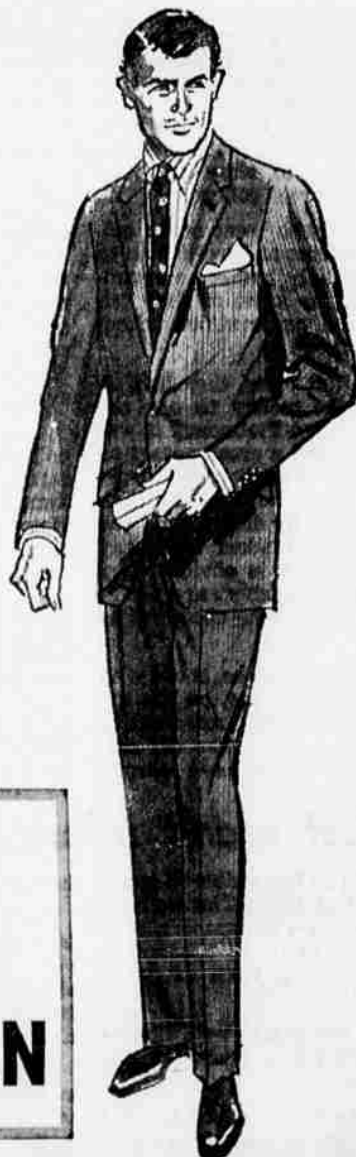
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
