

Young P-T Club discusses future plans for school

What is the fate of Young School?

This question was uppermost in the discussion, at a meeting of the Young School Parent-Teachers Club Tuesday night. The school, six miles east of downtown Bend, is one of the oldest in the county. It became a part of the Bend Administration District several years ago by consolidation.

Richard Wayman, who is president of the district school board and also zone representative for the Young community, presided at the meeting after being introduced by Mrs. Jack Kofford, PTC president. R. E. Jewell, superintendent of the Bend Public Schools, was present as a guest and assisted in answering questions.

The parents present were said to represent about 70 per cent of the school's enrollment. All of those who questioned Wayman and Jewell expressed satisfaction with Young's "country school" status. Several of those who spoke advocated either an addition to the present two-room - and - basement structure or a new school, with at least two rooms and provision for expansion, on the five-acre site.

Wayman pointed out that a plan to move the old Deschutes School and annex it to the building had been turned down by the State Board of Education, and said that it is his belief that an addition to the present school would be impractical.

"Why?" asked Mrs. Bruce Bekins. "All we need is a room. It needn't have expensive frills. We need another teacher and we need more space. A temporary building would be better than nothing."

Mrs. Don Peterman, whose family moved to Central Oregon two years ago from California, said that it has been proved that any building is obsolete by the time it is completed, and

that more space is needed now. Both she and her husband pointed to the residential growth in the area, and predicted that future growth will be spectacular. "Why wait until we are even more crowded?" they asked.

Reference was made to a recommendation of the district board, a year or so ago, to move the fifth and sixth graders to city schools. The plan was abandoned because of opposition in the community. Both Wayman and Jewell said that the idea was to relieve congestion, and be able to send more pupils in the first four grades, on fringe areas of the area now served by the school, to Young.

"My personal feelings are immaterial," Wayman said. "As zone representative on the board, I represent the wishes of the people in the community."

Wayman said that an addition or a new school are certainly possible, and have been discussed by the board. "The school obviously is needed," he said. "Otherwise, I can't see where the kids would go."

The new Bear Creek School, on east-side Bend, was built to allow the addition of eight more classrooms, it was pointed out. That school has already about reached its present capacity, Jewell said.

Many of the parents who spoke had praise for the Young School teachers, William Armstrong and Mrs. Mildred Poole, and said that they have too heavy a work load, but don't complain.

It was suggested that the district board hold a meeting soon at Young School, and Wayman said this would be completely agreeable, as visits to schools at the fringes of the district had already been planned.

Job placements by office here set new record

More non-farm job placements were made through the Bend area office of the Oregon Employment Service in October than for any similar month since 1953, Clark A. Price, office manager, reported today.

He said the estimated number of unemployed in the Central Oregon area totaled 800, the lowest estimated October unemployed figure since the fall of 1959. The estimated unemployed compares with 850 in the previous month, and 1,400 a year ago.

Two years ago, estimated unemployment totaled 1,450 in the big Central Oregon area, which includes the mid-Oregon counties and parts of four others. The rate of unemployment among insured workers in Central Oregon for the week ending October 21 was 2.7 per cent, as compared with 3.5 per cent a year ago. The average for the state was 2.7.

A total of 132 different non-farm employers placed job openings with the Employment Service in October. These openings represented 74 titles within the broad occupational groups. There was a heavy call for agriculture workers in October.

"Although this office has a good cross section of men and women applicants signed up for the Christmas season sales work, more will be needed to fill the holiday job openings," Price said.

Persons seeking holiday work are being asked to register, and employees are being requested to make their needs known.

More protection for American farmer is urged

BAKER (UPI)—The president of the American National Cattlemen's Association said today this country needs greater protection for agricultural products in world trade.

Cushman S. Radebaugh of Orlando, Fla., addressed the Oregon Cattlemen's Association. "No American wants to deny sincere competition to foreign farmers and stockmen, but a study of tariff and quota protection of various nations reveals that the U.S. is about the only country actually playing the game of free trade," he said.

Radebaugh said the United States charges only a "token tariff" of three cents a pound on imported beef. The two countries from which it mainly comes, Australia and New Zealand, "ban or severely restrict our shipments of livestock and agricultural products," he said.

Radebaugh recently returned from a tour of the "down under" nations. He said U.S. agriculture had been accused by free trade advocates of being "protectionist" when the opposite was true.

"That is why our trade negotiators and congressmen must reassess our position in the world and work toward more realistic protection for domestic agriculture," he said.

Medford man crash victim

MEDFORD (UPI)—Jerry Francis Bowling, 29, Medford, was killed in a one-car accident here shortly before midnight.

Police said Bowling, who was alone in the car, was traveling south on South Central Avenue when the car struck a utility pole. He apparently died instantly.

Conviction of Herrera upheld

SALEM (UPI)—The Oregon Supreme Court today upheld the second degree murder conviction of Robert E. Herrera of Klamath Falls.

Herrera was found guilty in Klamath County Circuit Court of kicking a 23-month old boy to death.

Also affirmed by the high court was the conviction of Gerald Arthur Williams of Eugene for contributing to the delinquency of minors. He was sentenced to two concurrent terms of five years in the state penitentiary.
