Agriculture Department issues prediction on 1963-64 livestock

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department predicts farmers will feed more beef cattle in 1963-64, slightly fewer hogs, and about the same number of poultry, as in 1962-63.

The volume of livestock fed is measured in terms of grain-consuming animal units. For example, a milk cow equals one animal grain-consuming unit. A beef cow represents 1.7 units. Cattle on feed represent two units each. A horse is one animal unit. Of the animals whose food capacity is small, it often takes many to comprise one unit. Eight sheep equal one unit. Similarly, 125 broilers equal one unit, 18 laying hens equal one unit, and 15 tom turkeys make up one unit.

The department said the total number of grain-consuming animal units to be fed in 1963-64 is expected to be 174 million, an increase of about a million over 1962-63.

The department said expansion in cattle feeding is expected to continue through most of 1963-64 in spite of lower cattle prices during recent months.

Wool Growers back sales tax

PORTLAND (UPI) — Oregon Wool Growers ended their annual convention here Tuesday with a resolution supporting a state retail sales tax to offset property and income taxes.

The wool growers also recommended that Oregon State University establish an IBM system to evaluate records of purebred sheep producers.

The sheepmen urged continuing vigilance against imports of sheep from Canada, suggested more research on methods of controlling scrapie, a sheep disease, and sought restoration of \$7,200 for control of predators in the state by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

George Rugg, Heppner, was re-elected president of the group. Other officers were Gaylord Madison, Echo, first vice-president; Harold Williams, Bonanza, second vice-president; and Jack Steiwer, Fossil, re-elected secretary.

Federal court orders Auburn U. to admit first Negro student

A federal court struck another blow against Alabama school segregation Tuesday by ordering state-supported Auburn University to admit its first Negro student.

District Court Judge Frank M. Johnson Jr. ordered the all-white institution to accept Harold A. Franklin at the beginning of the winter term and to accept students in the future without regard to race.

Gov. George C. Wallace has vigorously fought all other attempts to integrate state schools. He forced President Kennedy to call up federal troops to enforce the court-ordered integration of the University of Alabama last year and again in September when white public schools in four cities admitted Negroes.

The order would make Auburn the third college-level Alabama school to integrate. The university and Florence State College are the other two.

Other racial news:
Baton Rouge, La.: Civil rights workers sent a telegram to U.S. Atty. Gen. Robert Kennedy complaining that voter registration officials in five counties were discriminating against Negroes.

New Orleans, La.: Police arrested five whites and three Negroes when they attempted to integrate facilities at city hall.

Concord, N.C.: Carrabuse County School Board adopted a resolution clearing the way for school integration during the 1964-65 year.

Mobile, Ala.: Six segregationists who picketed an integrated lunch counter Tuesday were arrested when they refused to comply with a city law requiring pickets to have their pictures and fingerprints taken by police.

New York: Apartment dwellers in a Negro section of New York City have refused to pay

rent until alleged slum conditions are remedied.

Danville, Va.: A task force of integration workers arrived today to train Negroes for street demonstrations. The workers were dispatched by Dr. Martin Luther King's Atlanta-based Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) to back Negro demands for desegregation in stores and public facilities.

Jacksonville, Fla.: Federal Judge William A. McRae Jr. took under advisement Tuesday an NAACP suit seeking to halt arrests of anti-segregation demonstrators in St. Augustine.

Orangeburg, S.C.: Fourteen Negro children have applied for transfer to white schools and their parents threatened court action unless they are admitted.

Decatur, Ga.: Negroes petitioned the DeKalb County School Board Tuesday to appoint a bi-racial committee to arrange desegregation of the county's schools.

Raleigh, N.C.: Parents of 53 Warren County Negro children asked the U.S. Eastern District Court here Tuesday to desegregate the county school system.

Hard luck is continuing to plague Great Wallendas

SARASOTA, Fla. (UPI) — A high wire snapped with a resounding twang Tuesday when the Great Wallendas aerial troupe tried building a seven-man pyramid for the first time since tragedy struck at Detroit in January of 1962.

The fall this time was only from 12 feet, but three of the aerialists were treated at a hospital emergency room, three others received bad bruises, and the seventh was not injured.

Normally, the act is performed 40 feet above the ground, but the wire was lowered Tuesday for a cameraman filming the practice performance for a national television show, NBC's Show of the Week. The camera caught the entire sequence.

The mishap came as the nimble-footed circus performers climbed up the backs of one another to make the human pyramid on a thin steel wire. The second row of the pyramid was finished and the third row was being built when the wire broke.

The last time the Wallendas attempted the stunt publicly was before a circus audience on Jan. 30, 1962. Two of the performers were killed and a third crippled when the pyramid collapsed and the aerialists tumbled to the floor of the hall.

Three of the troupe working Tuesday — Karl, Gunther and Herman Wallenda — were in the pyramid at Detroit.

Tuesday, Gunther received

deep face lacerations and lost four teeth, Karl was treated for a possible pelvic injury, and Louis Murillo received wire burns, head and shoulder bruises.

Herman and Jennie Wallenda and Paul Jordan received minor bruises and Andy Anderson — the seventh aerialist — was uninjured.

The troupe is scheduled to make a final public perform-

ance of the pyramid at the Shrine Circus at Fort Worth, Tex., later this month.

"We want to show the people we can still do it and we are not afraid," Karl Wallenda said after Tuesday's accident.

During the pyramid act, he said, the aerialists will use a safety net for the first time. But he said the rest of their act will be performed without the net.
