Liston, Clay sign for Feb. 15-round bout

DENVER (UPI) — Heavyweight champion Sonny Liston and challenger Cassius Clay will meet next February in a 15-round title bout expected to carry the richest gate in boxing history.

The only details remaining are the exact date and the site. And backers of the fight were sitting back today considering the bids after promising an announcement Nov. 19 and making it plain the city with the most lucrative offer will get the bout.

Shortly after Liston and Clay signed for the fight Tuesday at the Denver Hilton Hotel, three separate offers of \$1 million guarantees, two from Los Angeles and the other from Miami, were reported by associates of the two principals. They said Las Vegas, Minneapolis and Chicago also bid.

Liston will get 40 per cent of an expected multi-million-dollar gross and Clay 22 1/2 per cent, a proportion Liston's backers said was the largest slice a heavyweight challenger has ever received.

Former champion Joe Louis and his United World Enterprises, Inc., of Los Angeles submitted the first offer of a \$1 million guarantee. George Parnassus of the Olympic Boxing Club, also of Los Angeles, was in with the second, and Miami promoter Chris Dundee was reported offering the third.

Rivalries, Too

For those who are grads of a small college, beating the neighboring institution on the last game of the season is just as important to them as the Ducks whipping Oregon State or vice versa.

Currently Oregon has a small college team that is among the very best in the nation. Lewis

& Clark, undefeated and untied in both conference and non-conference action, has been in the UPI top 20 for the past three weeks.

Last year and the year before it was Linfield. As a matter of fact, Linfield went as far as the small college playoff game... the Camellia Bowl. The Wildcats lost it to Pittsburg of Kansas, but they didn't lose it by much. Linfield, on that basis then, probably rated No. 2 in the country. Not bad for a college that has less than 1000 in enrollment.

One thing confuses me, however. Lewis & Clark last week arrived as UPI 12th on the poll, but this week after whipping Whitman College 40-0, the Pioneers are down in 15th.

Anytime you drop a couple of rungs on the UPI poll after winning 40-0, it doesn't speak too well for the poll. Polls are nothing to get excited about, when you realize how "fruity" they can be.

But it's still nice to see one of our Oregon teams on the national docket.

at UCLA full

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Warren Jackson worked out at fullback for the UCLA Bruins today in preparation for their meeting Saturday with the Air Force Academy.

Jackson, who holds a 3.05 yards per carry average this season, was placed at fullback after coach Bill Barnes said Tuesday Jim Colletto, the Bruins' leading ground-gainer, may not start against the Falcons due to a knee injury.

Meanwhile, the Bruins spent most of the afternoon working on their pass defense.

Germany, Canada take 1st 2 horse jumping titles

NEW YORK (UPI) — Germany and Canada have made off with the first two major jumping titles in the New York horse show — confirming the pre-show impression that the United States' domination of the current tour would be broken.

Kurt Jarasinski, Hermann Schridde and Alwin Schockemuehle of Germany won three of the first five places in Tuesday night's Democrat Memorial Challenge Trophy event after Gail Ross of Canada took first place in the afternoon's Mackay memorial challenge round.

United States' stars had dominated blue ribbons in the Pennsylvania and Washington, D.C., shows but foreign stars needed those shows to become accustomed to the smaller indoor rings in this country.

The only threat to the German sweep was by Frank Chapot of the United States, who had been the leading rider in the two previous shows. Chapot closed with the fast round he needed but his mount, Shady Lady, knocked down the last barrier.

No international jumping is scheduled for this afternoon but competition resumes tonight with the Murray Memorial Challenge Trophy.

Black Hawks go on rebound, win

The Chicago Black Hawks are on the rebound despite a nine-game unbeaten string. Tuesday night, the Hawks nipped the New York Rangers, 3-2, to tie a club record for an undefeated streak, but all three Chicago goals were scored on rebounds.

Bobby Hull slapped Red Hay's rebound past goalie Jacques Plante with only 20 seconds remaining in the game to hand the Rangers their third consecutive defeat. Earlier, Hay had scored himself on a 15-foot rebound shot and Stan Mikita had converted a Hal rebound into a second-period goal.

The Rangers had tied the game at 2-2 late in the third period on Vic Hadfield's goal. Dick Meissner scored the other New York tally.

Hay's goal occurred at 0:27 of the opening period and set the stage for Chicago's sixth straight home victory of the year. Mikita registered his score only seven seconds after he came out of the penalty box.

The win boosted the Hawks' first-place lead to six points and left the Rangers mired in fifth position.

Plante stopped 28 shots, and Chicago's Glenn Hall recorded 22 saves for the night.

More injuries hit UO Ducks

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — More bad news has descended on the injury-ridden Oregon football team.

Sophomore linebacker Don Causey was ruled out for the Ducks' last three games. He suffered a pinched nerve in his shoulder in an upset loss to San Jose State last weekend.

Meanwhile, All-American halfback Mel Renfro, quarterback Bob Berry, and tackle Ray Johnson were all doubtful for Saturday's battle at Washington State. Fullback Lu Bain has been working out at the quarterback spot.

Delaware takes over first place in UPI small college rate poll

NEW YORK (UPI) — Unbeaten Delaware, one-sided victor over major college competition twice this season, Wednesday edged past Northern Illinois into first place among the nation's small college football teams in the United Press International Board of Coaches ratings.

The Blue Hens routed Buffalo, a major college team, 34-6 last Saturday to climax a six-week drive to the top spot, held by Northern Illinois since the third week of the season. Delaware also romped by Ohio University, another major college outfit three weeks ago.

Northern's Huskies ran their winning streak to eight this fall by shading Western Illinois 29-22 but drew only 12 first-place ballots compared to 16 for Delaware. Florida A&M, No. 3, Northern Illinois and Delaware have been the only three teams to occupy the top three spots this season.

Unbeaten, once-tied Wittenberg remained in fourth place, Massachusetts, with an identical 6-0-1 record moved up to fifth and San Diego State also advanced one place to sixth.

Western Kentucky, with only a tie to mar its record in seven games, jumped into seventh position, along with Texas A&I, which dropped three places to a seventh place tie after losing, and St. John's (Minn.) finished its season unbeaten and moved into ninth. South Dakota State completed the top 10.

Coach Dave Nelson's Delaware team relies on a 41-point-per-game offense and a stingy defense which has allowed an average of eight points per contest. Chuck Zolak, a senior quarterback, is the offensive leader for the Blue Hens.

Southwest Missouri State, with seven straight wins, tied cross-state rival Washington of St. Louis in 11th place; Eastern Carolina climbed three places to 13th replacing No. 14 Western State (Colo.), and unbeaten Lewis and Clark fell to 15th.

Northeast Oklahoma, undefeated McNeese State, and Southwest Texas State, also unbeaten shared 16th, Montana State ranked 19th and Luther, another unbeaten eleven, No. 20.

Five small college coaches from each of the seven geographical areas of the nation comprise the UPI 35-man board. Each week they select the top 10 teams and points are awarded on a 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 basis.

Injury sidelines OSU defense man

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Defensive halfback Dan Sieg of Oregon State will miss the team's next two games because of a knee injury.

The Beavers, whose 5-2 record is best among major West Coast eleven, will face Indiana at Bloomington Saturday.

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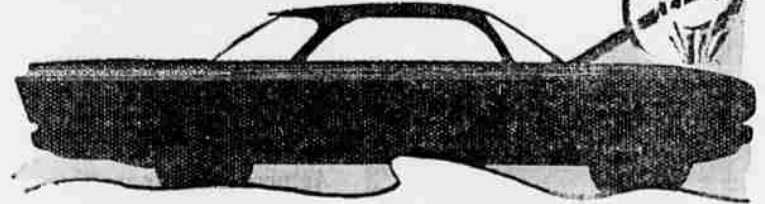
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
