

Federal grand jury indicts pair for spying for Russia

WASHINGTON (UPI)—A federal grand jury has indicted two men, arrested last week as spies for Russia, on charges of conspiring to transmit information to the Soviets about the command and control system of the Strategic Air Command (SAC), the government announced today.

The Justice Department said John William Butenko, 38, an electrical engineer from Orange, N.J., and Igor A. Ivanov, 33, a chauffeur for a Russian firm in New York, were named in a three-count indictment. It was returned in U.S. District Court at Newark, N.J.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the indictment also named three members of the Soviet mission to the United Nations as co-conspirators but not defendants.

They are Yuriy A. Romashin, third secretary of the mission; Gleb A. Pavlov, an attaché; and Vladimir I. Olenov, a staff member.

Romashin, Pavlov and Olenov were ordered out of the country Nov. 1 by the State Department for their part in the case.

Butenko and Ivanov were arrested by FBI agents Oct. 29 following a clandestine meeting

in a railroad station parking lot at Englewood, N.J.

Butenko is being held with Ivanov in the Hudson County, N.J., jail in Jersey City, N.J. He was a control administrator in the field operations division of the International Electric Corp. in Paramus, N.J., and had top secret clearance.

Ivanov was a chauffeur for the Amtorg Trading Co., a Russian export-import firm which operates in New York City.

The first count of the indictment charged that Butenko obtained national defense documents and turned them over to Soviet agents at secret meetings. The conspirators sought to conceal these meetings by traveling to them by round-about routes, the government says.

The grand jury charged that the conspirators used a portable 35-millimeter document-copying camera which plugged into a car's cigarette lighter, and a pocket-sized transmitter and receiver.

The indictment cited eight meetings or trips by all the defendants and co-conspirators as overt acts of the conspiracy. These were between April 21 and Oct. 29, 1963, to Coster, Norwood, Paramus, Englewood and Ft. Lee, N.J.

The second count formally charged that Butenko conspired to act as an agent for the Soviet Union without required notification to the secretary of state and that the others aided and abetted him in this conspiracy. Both Butenko and Ivanov were named as defendants in this count.

Maximum penalty on the first count is death. Maximum penalty on the second count is five years in prison and \$10,000. The maximum penalty for conviction on the third count is 10 years and \$5,000.

The indictment revealed officially for the first time that the information involved in the conspiracy pertained to the command and control system of the Air Force's Strategic Air Command.

U.S. puts trust in Nike-Zeus defense set-up

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States now has no fool-proof anti-missile defense system. But, the Army has spent more than \$1.2 billion on development of the Nike-Zeus anti-missile missile that it claims will be able to do the job.

Only a few days after Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's "fly in the sky" statement in June, 1962, the Army successfully intercepted over the South Pacific the nose cone of an Air Force intercontinental ballistic missile with its 48-foot Nike Zeus. It has made several interceptions since then, but the system still has not been fully developed.

President Kennedy, at an August news conference this year, said "the problem of developing a defense against a missile is beyond us and beyond the Soviets technically."

However, Kennedy said that work would continue on the problem, "but I must say those who work the longest are not particularly optimistic that a scientific breakthrough can be made."

The basic problem is to develop an anti-missile missile which can differentiate between a nuclear missile and a decoy.

TRAINING NEED SEEN

PORTLAND (UPI)—The logging industry needs a program of vocational training to supply it with skilled and semiskilled employees, a panel moderator at the 54th Pacific Logging Congress said today.

C. H. Willison, an official of Crown Zellerbach from Portland, said the industry was faced with a growing pool of men wanting work, but untrained for the jobs there are to fill.

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Nikita seen trying to convince Commies that he hasn't gone soft in West dealing

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's "brinkmanship" on the Berlin highway apparently was designed to convince world Communist leaders he had not gone "soft" in dealing with the West, American officials said today.

The United States, Britain and France warned Khrushchev late Wednesday, however, that he would be "responsible for all consequences" of further efforts to restrict Allied military traffic. They told him such harassment must end "once and for all."

The Allied warning, in stiff notes delivered at the Kremlin, came a few hours after Khrushchev had claimed the United States knuckled under to Soviet regulations to obtain release of a convoy delayed 41 hours on the Berlin road.

The State Department disputed this, saying the United

States made "no concessions." Department officials said convoy troops neither dismantled nor lowered the tall gates of their trucks to facilitate a head check as the Russians had demanded.

Khrushchev was meeting today with Communist leaders of about 25 countries gathered in Moscow to help celebrate the 46th anniversary of the Bolshevik Revolution.

The Moscow meeting has been preceded by a series of Soviet harassments carefully designed to pinpoint the Berlin and German issues without, however, flaring to crisis proportions and wrecking entirely the era of better feeling created by the nuclear test ban treaty.

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NEW TALKS URGED

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Ion Gheorghe Maurer called today for another round of talks between Russia and Red China to resolve their ideological dispute. Earlier, Nikolai Podgorny, a high-ranking member of the ruling Soviet Presidium, had urged "normalization of relations" with China.

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Nikita studies Allied protest

MOSCOW (UPI)—Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev today considered a strongly worded note from the three Western Allies protesting "continued interference" by the Soviet Union with Allied military convoys on the Berlin highway.

The note, delivered to the Soviet Foreign Ministry late Wednesday night, said the interference was "totally without justification" and warned that the three Western governments "will hold the Soviet government responsible for all consequences" of any new incident on the highway.

Khrushchev, in equally strong words, said Wednesday that Allied military convoys "will be held up in the future" unless they obey Soviet control procedures. He said an American convoy detained 41 hours at a Soviet checkpoint would have been able to force its way through only "over our dead bodies." Today a U.S. convoy went through a Soviet checkpoint without incident.

Neither side appeared ready to back down on its interpretation of "reasonable" procedures for checking convoys moving over the Russian-controlled highway to Berlin.

U.S. Ambassador Foy D. Kohler flew back to Moscow Wednesday from a vacation in England to coordinate the Western protest notes on orders from Washington.

SESSION CUT SHORT

ONTARIO (UPI)—The Bureau of Land Management's National Advisory Board Council cut its meeting one day short Wednesday when heavy rains prevented planned tours of the Vale range reclamation project.

The council was holding its first meeting in history outside of Washington, D. C., for the specific purpose of studying the project, which covers all of Malheur County and parts of Grant and Harney counties.

The last formal action before adjournment came Tuesday night, when the council approved a recommendation that stockmen be paid if they lose their grazing permits on public land.
