Hoot Moore extolls Bears, 'the finest'

This and that, etc. . . . Saturday's Bend High School Homecoming football clash against Redmond has already been hashed and re-hashed from the future's point of view.

There, no doubt, will be plenty to talk about afterwards. However, there are a couple of things that are noteworthy:

Hoot Moore, Bend's line coach who is "very pleased" with the way it held up under the pressure of Prineville's onslaught at the goal line last Saturday, said "this is the finest bunch of young men ever assembled on a football team."

Perhaps the thing that pleases him the most is the fact his line is almost entirely composed of juniors who will be back next year. Bend will take a setback when Harvey Hillis graduates in June.

Pleased with both the offensive and defensive lines, Moore said that the most important element his forwards can have is hustle. "Even if they make mistakes," he said, "they can make up for it with go-get-um."

Moore also had something to say about the rumor-legend floating around the local pump houses that every year (in modern times) the Bears came in before Redmond.

"I won't hear a word of it," he said, "we're not going to go out there and lay down like some people think we are." Moore disclosed that the school spirit for the Redmond tiff is better than it has been in recent years.

Moore today disclosed no particular lineup changes. "We'll go with our regulars, hoping they can do the trick." He did mention that John Ramsey, a 168-pound sophomore guard, may see plenty of action. "He's a scrapper. . . and he was one of the ones who was instrumental in our making that goal line stand last week," Moore pointed out.

And, speaking of goal line stands. . . how about that one that Prineville threw up against Bend, too? Bend had the ball four downs inside the seven but failed to hit paydirt. Poke forwards Fred Phillips and George Brick joined six others in a gap eight defense and gave the Bruins a mauling.

Saturday's grid fray also had another strange, even ironic twist. Game official Hank Hall who made the call on that controversial third down play wherein Prineville fullback Phil Powell was called about six inches to a foot short of the goal line, is an uncle of Poke and Dick Dreher.

Poke and Dick Dreher. Dreher's father is an optometrist. . . and the word is out in the Crook County seat that James R. Dreher would like to have his brother-in-law in for a consultation about his eyes.

A recent to-do in the Pendleton East Oregonian and later in The Bulletin hashed over "the quality of officiating" in Central Oregon, especially Prineville. Somehow there was a "dirty football" shadow cast over actions by the Prineville players against Pendleton.

Good Boys

Take it from Mudgley Wump. If Prineville goes in for this sort of thing then Saturday would have seen the Pokes go whole hog along that line. It was one of those hard-fought games where tempers flare. But the fact remains that Dowling's Pokes didn't. As a matter of fact, players from both teams refrained totally from engaging in "unnecessary rough stuff."

In other matters, an article in the Grants Pass Courier reminds of a situation in 1950 in which Grants Pass was involved with Prineville in a vote to determine which team would go into state playoffs. In that year both teams were undefeated and the votes were mandatory. There were seven schools on the eastern side of the mountains and six on the west. The vote was 7-6 with Klamath Falls casting the deciding vote.

At the time Prineville was an A-2 school, but this was before A-2 schools played for their own state championship. This article came in advance of a vote that may take place over in that country this year. District 5 is in a 3-way deadlock, and Grants Pass or Medford (also tied) will have to face the trio.

'Old-line' Steelers arrive at 'last chance gulch' Sunday

The Pittsburgh Steelers, the only old-line National Football League franchise never to win a division title, arrive at "last chance gulch" Sunday for a clash with the Cleveland Browns.

By winning, the Steelers (4-3-1) can not only put themselves back into a contending position, but also can throw the Eastern Division race into a four-team scramble to include the Browns (7-1), New York Giants (6-2) and the St. Louis Cardinals (5-3).

In the Western Conference, the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Bears (both 7-1) face soft touches and their first-place tie is not likely to be broken until they meet in Chicago a week later. Green Bay is at home against the Minnesota Vikings (3-5) and Chicago entertains the Los Angeles Rams (2-6).

The Giants play at home against the Philadelphia Eagles (2-5-1) and the Cardinals are host to the Washington Redskins (2-6).

In Sunday's two other games, the Dallas Cowboys (2-6) and San Francisco Forty Niners (1-7) meet on the West Coast and the Baltimore Colts (3-5) are at home against the Detroit Lions (4-4).

Here is the "line" on the games: Cleveland 3½ over Pittsburgh; Green Bay 16 over Minnesota; Chicago 16 over Los Angeles; New York 14 over Philadelphia; St. Louis 10½ over Washington; Baltimore 4 over Detroit; Dallas 4 over San Francisco.

The Steelers have a pair of doubtful defensive starters in lineman Ernie Stautner and back Clendon Thomas. For the Browns, defensive tackle Bob Gain is a question mark.

Minnesota never has beaten the Packers in five NFL meetings. The Packers will go once again with John Roach at quarterback in place of injured Bart Starr. Tight end Ron Kramer has a leg injury and may not start.

The Bears have beaten the Rams eight straight times, including a 52-14 rout earlier this year. Running back Ron Bull is not expected to play for the

Germany in big lead after five jumping events

NEW YORK (UPI) — West

Germany, holding a whopping 36-point lead after five international jumping events, can virtually clinch team honors at the New York National Horse Show with a victory in either of today's events.

Only four more international events remain on the schedule after today's activities. The Pennsylvania National Trophy this afternoon and the Good Will Challenge Trophy tonight give the West Germans a chance to run their win streak to six straight blue ribbons.

Herman Schridde of West Germany won both of Thursday's events — the West Point Challenge Trophy and the Puissance — to assume the individual lead with 30 points and give his team a total of 67 points.

Canada is a distant second with 31 points, followed by the United States with 18, Argentina with 14 and Ireland with nine.

Schridde's teammate, Kurt Jarsinski, who is second in individual standings with 16 points, finished behind Schridde in the West Point Trophy.

'Hold them in first half,' Dowling tells grid Pokes

Prineville is a six point favorite when the Cowboys host the Madras White Buffaloes Friday night in a donnybrook that will mean the IC cellar for the loser.

And Coach Bud Dowling at Prineville is the first to admit that his Cowboys should be the favorites. He said, "If we can hold them in the first half we'll beat them. . . and I think we will."

To top matters off it's Prineville's homecoming. This plus the fact that the Pokes came within a whisker last week of upsetting favored Bend is enough to give Dowling's crew the punch they will need.

Dowling offered that the White Buffaloes from Madras are "a real good first half ball club," but that they have demonstrated throughout the season they do not hold together the way they should in the second half.

Best Buff Team

"This is the best ball club they've had in several years," Dowling said, "and we sure respect them, especially their speed."

Dowling pointed out that his charges are still at the peak of morale. "The thing I like about these kids," he said, "is that they never give up. . . I can work them to death and they come right back for more. . . this is the best bunch of grid-ders I've ever coached and they

certainly deserve to win more than they have."

Up at Madras feelings runs just as high. Coach Frank Good said today "it's going to be tough." He disclosed a last minute lineup change. Big Harold Smith, a 230 pound tackle, will not play. Neither will Wayne Maw, a Buff speedster who has been forced to miss considerable action. He is still hampered with a light knee injury.

Good feels that his Buffs are ready. "We'd just like to win this one," he said, "and I think we have a good chance of doing it."

Actually, the rivalry between Madras and Prineville is a renewal of an old one. Last year was the first time since 1955 that the Pokes and the Buffs went to war. In the 1950's the games were all Prineville, but Madras and Prineville tied twice just before the 50's commenced.

Last year the Pokes were nearly upset by the Buffs. It was 6-6 with about two minutes to go when the Buffs fumbled. Prineville recovered and took it in from there to score and win 12-6.
