It was quite a war, while it lasted back in 1917-18

Today comes up the 45th Armistice Day, a fiesta of not much import to anyone other than the pot-bellied gaffers who marched and sang "Over There" in World War I.

It was quite a war, friends, while it lasted, which was not long so far as the United States was concerned. The United States joined up in April, 1917. And 45 years ago today, Nov. 11, 1918, there was marching and counter marching in streets at home and abroad. Bands played. Ticker tape and waste paper snowed from tall buildings, coast to coast.

Young men and women bused in public and there was a heavy run on bootleg booze.

Nov. 11, 1918, was a big day. The U.S.A. had licked the Hun, by golly, and you'd better not get smart with your Uncle Sammy or pow! Never was a great nation riding for a harder fall. And never was a great nation less aware that the big, bad trouble was still to come, instead of having been disposed of in handy fashion after Black Jack Pershing stepped ashore in France, snapped a hand salute and said: "Lafayette, we are here."

Whoops, we won the war. Moreover, we won the war to make the world safe for democracy. We won the war to end all wars. We won the war to guarantee the self-determination of small peoples. We won it, and all of us were going to live happily ever after. Not only that, but everyone, worldwide, would live happily, too, and love the United States and its people. Also its way of life, chewing gum, movies and all.

That is how the script read back there in 1918. Our man Woodrow Wilson was a great phrase-maker although a positive sucker for European diplomacy, as were some of his side boys who succeeded him in the White House. Our man was sincere like a Madison Avenue pitch man. He believed his own slogans and his fan mail. But Wilson and his fellow citizens were bewitched and benumbed by the beauty of our man's fine phrases.

Pause In Silence
Armistice Day was celebrated with noisy toasts to dreamy objectives never really achieved, with parades and such. And for many years there was in the United States the ritual of two minutes silence. At 11 a.m. on Nov. 11, United Press wires would fall silent for two minutes, an eerie thing, and citizens would pause in the streets; yes, and even in the speakeasies.

London bus riders who passed the memorial cenotaph in Whitehall, going to and from their daily chores, would uncover their heads and think a moment for the dead.

But the two minutes of silence got lost somewhere over the years and the British in Whitehall no longer bare their heads. Armistice Day is almost forgotten, though still an official holiday known as Veteran's Day. Armistice Day was well named. An armistice is merely an interruption. The interruption was not for long. There was no peace then and there is no peace now except for those who died.

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Party workers view vote film

Precinct workers got a preview of how effective personal contact work can be in elections as they viewed the film "Let Doorbells Ring" during the Democratic Central Committee meeting Sunday night at the Superior Cafe.

The film, supplied to the Deschutes county organization by National Democratic Committee in Washington, D.C., pointed out the fact that President Kennedy's election was won in the precincts by workers who didn't quit until the polls closed.

Deschutes county Democrats went on record at their regular monthly meeting as favoring a pre-primary convention of the state party. This includes the drafting of a platform so that the voters will know where the candidates stand before the primary is held. A post primary convention is required of both political parties under the law, but the Democrats have held two pre-primary conventions in recent years and the third is scheduled for Corvallis February 29.

In other business, the committee gave their stamp of approval to the appointment of Robert H. Fox, Jr., for a rural mail route job. Fox is a career postal worker with top seniority and he is a registered Democrat. He was one of four postal workers to appear before the committee in behalf of the post.

A second rural route vacancy for which a civil service examination was held last spring will probably be balloted on at the December meeting of the organization if the results of the examination are available at that time.

Here are highlights from Gov. Hatfield's address

Highlights of Gov. Mark Hatfield's address to the special session of the Oregon legislature:

"The revenue program passed by this body at its regular session...has been summarily and decisively rejected...It was disliked for many reasons...But it is not for us here assembled to dwell on the past."

"You and I know that, prior to your convening last January, I had pruned agency appropriation request by \$90 million...Two-thirds of our \$1.3 billion budget is earmarked, removed from significant executive fiscal control...Of the \$404.3 million general fund budget, \$135.1 million is for basic school support and is not subject to executive

adjustment."
"My recommendations...are: 'To authorize the executive department to modify basic school support allotments...To place a moratorium on yet-unlet capital construction...To authorize a speed-up of the payment to the state of income taxes withheld by employers...To undertake no subjects...which are not directly related to our fiscal picture...To be aware the vast majority of the people expect no new taxes...To recognize that there will remain the uncompleted task of tax reform.'"

SAN DIEGO (UPI)—Gale Lockhart, a 43-year-old former deputy district attorney in Portland, Ore., was held today on charges of passing bad checks.

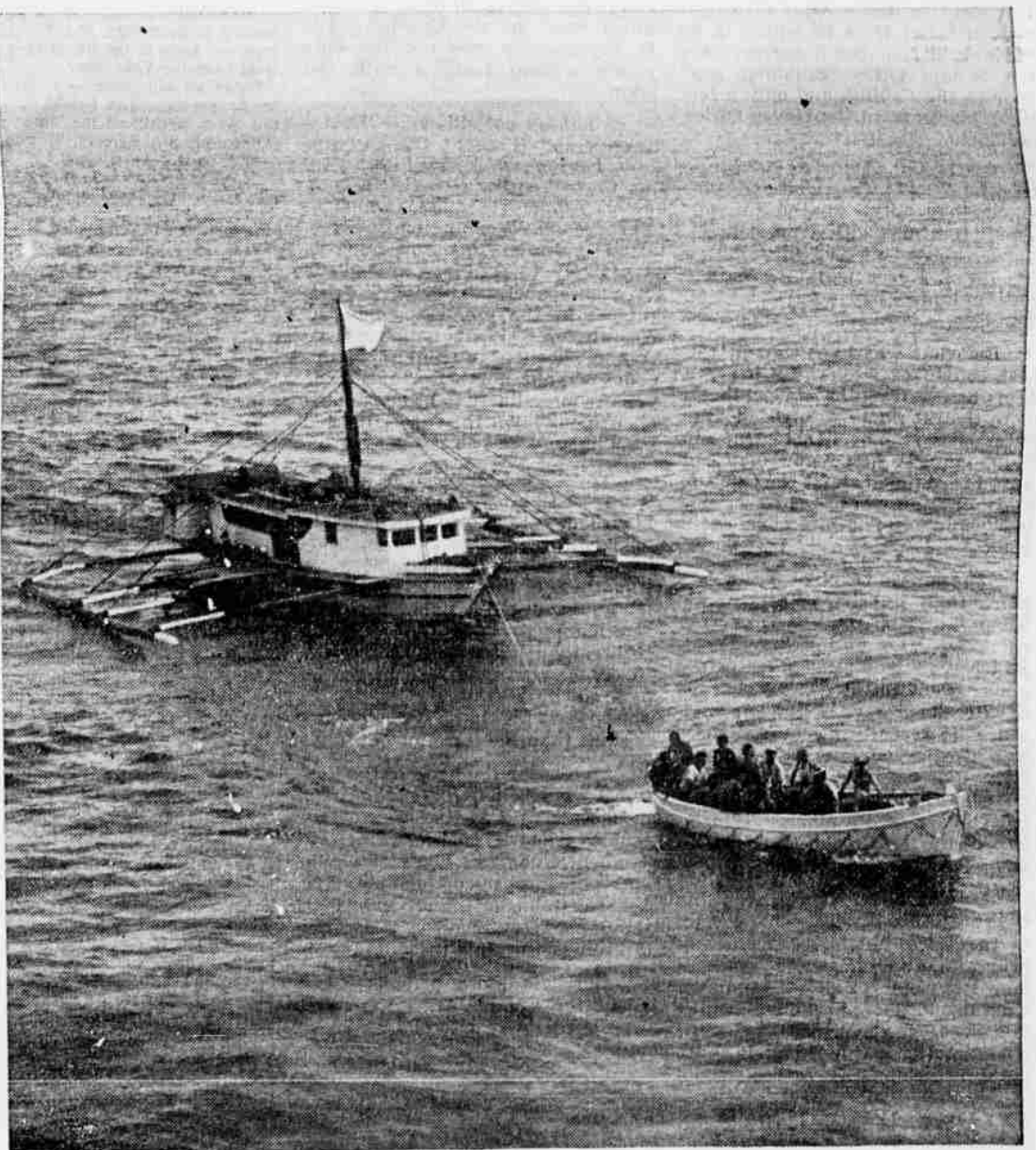
The Rev. James S. Thompson will conduct the services. Burial will be in Pilot Butte cemetery, beside Mrs. Ogletree's grave.
