

Message gets wide variety of comment

SALEM (UPI) —The special session of the legislature was launched Monday — agreed there was much to be done, but not agreed on what should be done.

Reactions to Gov. Mark Hatfield's special message to a joint session of the House Senate ranged from enthusiastic support to bitter disappointment.

Hatfield admonished lawmakers to go swiftly about their work, then go home.

House Speaker Clarence Barton, D-Coquille, said the address was "what I expected."

Senate President Ben Musa, D-The Dalles, commented "I agree, we have a job to do. I still hope we can get the job done in seven or ten days."

House Minority Leader F. F. Montgomery, R-Eugene, said "we will tighten our belts along the lines he recommended."

Senate Minority Leader Anthony Yturri, R-Ontario, termed Hatfield's address "brief, clear and to the point."

"Worst Ever," Pearson

But Sen. Walter Pearson, D-Portland, blasted the message as "the worst address I have ever heard any governor deliver. I resent his remarks directed at the legislature. He offered no solution to the problems."

Underlying the day's activities was a tone of seriousness. Musa termed it "a different attitude of legislators."

What it foretold was not clear. Hatfield admonished lawmakers not to enact any new tax measures. But within an hour of his speech more than a dozen had been proposed, and it appeared the flow had barely begun.

Barton commented "It's anyone's privilege to introduce bills as long as they are germane to the subject at hand."

Pearson acedly noted, "They're wasting their time and the legislature's time by holding tax committee meetings."

Musa refused comment. "It's not for the Senate to pass judgment on House tax proposals at this time."

Confusion and Contrast
It also was a day of confusion and contrast.

There was confusion because the normal legislative processes were reved up to jet speed. Six of the bills introduced Monday were given two readings and referred to committee within an hour's time—a process that under normal procedures would take two days.

Contrast resulted because legislators assigned to committees were put immediately to work, while others had nothing to do but wait.

Still unresolved was whether the legislature would make budget cuts, or allow the governor to make them.

There was no agreement in Ways and Means whether it should assume a one-shot measure would be approved.

And there were so many conflicting views on proposed cuts in basic school aid, that the problem was turned over to a subcommittee.

The responsible leaders continued to voice the belief that the session would end in a week or so. But there was an underlying note of concern that indicated the session might drag on for a longer period.

Shortly after the joint session ended, Robert Jossy, secretary-treasurer of the Multnomah County Citizens Committee for economy and equitable taxation—a branch of the group that spearheaded referral of the \$60 million tax increase measure—presented petitions to Musa urging adoption of the Liberty Amendment. This proposed change in the federal constitution would outlaw income taxes.

Bills okayed for introduction

SALEM (UPI) — Additional sales and cigarette tax measures were approved for introduction today by the House Rules Committee.

Rep. Richard Eymann, D-Marcola, submitted a 4-cent a pack cigarette tax that would raise \$10 million a biennium. The measure would not be referred to the people.

Rep. Don McKennis, D-Summersville, submitted a 3 per cent sales tax proposal.

Another sales tax plan, and a 4-cent a pack cigarette tax also were introduced.

The committee blocked introduction of a measure to eliminate the distribution of liquor revenues to cities and counties, and refused to introduce a proposed constitutional change to allow motor fuel tax revenues to go into the general fund.

Congress opens third week of debate on aid

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Senate opens its third week of debate on its \$3.7 billion foreign aid bill today with the threat of possible stern tactics to speed action on the long delayed measure.

The bill, which would authorize another year of military, economic and technical assistance abroad, now totals only about \$240 million more than the House voted and almost \$800 million less than President Kennedy asked.

Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., leader of the opposition to the measure, said he planned further attempts to cut the bill and attach restrictive amendments.

He warned against any attempt to gag debate through time limitations or tabling motions.

But Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., apparently was firm in his announced determination to invoke the "sudden death" tabling device if the bill's opponents keep up their delaying tactics with long discussion of countless amendments.

Other Congressional News:
ESTES: Senate investigators were to question Billie Sol Estes, the bankrupt Texas cotton and fertilizer tycoon who has appealed federal and state convictions of fraud and conspiracy. Estes would not say in advance whether he will open up for the members of the Senate investigations subcommittee, which held four months of hearings in the case in 1962. The hearings ended in September of last year, but the record was kept open for Estes' appearance.

Indonesia: Rep. Oliver P. Bolton, R-Ohio, accused the Kennedy administration today of furthering the "avaricious territorial dreams" of Indonesian President Sukarno. Bolton charged that Indonesia was using late-model U.S. transport planes to drop troops and supplies along the borders of the new nation of Malaysia. He said the U.S. planes were Sukarno's "most potent military punch."

He urged the United States to "get tough" with Sukarno.

Jury resumes deliberations

DENVER (UPI) — A U. S. District Court jury resumed deliberations today in the trial of two building supply company employees accused of fraud in connection with federal home improvement loans.

The jury had been recessed Friday until after the Veterans Day weekend by Judge Hatfield Chilson.

Defendants are Theodore J. Venable, 44, of Medford, Ore.; and Thomas M. Roth, 32, of Rockford, Ill., formerly of Statewide Builders Supply Co. of Denver.

Chilson had earlier directed acquittal of a third defendant, Mrs. Margery Kinkeloch Lytle, 38, of Salt Lake City.

The defendants were accused of enticing prospective customers for aluminum siding to apply for Federal Housing Administration loans by telling homeowners their houses had been selected as show places by Reynolds Aluminum Co.

The government charged the customers were promised bonuses that were never paid.

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Accidents take lives of nine

Nine Oregon residents died as a result of accidents Monday. Eight of the deaths were recorded in the state.

A woman and her three children lost their lives when a fire swept through their cottage at Cannon Beach.

The victims were Mrs. Margaret Gee, 24; her daughter, Michelle, 4, and sons, Warren, 2, and Daniel, 8 months.

Roy Kelly, 50, Myrtle Point, died in a Bandon hospital from injuries suffered when his light plane crashed in the Sixes River area 25 miles south of Bandon Sunday afternoon.

He was attempting to land his aircraft on a small landing strip.

Harold Davis, 63, Medford, was fatally injured when his car collided with another car and a logging truck on State Highway 62 five miles north of Medford. He died about five hours after the accident at a Medford hospital.

Sixteen Jimenez, 49, Portland, died in a Eugene hospital from injuries received in a four-car pileup on Interstate 5 near Albany Friday night.

A logging accident near Reedsport claimed the life of James Cushman, 31, Coos Bay. He was employed by the Matthews Construction Co. of Empire.

Mrs. Grace Tuttle, 86, Sheridan, was one of five persons killed in a two-car collision on U.S. Highway 71 about 20 miles north of Nevada, Mo.

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'Mistletoe' sale is planned by Forest Service

The Deschutes National Forest is planning a "mistletoe sale," but it has nothing to do with Christmas, even though it is scheduled for December.

This sale, with 2,800,000 board feet of timber offered, is in the Lava Flow Mistletoe area, in the Crescent District about three miles southeast of Hamner Butte and north of Crescent Creek.

Foresters said this is an area of heavy mistletoe infestation. However, the tree parasite is not the type of mistletoe much in demand during the Christmas holidays. The mistletoe in the sale area is of the dwarf variety.

Removal of commercial timber from the area will make possible treatment of the mistletoe. The parasite causes considerable damage to growing trees.

The Lava Flow Mistletoe sale will be December 10 at 2 p.m., in the office of the Deschutes National Forest supervisor in Bend. The stand includes 2,700,000 board feet of ponderosa pine and sugar pine, minimum acceptable price of which has been set at \$23.80 a thousand board feet.

Full information relative to sale can be obtained from the office of Ranger Leslie Yates in Crescent or from the Deschutes National Forest office in Bend.

The sale area embraces about 225 acres. No permanent road construction will be required in connection with the sale.
