Packer dilemma: where are the Bear strong points?

NEW YORK (UPI) — Vince Lombardi is stickpinned on the horns of a dandy dilemma today.

The head coach of the Green Bay Packers is noted as a man who always plays to the opposition's strong point. His theory is that if you beat them there, you've stopped them all the way.

But, getting ready to face the Chicago Bears in what shapes up as a pro football classic next Sunday, the question has to confront Lombardi as to just where the Bear strength is located.

Most of the credit for an 8-1

Bear record, which includes an opening game 10-3 victory over Green Bay, goes to the suicidal "southern seven" up front defensively. In nine games they have limited the opposition to a total of 821 yards, which is miserly indeed.

These grinding gentlemen include ends Doug Atkins, a six foot, eight inch, 255-pounder from Tennessee, and Bob Kilcullen, a mere 245-pounder from Texas Tech; 250-pound tackle Earl Leggett of LSU and Stan Jones of Maryland, plus linebackers Larry Morris of Georgia Tech, Bill George of Wake Forest and Joe Fortunato of Mississippi State. These three average out at a mere 230

pounds.

They have restrained opposition ball carriers with a thunderous enthusiasm, permitting only three touchdowns by running in nine contests. With Bear ball carriers demonstrating a shyness for the goal line, the defense has been paramount in two 10-3 victories, three other games in which the opposition tallied one touchdown in each, and a 6-0 shutout against Los Angeles Sunday.

Further illustrating their proficiency in grudgingly giving away real estate, they held Detroit and Baltimore to 40 and 45 yards rushing for an entire game and stopped the Rams with a mere 59 yards rushing

last Sunday.

However, the four fellers protecting the air lanes from farther back are not to be overlooked. This quartet of winged-footed jumping jacks is composed of Bennie McRae, Richie Petitbon, Dave Whitsett and Roosevelt Taylor.

Only seven touchdowns have been scored through the air against the Bears all season. The Bear pass defenders have made a league-leading 23 interceptions and all season long yielded but 1,163 yards. This was featured by allowing the Rams only 29 airway yards, giving Green Bay only 73 and the Colts but 90 yards.

The combined defensive ef-

forts of the southern seven and the four who back them as a whole have relinquished only 32 points and a grand total of 1,984 yards. It sounds almost archaic.

Thus Lombardi, if he sticks to his format of trying to beat the opposition's strength, has quite a decision to make. Should he send his Jim Taylor, one of the game's top fullbacks, battering into the smothering arms of the southern seven or try to go over them against the best pass defenders in the league.

His decision should be a joy to behold. The Packers are 3-4 point favorites. The question now is whether that's the total points which will be scored.

Joe Brown takes hard knockout, may retire soon

MARACAIBO, Venezuela (UPI)—Poor "old bones" Joe Brown, former world lightweight champion, considered retirement today after being knocked out in a fight from which police prevented his escape.

Young Carlos (Morocha) Hernandez of Venezuela, the world's second-ranking contender, entered his bid for a shot at the 135-pound crown by knocking out 37-year-old Brown with a right to the jaw in the third round Monday night, after flooring him for a count of eight in the first round.

Brown, who had twice postponed the scheduled 10-round bout because he claimed he needed more time to train, tried to run out on the fight Monday afternoon but was stopped at the Maracaibo Grande Oro Airport when he attempted to take a plane to Maiquetia.

The ex-champion from Houston, Tex., claimed he had had a disagreement over his purse with the promoters.

It was a sad ending, perhaps, for the once-great Brown who had displayed magnificent ability and spartan courage at New Orleans in 1956 when, despite a broken right hand in the second round, he won the title from Wallace Bud Smith on a decision.

Kelso beaten again; how about International?

LAUREL, Md. (UPI)—Racing fans wondered today if Kelso ever would win the \$150,000 Washington D.C. International after the great gelding again was beaten Monday in the turf classic — this time by Mongo.

Kelso, America's perennial Thoroughbred champion owned by Mrs. Richard C. DuPont, got his third shot at the elusive prize and once again he ran a great race. But once again another horse ran one just a little bit better.

This time it was Mongo, America's second starter in a race which drew a field of 10 from seven countries. Mongo, a hard-hitting colt at his best over a grass course, beat Kelso by half a length after running the last quarter mile in the mile and one-half race a shade under 24 seconds.

Twelve lengths farther back was the first of the foreign horses. All of them either were hopelessly outrun at the start or outclassed in the stretch as

Mongo and Kelso battled for the winner's purse of \$90,000.

The furious finish carried Mongo across the finish line in 2:27 2-5, the second fastest running in the history of the race. Nyracos of France was third followed by Espresso of England, Misti of France, Ivory Tower II of Russia, Imperial of Hungary, Ferumbas of Venezuela, Christmas Island of Ireland and Bryansk, another Russian horse.

The sale of Christmas Island for \$90,000 to Earl Scheib of California was announced after the race.

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Longhorns in 'good straights'

NEW YORK (UPI) — Texas Coach Darrell Royal has more "straights" going for him than a riverboat gambler and he's determined to play defense to the hilt to extend them.

The top-ranked Longhorns, the nation's only unbeaten-undefeated major college football team, were rated first by 31 of 35 coaches on the United Press International rating board Monday to increase their lead in the race for the national title.

In the process they have won eight straight games this season, 12 straight over two seasons — the longest streak in major college ranks; and have not lost in 19 straight regular season games.

Texas is seeking its third straight Southwest Conference title; its fifth straight bowl bid.

its first national championship and its first perfect season since 1920. The Longhorns have been No. 1 in the country for five straight weeks.

Royal's offense has scored only four touchdowns in the last three games but his defense has shut out opponents twice and four times allowed just one score.

"Defense and sound kicking win football games," Royal maintained, and Texas has both.

For the first time this season the top ten remained intact, although there was quite a bit of shuffling.

Navy cruised into second replacing Illinois; undefeated, once-tied Mississippi, en route to another Southeastern Conference crown, finished third for the third week in a row and

Michigan State, leading the Big Ten, vaulted four places to fourth.

Pitt Advances
Pittsburgh jumped from ninth to fifth, Oklahoma remained sixth and Alabama maintained its seventh-place ranking. Illinois slipped to eighth after its loss to Michigan, the Illini's first of the season; Nebraska gained ninth place and Auburn, which had its perfect record ruined by Mississippi State, dipped from fifth to 10th.

Washington, winner of five consecutive games and on top in the Big Six race, moved up to No. 11; Army and Georgia Tech advanced to 12th and 13th respectively and Baylor slid to 14th from 11th.

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
