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## Prehistoric animal's bones found on Hay Creek Ranch

More proof has been found that prehistoric cousins of elephants were at home in Central Oregon long ago.

This new evidence is provided by bones of a mammoth discovered on the Hay Creek Ranch, in the high country of Jefferson County east of Madras. The find was made by Julius Larsen of Oswego, and consists of fragments of a femur.

Dr. J. Arnold Shotwell, Uni-

versity of Oregon paleontologist, made the identification of the animal and noted that it lived "at least 10,000 years ago." Mammoths ranged over the Oregon country as early as 500,000 years ago, and were preceded by other elephant-like creatures dating back millions of years.

There is some indication that Central Oregon was well populated by elephants in the epoch when moisture was heavy. Lakes were deep and streams, such as Deschutes County's Dry River east of Bend, were flush.

Some 20 years ago, elephant material was found in a small canyon in the Smith Rock country, on the same range that would have been used by the Hay Creek mammoth. Also, bones of a mammoth were discovered in Cow Canyon, route of U.S. Highway 97.

Elephant fossils have also been discovered along Trout Creek, and on Crooked River. Most of the creatures have been identified as representative of the species known as the Columbian mammoth — not quite as large as the elephants now attracting much attention in the Portland zoo.

In ancient days, elephants forged along the banks of ancient Silver Lake, where, in early days, their sand-polished, black bones were common.
