Fishing regulations see minor changes

PORTLAND — A few protective measures for chinook salmon in resting pools or on spawning beds were the major changes in the 1964 angling regulations under tentative rules approved by the Oregon State Game Commission at its public hearing in Portland last Friday.

Except for several minor changes in dates and deadlines, anglers will be fishing under almost the identical regulations as they did this last season.

Opening date for the general trout season would be April 25 in all zones except streams in zones 1, 3 and 4 (none of which are in Central Oregon). Only minor date changes would be made for the Rogue and the Umpqua Rivers.

High Lakes May 23
For the high lakes (and streams in zone 1), the season would open on May 23. The general trout season would run through October 31.

Few changes are seen for Central Oregon. Pelton and Round Butte impoundments would be opened with the regular trout season on April 25.

The Deschutes River would be closed from Crane Prairie dam down to the watermaster cable crossing in Sheep Bridge Forest Camp, a distance of

about two miles. Except that from September 8 to October 31, the closure will extend to a point 1/4 of a mile below the Sheep Bridge watermaster cable crossing.

Fall River will be closed to angling in any manner other than with an artificial fly.

From the falls above Mill City, the Santiam area would be closed to all angling downstream to the railroad bridge to protect spring chinook in the resting holes in this area.

On the McKenzie, Santiam, Rogue, North Umpqua, and Eagle Creek in Clackamas County, salmon would be given added protection under the tentative proposals.

Chinook salmon in the McKenzie would obtain some relief by closing the area between Trail Bridge and the Geological Survey cable crossing to all angling, and the Wallerville powerhouse tailrace would be closed to salmon angling.

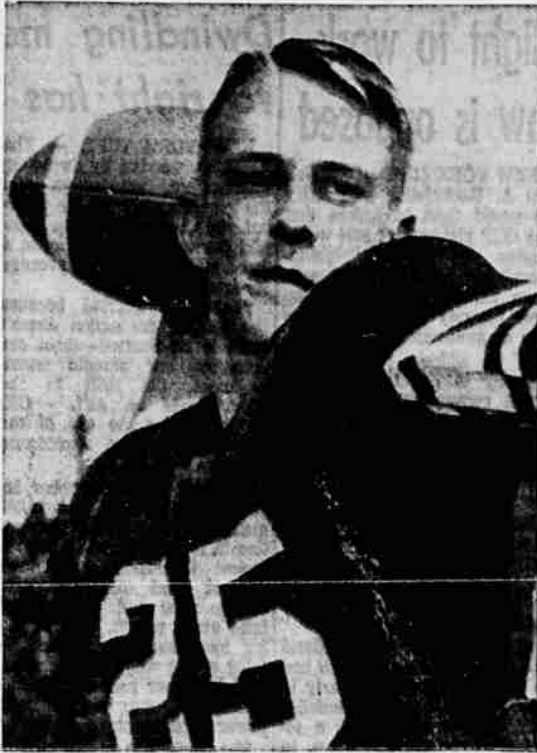

Hannum banned

Coach Wilt decides to feed Wilt and win...

Wilt Chamberlain, thrust unexpectedly into the role of coach, viewed the San Francisco Warriors' state of affairs and made a firm decision.

The Warriors trailed, 29-19, at the end of the first period. Coach Alex Hannum was banished to the dressing room and the Cincinnati Royals' Jerry Lucas and Oscar Robertson were running wild.

Coach Chamberlain decided that the Warriors' best bet was to feed the ball to player Chamberlain.

With Coach Wilt directing signals, player Wilt went on to score 19 points in the second period, 13 in the third and 14

in the fourth for a game-total of 49 Wednesday night that lifted the Warriors to a 98-92 victory. It was a complete turnaround from Wilt's early games this season during which he has acted with more emphasis on play-making than in his four previous seasons in the National Basketball Association.

"I told 'em what I thought would go," said the 7-foot, 1-inch Chamberlain after the game. "And I got their cooperation."

Playmaker Guy Rodgers said it more succinctly: "We knew where our bread and butter was — and that's where we went."

Rodgers' steal and layup gave the Warriors a 91-90 lead with 4:28 left and then Chamberlain's rebounding kept them ahead the rest of the way. Robertson wound up as the Royals' high scorer with 28 points.

The Boston Celtics defeated the Los Angeles Lakers, 114-110, and the New York Knickerbockers beat the St. Louis Hawks, 106-102, in a double-header that drew 18,137 to New York's Madison Square Garden. The crowd was the largest Garden basketball crowd since Nov. 11, 1960.

Tom Heinsohn scored 31 points and Sam Jones had 16 for the Celtics, who scored their 10th win in 11 games, while Jerry West had 35 for the Lakers. Billy McGill, acquired two weeks ago from the Baltimore Bullets, scored 28 points to lead the Knicks, who held Bob Pettit to a 4-for-21 shooting night and only 13 points.

While the Princeton fullback scored the Tigers' only touchdown against Harvard, Isaacson raced into second place with a 20-point production against UCLA. Jacavazzi has 72 points compared to Isaacson's 62 points. They both have two games remaining.

In the pass-catching department, Lawrence Elkins of Baylor increased his lead to 17 with 56 completions thus far this season.

Huskies to go with same horses

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—The same University of Washington lineup that met California will take on UCLA Saturday, Husky coach Jim Owens said today.

Washington stressed defense in its drill Wednesday, attempting to bolster a forward wall that gave way to many Bear rushes last week.

Washington's answer to Zeno and Co. comes in the form of Bill Douglas, the Huskies' brilliant junior quarterback. Douglas has netted 1,114 yards so far this season, with 804 of those coming by completing nearly 62 per cent of his passes.

Backing up Douglas is a group of power runners headed by fullbacks Junior Coffey and Charlie Browning. Halfbacks Ron Medved and Dave Kopay also can churn out the yardage.

Negroes barred...

Wallace blasts network for cancelling telecast

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)

—The decision of a broadcasting network and former sponsors to drop the annual telecast of the Blue-Gray football game because Negro players were barred was termed "tragic and irresponsible" by Gov. George Wallace Wednesday.

Wallace said the persons "who pressured and intimidated" the National Broadcasting Company (NBC) and the game's sponsors into dropping the bowl game "hurt all races, especially the Negro race."

During the 26 year history of the bowl classic, proceeds of the game between North and South All-Stars have gone to a program of the local Lions Club set up to help blind and

children. Lions Club President Harris Dawson said the funds are distributed "without regard to race, color or creed."

Notified Bowl Officials

Bowl officials were notified last week by the network the game would not be televised this year because Negro players were not invited to participate. The network had carried the game annually since 1954.

Chrysler Corporation and the Gillette company sponsored the broadcast.

Wallace said in a prepared statement, "those who pressured and intimidated the sponsors and the network have, as they always do, hurt all races,

especially the Negro race with this petty attempt to satisfy their own selfish motives.

"The receipts from the game are used for charitable purposes, including sight conservation, and almost 60 per cent of the people who received eye care under this program last year were Negroes. Children in the first grades of 35 Negro schools and 24 white schools had eye tests paid for by proceeds from the game," Wallace said.

Result of Pressure
Dawson said "it is a fair assumption that the ban resulted from pressure applied either to NBC or game sponsors by Negro organizations."

Allyn McKeen, general manager of the Blue-Gray Association, said "we are trying to find out just what is behind it—where the pressure that caused the cancellation came from."

He said negotiations were under way to get NBC's permission for a regional telecast. Under a contract which expires in 1966, NBC may determine whether or not the game is televised or broadcast.

McKeen added Don Faurot, athletic director at the University of Missouri and recruiter of the northern squad, assured him the ban was not hampering efforts to line up the North team.

Gal golfers 'warm-up' for Friday go

—A pro-am event including the big names in women's professional golf was scheduled today as a warmup for Friday's first annual Mary Mills Gulf Coast Invitational tournament.

The three-day weekend tournament offers \$15,000 in prize money, the largest purse ever offered in the Ladies Professional Golf Association (LPGA).

Contestants will include Miss Mills, 23, pro at the Gulf Hills Country Club where the tournament will be played. A native of nearby Gulfport, she won eight consecutive Mississippi amateur titles before turning pro last year.

Others who will cover the 6,294-yard club course in the tournament are Mickey Wright, the LPGA's leading money winner, Kathy Whitworth, who defeated Miss Wright Oct. 20 in Santa Barbara, Calif., and last weekend in San Antonio, Tex.

Patty Berg, Louise Suggs, Betty Rawls and Jackie Pung.

The ladies will be shooting for a par 71 in the 54-hole affair.
